## NW Lawyer Leads Drive

Allan Hart, Portland attorney, will be chairman of Maurice Neuberger's state-wide senatorial election committee, it was announced today from Mrs. Neuberger's campaign office in Portland.

Mrs. Neuberger is a candidate for the Senate seat of her late husband, Senator Richard L. Neuberger, who died in Portland March 9. Supreme Court Justice Hall S. Lusk was appointed by Gov. Mark Hatfield to Senator Neuberger's unexpired term until the general election.

Hart, a former first vice president and governor of the City Club of Portland, has been active in civic affairs and is now a member of the State Board of Higher Education. From 1940 to 1942 he served as general counsel of the Bonneville Power Administration.

"I am delighted that Allan Hart will head my campaign," Mrs. Neuberger said today. "He has a distinguished record of service to Portland and Oregon and I am proud of his confidence in me."

Heading Mrs. Neuberger's election committee in addition to Hart are McDannell Brown, Portland attorney, treasurer, and Hans A. Linde of the University of Oregon Law School faculty, secretary. Brown was treasurer of the late senator's successful 1954 campaign and was serving in that capacity at the time of the senator's death. Linde, until he accepted the University of Oregon post a year ago, was legislative assistant to Senator Neuberger.

Prior to his death, Senator Neuberger opened a staffed campaign office in the Portland Trust Building, which Mrs. Neuberger said she would maintain as her campaign headquarters.
