Mrs. Thornton served as a member of the Tillamook County Library Board for several years before moving to Salem in 1932 when her husband became attorney general.

National Library Week brings attention to the need for a "Better informed, better-read America," with special emphasis in 1960 on teenage readers. The efforts of the State Sponsoring Committee will be directed to creating interest in reading and libraries through cooperation with the many local committees taking an active part in communities throughout Oregon.
