Lady Bowlers Prep For Tournament

Klamath Falls' portion of the more than 20,000 women bowlers now active in the state of Oregon hit the high point of the league season next Thursday night when they begin the 29th annual Women's City Bowling Tournament.

Starting Thursday, April 7, with the first shift in the team events at 6:45 p.m., the tournament will continue through Sunday, April 10. Bowling fans are invited to attend as spectators.

City association secretary, Beth Griggs, who also serves as tournament director for the big four-day session, noted that league bowling, as usual, will be conducted on both Thursday and Friday nights. Tournament play will be at specified, non-interrupting times.

The tournament schedule as listed by Mrs. Griggs shows team events to continue Friday night at 6:45 and 9 o'clock.

Saturday afternoon both doubles and singles events will begin at 2 o'clock and continue at 7 p.m. with Sunday events scheduled to start again at 2 o'clock and 5 o'clock.

Entry blanks received by the association list competitors from 34 teams, to be divided into classes A, B and C.

Sixty one sets of doubles and singles entries, split into classes A, B, C, and D, have promised to show.

Among the 1959 champions back to defend their titles, there is only one team. Last year's Class B winner, which rolled under the sponsorship of "Anitas," is back as the "Basinettes." The team includes Audrey Herrick, Bessie Lillie, Donna Molatore, Pat Boston and Marge Robbin.

Other '59 winners back to place their crowns on the block include Mary Bothwell who protects both the scratch all-events and Class A singles titles; Gladys Bingham.

Class B singles winner, and Gloria Foster who owns the Class C singles title.

Class B doubles winners, Lavonne Kellow and Jean Coddington, and class D doubles winners, Barbara Cook and Peggy Rous, are also planning to compete in this year's action.

A pair of doubles entrants find one-half of the combinations back to defend. Class A doubles winner Bunny Addison is back with the help of new partner Marge Moseley. Marybee Butler has a new teammate, Eve Reynolds, who will help in the defense of the Class C Doubles title.

1959 Handicap All-Events winner Dorothy Branch will not return, according to tournament officials.

Only first-team repeater was hook-shooting Charles Sharp of national champion Southwest Texas College. He was high scorer and most valuable player of the 1960 small-college championship tournament here.

Teammate Rudy Davalos, six-foot senior guard, also was named to the first team.

Rickey Looks Toward 4th Big League

LANCASTER, Pa. (AP)—Even before Branch Rickey gets his Continental League into action, he's looking ahead to a fourth major league.

"I know of at least eight more cities ready to try for the league status," Rickey told the Lancaster Elks banquet gathering Thursday night. He did not name the cities.

"I think now the organization of a fourth league will be much easier than this battle the third league is experiencing because we will know then how to avoid roadblocks facing us today," Rickey added.

"The Continental League is not yet out of the woods but if baseball is killed my name will not be imprinted in its epitaph," the former St. Louis, Brooklyn and Pittsburgh general manager declared. Without mentioning any names Rickey, as he has done before, took a crack at the major leagues for "putting roadblocks in our way."

"I remember the birth of the American League," he recalled, "and the people who claimed it was impossible to form another league. They used the same excuses then—lack of players, lack of playing sites and numerous other complaints. But the American League came into being."

The Continental League plans to begin operations in 1961.

Oregon Tech track coach Wally Palmberg and a squad of nine Owl "Trackclads" leave the Mile High Campus at 5 o'clock Saturday morning for drier, much drier, it is hoped, and even perhaps greener pastures.

At 1:30 p.m. Saturday the Owls are scheduled for a three-way meet with the University of Nevada and Idaho State College, which is to be held on the Reno campus.

The starter's gun at Reno not only marks the OTI debut in regularly scheduled 1960 meets, it is also literally the first starting gun the majority of the Tech squad will have heard this season, even in practice.

While Klamath Falls was enjoying some beautiful spring weather just a short time ago, the Techmen missed out because the Oregon Collegiate Conference schools were taking spring vacation.

At the conclusion of the Thursday workout in the OTI gym, primarily calisthenics, Palmberg named the following to the travel roster: Leon Wilson, L. T. Tennerson, Harry Nelson, Harold Jackson, Norman Johnson, Norm Sawyer, Wendell Winterbottom, Laurence Hamilton and Larry Brown.

