## Sen. Morse Returns Home For Presidential Drive

Sen. Wayne L. Morse returns to Oregon Friday to open his first concentrated campaign effort for the May 20 Democratic presidential preference primary.

Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts and Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota, the two front-runners nationally, are expected to reopen their Oregon campaigns now that the Wisconsin campaign has ended in today's election.

Kennedy has already set several appearances later this month. Humphrey is still to do so.

Presumably the results of the Wisconsin primary will have a bearing on the Democratic presidential aspirants' plans.

Oregon's Sen. Morse will oppose Humphrey in the May 3 District of Columbia primary and Kennedy in the Maryland May 17 primary. All three—along with Sen. Stuart Symington of Missouri and Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas—will meet in Oregon's primary.

Morse will speak in Portland Friday evening under sponsorship of the Oregon Veterans for Morse Committee, then will follow that up with this schedule which still is to be added to on some days: Saturday at The Dalles for the day and a dinner; Sunday a dinner talk at Baker; Monday La Grande with appearance at Eastern Oregon College tentative; Tuesday at Portland State College at 11 a.m. and Central Lane Labor Council at Eugene in evening; Wednesday, luncheon at Florence; Thursday, 8 p.m. rally at Hood River armory.

Morse will return again in the week of April 24, on May 7 and again May 18 to 20.

Kennedy's first return since his February visit here will be April 22 for four days. He will be in Clackamas County the first day, then in Medford for the Pear Blossom Parade the next day and in the Portland area the following two days with a side excursion to Astoria for a luncheon on April 25, last day of his tour. He expects to spend from May 15 to the election in the state as well.

## Tutor Admits Double Life

LEE, Mass. (AP)—For seven months high school teacher Joseph R. Dischino, an admitted bigamist, kept two wives and four children in homes eight miles apart.

The secret double life of the respected civics instructor, exposed through an anonymous tip sent to Police Chief William R. Obanheim of Stockbridge, stunned this western Massachusetts community and cost Dischino his job.

The wives also were stunned, Obanheim said.

In Lee District Court Saturday, Dischino pleaded guilty to bigamy and was held in \$700 bail for disposition Wednesday.

Dischino, 35 years on the high school faculty, is 37, short, dark and stocky, he is a mild mannered man who wears glasses.

Obanheim said Dischino divided his nights between the two homes and used a part-time job at a South Lee resort to explain his absences.

The teacher married the first Mrs. Dischino, Mary, 15 years ago at Wellesley. They had three children ranging in age from 3 1/2 to 9.

The second wife, Obanheim said, was Margaret Burnhop of Waterbury, Conn., whom Dischino married July 20, 1958 at Elkton, Md. She remained in Connecticut until after a child was born last September, the chief said.

Then she moved to Stockbridge, adjoining Lee, where the first Mrs. Dischino resides.

## Actor, Friend Seek Return Of Investment

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Actor Jean J. Gauthier, 68, and his friend Maurice Bernard, 56, were told the gold was rich enough to stick to your shoes around Paradise, Calif.—only it turned out to be pyrite (fool's gold).

Gauthier and Bernard, a retired travel agent, claimed in court Monday that they invested \$8,100 each with Marcel Schmidt to dig out what they were told was a productive gold mine in the desert community.

They said they turned over the money to Schmidt in 1955 on his statement that the mine contained valuable gold deposits. When they learned differently, they sought unsuccessfully to recover their money, they said.

Schmidt said his dealings with the men were in good faith. The two men sought in addition to their investments \$50,000 in exemplary damages. Superior Judge George A. Dockweiler took the case under submission.

## Tiros Snaps Russian Pics

WASHINGTON (UPI)—America's Tiros I satellite, circling the earth every 99 minutes with its pair of television cameras, has photographed weather conditions over Russia and Communist China.

A spokesman for the national Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) disclosed Sunday night that the photographs covered Red China and the southern part of the Soviet Union.

The spokesman did not say when the photographs were taken. The satellite, launched from Cape Canaveral, Fla., Friday, made its first pass over the two Communist nations about 12 hours later.

Scientists in charge of the Tiros project reported that they were very encouraged by the performance of the 270-pound meteorological satellite in its orbit about 440 miles above the earth.

Doctor Abe Silverstein, NASA's director of space flights, told a New York news conference that weather satellites may some day help prevent heavy loss of life in hurricanes and typhoons by providing advance warning when violent storms are developing.

## MINERS HONOR KHRUSHCHEV

MOSCOW (UPI)—Premier Nikita Khrushchev, who was a miner in the Ukraine before the Bolshevik revolution, has won the highest award of the Soviet Mine Workers Union, Tass said today.

The Soviet news agency said Khrushchev received the "Miners Glory" badge of the first degree, and a citation "for his efficient activity in building trade unions and tremendous services in developing the coal mining industry of the Soviet Union."
