WALL STREET
 NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market closed irregular today as profits were taken on a rallying spurt by electronics, chemicals and selected issues.

Volume for the day was estimated at 2,500,000 shares compared with 2,250,000 Friday.

Changes of most key stocks were fractional.

A few blue chips made progress. Union Carbide gained about 2 points. Du Pont, Eastman Kodak and Air Reduction were more than a point higher.

Among electronics, Magnavox rose more than a point following news of higher earnings. Texas Instruments picked up a couple of points.

Steels, motors, nonferrous metals, tobacco and drugs were narrowly mixed. A slightly lower tone was displayed by rubbers, farm implements, aircrafts, oils and rails.

Juvenile Arrests Fill Weekend Police Blotter

City police jailed a youth, 17, for drunkenness Friday night. A 73-year-old Klamath Falls man reported subsequently that the youth had beaten him severely Thursday night because he ordered the youth out of his home.

The man declined to sign a complaint against his assailant because he says he is afraid of him. Both his eyes were swollen nearly shut. His nose appeared to be broken and his face and arms were bruised, officers said.

He told police the youth had forced his way into the home several times in the past. Friends who were caring for the man said the youth frequently used foul and abusive language around them and their children.

Two men, Zelda Sargeant and Carl Lloyd Brown, were with the youth, officers said, and were charged with drunkenness.

Mall Plans To Be Aired

Downtown Klamath Falls merchants have invited Lloyd Anderson of the University of Oregon Bureau of Municipal Research and Service to discuss a downtown mall during a meeting of the Klamath Merchants Association Wednesday at 6:30 p.m. in the Winema Hotel.

The mall project would be distinct from the current merchants' drive to provide downtown parking facilities.

Local merchants are considering ways and means to keep the shopping district healthy. Modern transportation and suburban life have given birth to widespread shopping areas in many cities, tending to reduce the potency of some traditional downtown areas.

The mall idea has been tried most notably in Kalamazoo, Michigan, and Toledo, Ohio, and on a smaller scale in Springfield, Oregon.

The theory is to restrict automobile traffic in the downtown area, to give shopping pedestrians free play from one side of the street to the other without danger of being run down by cars.

It also generally includes spruced-up store fronts, "standardized" shop signs and street beautification, such as mid-street vegetation and street furniture, says David DeVoe, city planner.

This all generates a better, more convenient, commercial atmosphere, DeVoe said.

Usually, the mall has a low- or no-traffic central core surrounded by a "traffic ring" feeding automobiles to parking areas or shunting them around the core.

Anderson will have slide photographs of Kalamazoo and Toledo projects to show. He has been working closely with the merchants on other plans.

One major problem Klamath Falls merchants will have to work out, said Mayor Lawrence Slater recently, is the lack of willingness by the state highway department to allow downtown traffic to be rerouted. Slater said the state controls Main Street and Klamath Avenue.

Anderson is expected to discuss that problem and others and point out possible solutions.

County Starts Budget Meets

The County Budget Committee began today the involved annual task of preparing next year's county budget.

Deliberations and interviews are expected to last about six weeks, after which a public hearing will be held for final budget consideration.

The end result will determine in large measure the county's tax bills of next fall.

Members of the committee are R. P. Ellingson, chairman; Lester Offield, Bill Falvey of Bonanza, and the three members of the county court. Sitting with them today was Mrs. Dorothy Rogers, budget representative from the county clerk's office.

Heads of all county departments already have submitted budget proposals and requests for consideration. These will be considered both individually and as a whole before the over-all budget is finally reached.