Wilson and Tennerson will compete in both the 100 and 220-yard dashes while a pair of freshmen, Winterbottom, from Grants Pass, and Hamilton, from Ashland, will go in the 440.

Norm Sawyer, a one year letterman at OTI is assigned the 880 while Brown, who placed fifth in the State B meet while at Athena, will take over in the mile run. Brown can also run the two-mile event, but will not do so at Reno.

The only other man on the list with previous college experience is Jackson, a one-year letterman who is to work in both the javelin and the broad jump.

The discus will be tossed by Johns, a freshman, who got away with a 158' heave in prep school at Pittsburg, California, for the county championship.

Nelson will vie in the pole vault. As a senior last season at Wy' East, he went 11' 10".

The Owls plan entrants in none of the other events listed on the program in Nevada although they expect to fill all the slots prior to entrance in the coming meet at Portland State College.

Duck Frosh Tracksters Set Saturday

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special)—A 16-man University of Oregon freshman track squad will open its 1960 season next Saturday at the Willamette Relays in Salem, head coach Bill Bowerman announced here Thursday.

The well balanced contingent will be led by Mike Murray, former Medford shot put ace, John Burns, Crater's fine javelin thrower and high jumper, Ron Sniedow, one of the nation's top prep discus throwers last year and a top football prospect from San Rafael, and three outstanding South Burnaby, B.C., stars, miler Vic Reeve, weight man Dave Steen, and sprinter Harry Jerome.

In addition to this group, the Ducklings will enter Reeve in the Statesman Mile team; Reeve, Clark Santee and Bob Goodenough in the distance medley, use the same foursome in the two-mile relay, use Jerome, Turner, Dustin Griffin and Don Peak in the 440-yard relay, and enter Jerome and Griffith in the open 100-yard dash.

In the field events Murray and Steen will be in the shot and Steen will double in the discus, along with Sniedow and Bill Keimbeck. Burns will handle the javelin alone and team with Bill Youngman in the high jump.

Filipinos, Latins Add Fight Vigor

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (AP) — Fighters from the Philippines and Latin America are injecting fresh vigor into the worldwide boxing program. And the rise of the foreign fighters comes at a time when the slumping sport sorely needs an assist.

Filipino Flash Elorde, Venezuela's Carlos Hernandez, Argentina's Eduardo (KO) Lausse and Federico Thompson and Cuban Benny (Kid) Paret are among the non-U.S. boxers who have added zest to the fight game in recent months.

Morales won the world junior lightweight—126-pound — championship by knocking out Harold Gomez of Providence, R.I.; Hernandez broke world featherweight champion Davey Moore's jaw and stopped the Springfield, Ohio, veteran in eight rounds; Thompson knocked out world welterweight champion Don Jordan and then fought a draw with Paret in a fierce 12-rounder, and Lausse stopped Willie Greaves, the Canadian champ, in four rounds.

For their upset victories, Elorde and Hernandez, unbeaten, 20-year-old puncher, were named to share the "boxer of the month" honors by the National Boxing Assn. Hernandez also was ranked second among the 126-pound contenders.

Of the 10 champions, 6 are from the United States, and one each from Sweden, the Philippines, Mexico and Argentina.

The U. S. champions include light heavyweight Archie Moore, middleweight Gene Fullmer — New York and Massachusetts recognize Paul Pender of Boston; welterweight Don Jordan, junior welterweight—140 pounds—Carlos Ortiz, lightweight Joe Brown and featherweight Davey Moore. The other rulers are heavyweight Ingemar Johansson of Sweden, junior lightweight Elorde, bantamweight Joe Beterra of Mexico and flyweight Pascual Perez of Argentina.

Klamath Archers Set Invitational Meet

The annual spring invitational archery tournament, sponsored by Klamath Archers, Inc., will be held on April 23 and 24. It is announced by Dick Hunt, president of the group.

Weather permitting, members of the archery club will work each weekend until April 23 to get the Moore Park archery range ready for the 100 archers expected to register for the shoot.

Archers from all over Oregon and Northern California are expected to participate.

Registration deadlines have been set at 11 a.m. on Saturday and the same hour on Sunday. Those who register on Saturday may start shooting whenever they desire on Sunday. Check-in time will be 3 p.m. on Sunday.

