Stocks WALL STREET

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market closed lower today after a late selling wave upended a previously irregular pattern.

Trading was moderate most of the day, but picked up steam in the last half-hour and caused the tape to run late for a 14-minute spell.

Volume for the day was estimated at 2,500,000 shares compared with 2,450,000 shares Wednesday.

Texas Instruments was still ahead nearly 2, Philco better than a point and Motorola around a point. The glamor stocks, which also advanced Wednesday, appeared to have weathered earlier profit taking without trouble. Polaroid, however, saw around 7 of its big recent advances wiped away.

Steels, too, were mostly lower, although only by fractions.

U.S. government and corporate bonds advanced fractionally.

Lung Cancer Peril Told

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—An estimated 100,000 children now attending California schools eventually will die of lung cancer unless a cure for the dreaded disease is found, according to a state health authority.

Dr. Lester Breslow, Chief of the Bureau of Chronic Diseases for the California Department of Health, Wednesday reported the rate of lung cancer has been steadily increasing.

"Perhaps this statement may shock you, but it will illustrate my point," said Breslow. "There are in California today 100,000 school children who will die of lung cancer before their natural life span is completed unless we discover some method of arresting or curing the disease."

Native Of Klamath Falls Remembers Many Changes

The city and its suburbs have grown something like six times since then.

His going to grow a lot bigger, too, Harlan thinks. He sees a tremendous recreational potential in the area, a consequent population growth and a natural attendant influx of industry.

And it has grown for the better, he believes, but thinks there is room for improvement. The town is spreading out too haphazardly, and it needs people to fill in the open country between housing developments.

Harlan says it is nice to stay in one town for a lifetime. That way you get to know a lot of people intimately and to feel deeply rooted.

In his job as a postal clerk he meets thousands of people. He has worked at this post office since it was about a year old in 1936. During those early days with the post office, he clerked and did some substitute mail carrying.

Previously to that he worked for the First National Bank and before that, while in high school (both at the old county high school at Fifth and Washington Streets and at Klamath Union High School) he worked summers with his father in a mill the family owned near Bray in the mountains south of Dorris.

Now that the Harlans' two children, William Earl Harlan, and Mrs. Mary Molatore, are no longer at home, he has leisure time which he spends putting around in his workshop at the home he owns, and fishing and hunting.

His wife is a registered nurse, and she substitutes occasionally for other nurses in town. She used to work steadily in local hospitals and doctors' offices.
