Error Proves Win

Pel Horsehiders Split Twin Tilts

PRINEVILLE (Special) — The Klamath Union baseball team earned a split decision with the Prineville Cougars yesterday in a double header played here in which the Pels won the opener 4-3 and the Prineville nine came back in the nightcap to win 7-0.

The Pelicans combined timely hitting and flawless defensive play with expert pitching by Blake Griggs to topple the Cougars in the opener. Griggs was extremely stingy in giving up hits to the home diamonders allowing only four which were scattered effectively.

KU also got four hits, but two of them came on Griggs' two-out double in the top of the fifth to produce two big runs. The Pels had already scored a tally earlier in the evening.

Prineville refused to accept defeat when they came to bat in their half of the seventh and final inning. They nearly pulled the game out of the bag with three rallies, but with one out and men on second and first, Chucky Griggs settled down and got Cowboy Earl Snyder and Terry Hammond to fan.

With the game still scoreless, going into the top of the fifth stanza and one out, Dave Saks walked for the KU nine, followed by Sherman Allen's single, Bobby Yunc then loaded the bases by walking and Don Gresdel sacrificed Saks home by flying out to right field. With men on second and first the game was left in the hand of Griggs who calmly stroked a blazing line right down the left field line which turned up the chalk marks. Both Allen and Yunc scored and Griggs took second on the throw.

In the sixth inning Larry Bunyard opened by fanning and John Bianchi singled to left center. Bianchi then attempted to steal second, but the throw to second sacker Jim Dunaway of Prineville ended up in center and Bianchi kept on going to third. Dean Dunson then came up and grounded to shortstop Gene Brummer who let the ball skid through his legs for the Pel's fourth and final tally.

The Pel's only error came in the near fatal seventh frame when

Cowboy Jerry Cole hit a double play ball to Steve Binney at second. Binney scooped the horsehide up with perfection and tossed it wide to Bobby Yunc who was coming in from the shortstop post to make the play. The ball squirted out of Yunc's hand and the error was attributed to Binney.

In the second game the Pels, who were no real threat at the plate in the first game, but managed to bunch enough to win, fell further down and got only two bingles.

The game was going along beautifully with neither side scoring or committing any errors until the last half of the fourth when the Cougars accumulated seven runs on four hits and four errors. KU flinger Wally Palmberg had given up two harmless singles up to that time when both he and his teammates blew four pitchers in the fateful fourth to finally quell the Prineville team's thirst for runs.

Relieving Palmberg in order were John Webb, Pat Carney and Paul Bishop. Bishop eventually got the 13th batter of the inning to ground out second to first. In their half of the fifth and final frame, the Pels could do no better than fan thrice.

Marks Crumble In Oregon Relays; Soph 6-11

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Henry Wyborney, a Washington State University sophomore, high jumped 6 feet, 11 inches in the Northern Division relays here Saturday.

The deft performance by the unknown, 6-1, 180-pounder was the surprise of the meet, won by Oregon.

Wyborney, whose home is in Port Angeles, Wash., cleared 6-11 on his first try. But he failed in three attempts to go over the bar at 7 feet, one-quarter inch.

The world record in the high jump is 7 feet, 1 1/2 inches set by Y. Stepanov of Russia in 1957. John Thomas of Boston University last month soared 7 feet, 2 inches, but that has not yet been accepted as a record.

In all, Washington State picked up five firsts, the same number as Oregon. But Oregon picked up enough lower places to win the meet with 59 points. Washington State followed with 47. Oregon State had 46, Washington 28 and Idaho 15.

Oregon's best performance was by Dave Edstrom, a decathlon standout who is pointing toward the U.S. Olympic Team. Edstrom won both hurdle events, skimming over the highs in 14.1 seconds, and the lows in 23.8.

Edstrom also was second in the broad jump and fourth in the discus, winning a total of 28 points.

High Hurdle Mark Was a Record for This Meet

High hurdle mark was a record for this meet. In winning the high hurdles, Edstrom edged WSU's brilliant Spike Arlt, the winner of the event the past two years.

Other meet records fell in the discus, distance medley and two-mile relay. The discus winner was Don Martin of Oregon State, who had a toss of 157 feet, 6 1/2 inches.

Oregon took the two-mile relay, led by Dyrol Burleson, the sophomore who is one of the nation's fastest distance runners. Oregon also took the distance medley, with Burleson again leading the way.

Lakeview's Jean Saubert Ties For Seventh At Aspen

SUN VALLEY, Idaho (AP) —

Bill Marolt of Aspen, Colo., the winner of Friday's downhill, won the giant slalom Saturday in the Sun Valley-American Legion Junior ski championships.

His time down the 41-gate course was one minute, 31.8 seconds.

Miss Karen Korntana of Pine-dale, Wyo., and Sharon Peckaj of Aspen tied for first in the girls' giant slalom. Their time down the 32-gate course was 1:14.8. Miss Korntana won the downhill Friday.

The meet concludes with the slalom Sunday.

In state standings, the Washington boys team maintained its lead with 41.86 FIS points, Colorado stayed in second place with 50.14 while Idaho moved from fourth to third with 75.88 points.

For the girls, Colorado held onto a firm team lead with 6.40 FIS points, followed by Washington with 30.60 and Oregon with 35.42.

Second in the boys' giant slalom was Jack Morbeck of Seattle in 1:36.4. Morbeck was also second in the downhill.

J. D. Martin of Oklahoma set the lone record — a vault of 14 feet 10 1/2 inches — and it won him the award as outstanding athlete of the relays. The team award went to Houston which won two relays and lost another because of a disqualification.
