

Alaska Aches Trigger Alarm

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Stomach aches in Alaska turned into king-sized headaches for Western laboratory officials and Air Force personnel sent to find and deliver botulism serum late Saturday.

The alarm went out when four men aboard a Navy tug in the Aleutian Islands were stricken with severe stomach pains after drinking tomato juice. The Navy feared deadly botulism poisoning, caused by tainted food.

While the men were being rushed to the Elmendorf Air Force Base hospital here, the call went out for serum. There was none in Alaska.

A supply was found in Portland, Ore., but doctors were afraid it was insufficient. The search spread to Denver and Los Angeles while an Air Force team undertook the 1,500-mile mercy flight with the Portland serum.

Even before the plane arrived, the sailors landed here their stomach aches replaced by hunger pangs.

The sailors were identified as Norman Welandt, 18, Spokane, Wash.; Ronald Talsma, 21, Lancaster, Calif.; Richard Wells, 24, Amesbury, Mass.; and Leon Sokol, 22, of Chicago.

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Agencies Probe Effects Of Moving On Small Child

NEW YORK (UPI) — Moving day to the homemaker means clutter and confusion, but eventually clean closets.

What does it mean to a child? Emotional upset? Shock?

At least two national organizations are worrying about the matter, especially since we've become a nation of changing addresses.

An estimated 41 million Americans will move this year, compared with 31 million a decade ago.

The American Association for Child Education, Washington, said this meant that six million children from 5 to 13 years will pull up roots and plant them elsewhere.

The American Association for Family Living, a child study group with headquarters in Chicago, studied the effects of moving for one of the nation's carriers (Allied Van Lines) and found that "the emotional effect depends mainly on the age of the individual child and its existing relationship with its parents."

It indicated that if the child is loved, is emotionally healthy, and there is a happy household atmosphere, there is little danger of upset.

Each association put together a list of suggestions for making moving day a happy one for children.

Here are some from the family living group:

—If you have an infant, see that you are near him, feed him on schedule and cuddle him often. However, baby is the one least likely to be upset by moving.

—The preschool child is the most vulnerable. Give him a preview of his new home by a visit if possible, and let him pack a favorite toy in his suitcase.

—You can tell the school-age youngster about the move and reasons for making it. Let him select the color scheme for his room in the new house, in addition to arranging the furniture as he wishes.

—Don't try to erase all mem-

ories of the old home overnight. Let the ties be loosened gradually.

—Be tolerant of disturbing symptoms if they do occur and don't deny a child's need for extra attention.

—To older children, such activities as the Little League, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts are all-important affairs. Make every effort to insure a place for children in such organizations before you move to the new community.

—The preschool child probably is better off with a neighbor on the day the moving men arrive.

The Childhood Education Association booklet suggested:

—With a few dolls, a wagon and some empty boxes, the whole process of moving—packing, loading, taking off, eating on the way, unloading, unpacking, more eating—can be acted out again and again before the day arrives.

This conditioning was suggested for preschool children.

—Let there be no hurry about getting all the settling done. Stop for snacks frequently. If neighbors' children are on the fringes, invite them in for a share. Stop work occasionally for a walk to the nearby grocery, drugstore or postoffice, or for a short ride to see where Dad is working.

Mrs. Margaret Jacob, Malin, is on a trip to Mexico and South America. There are 12 women in the group with which she is traveling. She plans to return about May 15.

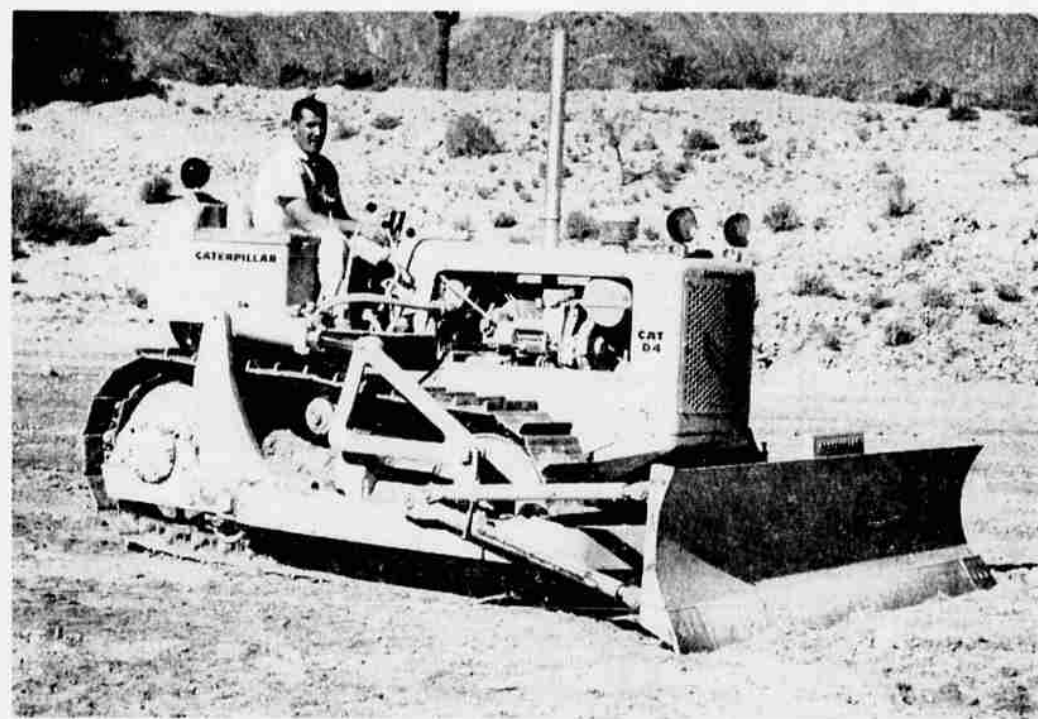
