

Webfoot Award Winners Told; Pair Of KF Athletes Nominated

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special)—Coach Steve Belko has recommended nine members of his outstanding 1960 basketball squad for varsity awards and Coach Phil McHugh has named 11 members of the Duck freshman squad for numerical awards. It was announced here today by Athletic Director Leo Harris.

Four of the varsity forwards, Dale Herron and Stu Robertson, guard Chuck Rask and manager Franz Niekmann, were named for their third awards. Two Webfoots, guards Denny Strickland and Butch Kimpton, earned their second letters while four sophomores, forwards Charlie Warren and Bill Simmons and centers Glenn Moore and Wally Knecht, were recommended for the first time.

The Ducks finished the regular season with a 17-9 record and then went on to the NCAA's western regional play-off. In the opening round Oregon defeated New Mexico State, the Border Conference champion, and then staged a major upset in the semi-final round by easily defeating Utah, the Skyline Conference winner and ranked fifth in the national polls. In the finals the Ducks lost to California, the eventual runner-up in the NCAA tournament.

The overall season record of 19-10, plus the surprise march to the round of eight in the national NCAA playoffs, marked the high point in Belko's well planned rebuilding of Oregon basketball from its low point four years ago when he came here from Idaho State.

4 Defending Mat Champs Nail Easy 1st Round Wins

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Four defending champions scored easy first-round victories Wednesday in the National AAU wrestling championships at the San Francisco Olympic Club.

Bill Kerslake, Cleveland's 200-pound defending heavyweight champion, pinned Carlos Gammas of the University of Mexico in 1 minute, 37 seconds. Frank Rosenberg of San Francisco, king of the 191-pound class, pinned Bill Farrel of the New York Athletic Club in 7:26.

Other victorious defending champions were Fritz Fivian of Oregon State in the 160-pound class, and Jim Ferguson of the University of California in the 174-pound class.

Fivian pinned Jerry Ray of the San Francisco Olympic Club in 2:30, and Ferguson finished off fellow Olympic clubber Ken Kesey in 27 seconds.

Hallow Wilson, 384-pound out-pontier from San Diego, was out-pointed by Walter Golt, 235, of San Francisco. A.V. Cohen of San Francisco wrestled to a draw with Japanese heavyweight champion Kaoru Ichigoro.

The grapplers are competing under a "bad point" system by which a champion is decided. If a wrestler scores a fall, no points are scored against him. If he wins a decision, he is charged with one point. If he wrestles to a draw he accrues two points. Three points are charged for a loss by decision and four to those who lose by a fall. A wrestler is eliminated when he picks up six points.

CLEARWATER, Fla. (AP)—Now that Jim Owens has changed his mind about quitting the Philadelphia Phillies because of a \$100 fine for an after-curfew brawl, Manager Eddie Sawyer hopes to settle down and help hoist the club out of last place.

The 26-year-old right-hander is one of the most promising pitchers in the National League. He finished with a 12-12 record and a 3.22 earned run average last year in his first full season with the weak-hitting and fielding Phillies.

Angered over the fine against him for a barroom fracas with a busboy, Owens announced Wednesday he was quitting the team and going home to Gifford, Pa.

But he had a change of heart after a one hour conference with General Manager John Quinn.

"Mr. Quinn talked to me very nicely," Owens said, "and told me I'd be foolish to throw away a promising career. I guess I have to agree with him."

Quinn said, "I'm glad Jim's going to stay with us. He was mad but he's over it now."

Owens said what gripped him about the fine was that teammates Joe Koppe and Bobby Gene Smith, also involved in the March 5 altercation in a Clearwater bar, were assessed only \$100 each.

Phillies' Sawyer Toying With Inexperienced Lineup

CLEARWATER, Fla. (AP)—This is shakeup year for the Philadelphia Phillies. Manager Eddie Sawyer is toying with a lineup that would include only two of last year's regulars.

"We're going to go with the kids as much as possible," said Sawyer. "We got rid of a lot—Richie Ashburn, Willie Jones, Gene Freese, Ray Sempach, Chico Fernandez, Carl Sawatski. Most of the new players are kids, except for Alvin Dark. You need experience of the right kind in an infield."

One of Sawyer's key experiments has been using Panchito Herrera (.329 at Buffalo) at second base. Although he is 6-3, 225-pound converted first baseman, he hasn't been doing a bad job and is hitting over .400.

Eddie Bouchee (.285) is the first baseman. George Anderson (.218) would return to second. Joe Koppe (.261) at short and Dark (.264) at third will be the infield with Ted Lepore (.280 at Boston and Detroit) as a spare. Only Bouchee and Koppe were regulars last year with the Phils.

Bobby Del Greco (.236 at Buffalo), who has flunked previous trials with several clubs but still is only 26, may be the center fielder. Johnny Callison (.209 at Indianapolis), the Chicago White Sox's touted rookie of last year, might replace Harry Anderson (.240 in left, Wally Post (.254) is a third 1959 regular who may have his old job in right field but he has competition from Bobby Gene Smith (.291 at St. Louis), Dave Philley (.217 at Tony Curry (.314 at Williamsport).
