

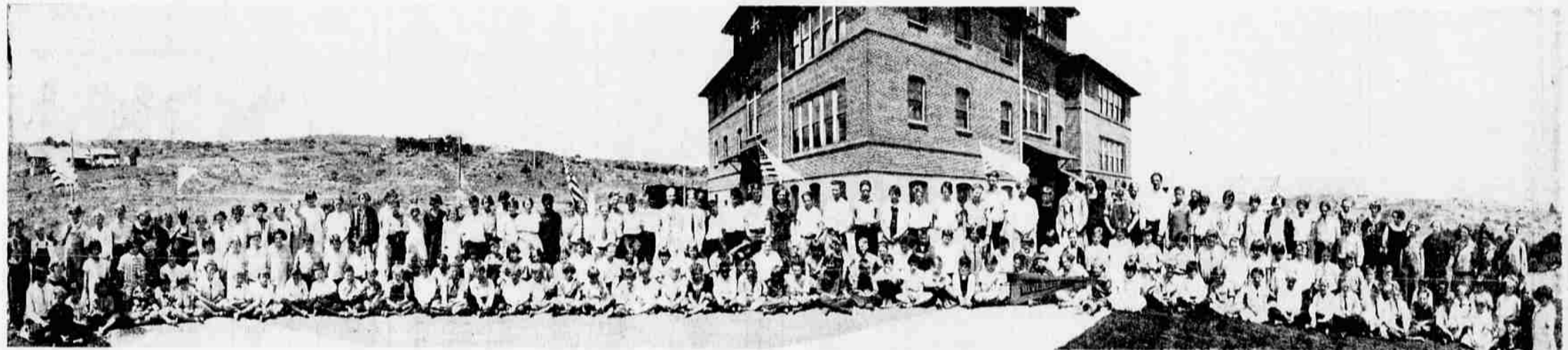

Ex-Riverside Schoolmates Meet After 42 Years

Time has a capricious streak in it, as two former Riverside School pupils can testify.

One, Paul Musgrove, owns a company with an annual gross income of \$100,000. The other, Maurice Crystal, works for him as sales manager of the Via Vita food supplement company's Oregon division.

Musgrove commands about 600 salesmen. They use the direct con-

tact sales method. To develop his products, Musgrove hired a chemist, Dr. Os-good Barnes, whom he calls one of the nation's top scientists. The chemical whiz is listed in "Who's Who in America," Musgrove says, and "The Book of Imminent Americans" and "The Book of Imminent Californians," 1957 issues.

The men met after 42 years during a New Year's Eve party of several hundred guests at Sacramento two years ago.

Of course they didn't recognize each other, but a guest pointed out Crystal to Musgrove, indicating that Crystal was formerly of Klamath Falls.

Much In Common
The men quickly found they had much in common. They attended Riverside School for a time together during 1915, 1916 and part of 1917.

Both were in the merchandising business—Musgrove with his fledgling business and Crystal a hardware and paint salesman. Crystal was anxious to change businesses. Musgrove offered him a job. He took it and was advanced to his present position in November.

Crystal lives with his wife, Nellie, at 1311 Division Street. They have a daughter, Mrs. Keith Nebecker, of Sacramento. The couple lived in Sacramento 16 years ago.

He moved here with his parents in 1910 when 8 years old. He attended Riverside School until 1917, was graduated, and attended the old county high school for a half-year.

Crystal worked for the old Klamath Hardware Company here as a salesman for some years, then entered the sheep business and later moved to California.

Musgrove's parents were nomads, since his father was a local forest ranger and held other fed-



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
