Dealing with these types of children is a difficult task because they must be dealt with as individuals because of the uniqueness of his or her handicap. Recreational activities are usually conducted on a group level, the group gravitating together because of some common interest. Thus far public health officials have been contacted to determine the number of handicapped children in this area along with the type and extent of their handicaps. Many children, of course, have handicaps which preclude almost any type of recreational activities. Many, however, can be greatly helped by a program geared to their particular needs. The Recreation Department has a list of names of individuals in this community who might wish to assist in this program once enough information has been gained on the problem.