This will be a classified shoot with trophies for first and second place winners. Audrey Baxter and Esther Hodges head the trophy-making committee. In addition to

trophies for winners, "crooked arrows," made of manzanita, complete with feathers and tips, are planned for booby prizes.

Ed Sample, tournament chairman, reports that archers can register for Oregon Bow Hunters 20-pin at this tournament.

"A perfect score on any target, which means four arrows in the bull's eye at five points each, gives the shooter the required 20 points," Sample explained.

Target points will be used. There will be 28 field targets and 14 animal targets. There will also be several novelty shoots, including a balloon shoot, a ham shoot and others.

The Explorer Scout Troop of Ferguson School will have the refreshment concession on Sunday. There will be coffee and doughnuts available on Saturday too.

Registration fee for regular events will be \$1 for adults and 50 cents for juniors.

Duck Track, Field Squad Meet Favorite

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene (Special)—Oregon's powerful track and field squad, rated by many as possibly the best in the school's history, will be the favorites to win the third annual Northern Division Relays at Hayward Field Saturday.

Coach Bill Bowerman's crew, which has not been defeated in six years of Northern Division competition, has won the event both years it has been run and will depend on good balance throughout most of the events to win its third straight.

Oregon State, which made a strong showing in Arizona, is rated as the top contender for second spot while dark horse Washington State bolstered by a fine group of sophomores, and Washington offer stiff competition to

the Beavers. Idaho, in its first year under Coach Bill Sorshy, the former Oregon hurdler, has entered a full squad for the first time in several years and may cut in for some unexpected points.

Several of the individual events on the program, which gets underway at 1:30 p.m. after 10:30 a.m. trials in the 100, high hurdles and field events, are expected to feature excellent early season competition.

In the 100 Oregon's Roscoe Cook, co-holder of the world record, meets Amos Marsh of the Beavers, Don Maw of WSU and Bob Saunders of Washington along with Jim Puckett of the Ducks. The high hurdles rematch WSU's Spike Airt and Oregon's Dave Edstrom in another of the fine duals.

Dick Miller of the Ducks and Frank Wyatt and Ray Hutton of Idaho will be evenly matched in a strong two-mile field and the low hurdles rematch Edstrom and Airt.

The relay races, the 440, 800, mile distance medley and two-mile, will also produce some excellent teams with Oregon's distance medley crew of John Mack (440), Sig Ohlmann (800), George Larson (1320) and Doyol Burleson more than apt to break a record.

In the field events the javelin will feature a half dozen throwers over 220, led by WSU's Dick Rubens; the discus has Duck Jerry Stubblefield and Husky Tony Angell; the broad jump features USC's Darrell Horn, and the pole vault matches WSU's Wayne Wilson and Jack Fanning against Oregon's Phil Paquin.

LAKEVIEW (Special) — Jean Saubert, two-time holder of the national junior women's skiing championship, left Lakeview Tuesday for Sun Valley to compete in the 11 Western States competition on April 1, 2 and 3. This will be her final race in the junior division. She was accompanied on the trip by Mr. and Mrs. Don Lindsey of Lakeview.

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Saubert, Jean's parents, state that she has been invited to train next winter at Mammoth Mountain, near Bishop, California, with Dave McCoy, coach of seven of this year's Olympic skiers.

22 LIONS SIGNED DETROIT (UPI) — The Detroit Lions have raised their number of signed players to 22 for the 1960 National Football League season with the addition of Gene Cook, an offensive end from Toledo University, and Bobby Hudson, a defensive end from Louisiana Tech.

PORTLAND (AP) — A \$27,000 Portland Open Golf Tournament was announced today, to be held Sept. 20-25.

It will be the second consecutive year for Portland as a stop on the professional golfing circuit. Last year's tournament was a \$20,000 affair with Billy Casper of Apple Valley, Calif., the tournament winner.

There will be two days of professional-amateur play Sept. 20-21, then four days of professional play at Portland Golf Club.

The tournament will follow another Pacific Northwest tourney for the professionals, scheduled at Tacoma the previous week.

The Pittsburgh Pirates can field an all-Caribbean outfield—Roberto Clemente of Puerto Rico, Roman Mejias of Cuba and Joe Christopher of the Virgin Islands.
