White and orchid stock and carnations set the color theme of the ceremony. They were arranged in tall beauty baskets, backed by ferns and lighted tapers in floor candelabra.

The bride is the daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Arthur Van De Zande of Oakridge. Mr. and Mrs. Greydon Broyles of this city are parents of the bridegroom.

The 7:30 service was performed by the bride's father, who also gave her in marriage. He was assisted by the Rev. Freeman Schmitt, pastor of the church, and the Rev. A. O. Broyles, retired, grandfather of the bridegroom.
