Guilty Plea Is Received

PORTLAND (AP) — A man changed his mind Tuesday and pleaded guilty to a charge of taking part in the bombings of 10 trucks that headed for Portland's two struck daily newspapers.

Gerald A. Couzens, 29, Portland, entered the plea of guilty to a charge of damage to property by explosives.

Couzens earlier had pleaded innocent to the charge after it had been returned against him by a county grand jury.

When Couzens went into court Tuesday, he was asked by Circuit Judge Herbert Schwab if he understood the meaning of a plea of guilty.

Couzens replied: "It means I took part in this crime."

The judge ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Four other persons also have been charged with taking part in the Jan. 31 bombings, in which four trucks were blasted here and six others were dynamited in Oregon City.

Levi S. McDonald of Portland, a member of the striking Stereotypers Union, has been accused of plotting the bombings. He has denied the charge and has pleaded innocent.

Innocent pleas also have been entered by three brothers, Charles, Edward and William Snyder.

The trucks that were dynamited hauled for the Oregonian and Oregon Journal, which have been struck nearly five months.
