X-ray Plans Going Well

Arrangements for the Chest X-ray survey, which opens on April 27, are progressing satisfactorily to date, it was reported by the president, Mrs. Marjorie Conroy, at the March board meeting of the Klamath County TB and Health Association held Wednesday noon at the association office.

The community of Beatty has been added to the mobile unit itinerary for the convenience of residents in that area. Chest films will be taken there on Friday, May 6, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., after which the unit will proceed to a location in Bly where it will be in operation from 2:30 to 6 p.m.

The executive secretary, Mrs. Joy Rolph, who attended an institute for secretaries and volunteer workers in Portland last week, announced that the state board of the Oregon Tuberculosis and Health Association has gone on record for abolishment of the "Means" test, Senate Bill 391 passed by the last Legislature, which specifies mandatory and increased charges for patients' care in state institutions, including tuberculosis hospitals.

The board contends that care of TB patients is not charity or welfare but protection of public health from a communicable disease. All county associations are being alerted to take action against this "legislative mistake."

Mrs. Naomi Miller, vice president, and Mrs. Mae Speirs, county representative, were named as delegates to the OTBHA annual meeting at Portland on May 10 and 11.

The final report of the 1959 Christmas seal campaign was presented to the board. Of the total amount received, \$5,476.60, 74 per cent remains here for X-ray supplies at the health department, case-finding surveys, health education and the annual seal campaign.

DA Clarifies Position

District Attorney Arthur Beddoe said Klamath County is not directly involved in a motion filed by William Thomaston seeking release from the state penitentiary.

Thomaston, a 48-year-old contractor from San Jose, California, was charged with first degree murder in the rifle shooting of Mrs. Edith Atkins July 21, 1958. The shooting occurred at a party in the home of Thomas Atkins, one of Thomaston's employees.

Thomaston pleaded guilty to a lesser charge of second degree murder and was sentenced March 10, 1959, to life in prison.

A petition for writ of habeas corpus was filed this week before U.S. District Judge Gus J. Solomon in Portland on Thomaston's behalf. It seeks Thomaston's release on ground his guilty plea was forced because a first degree murder indictment against him still was on file.

The writ is styled against Clarence T. Gladden, warden of the state penitentiary, and claims violation of rights guaranteed under the federal constitution. For that reason, Beddoe said, Klamath County is not involved in the proceedings.

Cattlemen, Vet To Meet

TULELAKE—Dr. Don Mace, district veterinarian, California State Department of Agriculture, Redding, will meet with all cattlemen in the Tulelake farm adviser's office, Tulelake, at 8 p.m., Monday, April 4.

Mace will discuss the new and simpler brucellosis recertification plan made available for this area. This program may be carried out in two ways.

Briefly they are (1) by testing representative samples of range and semi-range cattle on ranches. This will involve 20 per cent of the herds in the county every three years, (2) As an alternate method, test cows at slaughter from each herd, which shall be a minimum of 15 per cent of the adult beef cattle population during a three-year period.

Dr. Mace will explain the necessary precautions to take in moving cattle back and forth from California and Oregon.

All cattlemen should attend this meeting and ask Dr. Mace to answer questions on brucellosis and cattle scab.

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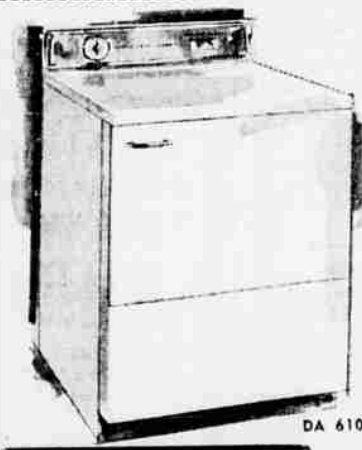
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
