Maurine Gives Talk On Cancer

NEW YORK — More people should talk more often about cancer, Maurine Neuberger, wife of the late Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.), recently told a luncheon meeting of volunteers for the New York City Cancer Committee.

"Education is essential for increased detection and greater financial support to combat cancer," Mrs. Neuberger, Democratic candidate for election to her husband's Senate seat, said. "This is everyone's fight. Cancer will kill 25 million of us unless new treatments and cures are found."

Senator Neuberger died March 9 in Portland, Oregon, following a cerebral hemorrhage. He was operated on for cancer in 1958. He was nationally known, both before and after contracting the disease, for his speeches and articles urging expanded expenditures for cancer research. In 1957, he first advocated a "crash program" of research in cancer.

"After his operation, Dick frequently said, 'I always thought it would happen to the other guy, but not to me.'" Mrs. Neuberger related. "By his writings and his work in the Senate he dramatized the fact that cancer is an ominous and omnipresent threat to us all."

"In one year cancer claimed nearly 10 times the number of Americans who perished in three years of fighting in Korea. The battle against cancer is a 'hot war.' It must be fought with the same intensity that is engendered by a conflict of arms."

Mrs. Neuberger praised the work of Dr. George N. Papanicolaou in developing the smear technique for detection of uterine cancer in women. Dr. Papanicolaou was presented with the Clement Cleveland Award for his contribution to cancer research at the luncheon at the Astor Hotel.

Carpenter Given Fete; Retires

KLAMATH AGENCY—Cyril R. Schiffbauer, 65, for the past ten years employed as carpenter for the Bureau of Indian Affairs here, was feted by fellow employees recently in honor of his retirement from 19 years of federal service.

Schiffbauer, member of the Seneca Indian Tribe, began his civil service career at the Bureau of Indian Affairs school in Wyandotte, Oklahoma, in 1917 where he worked on the school farm until 1923.

He moved to Chiloquin in 1931, making that community his permanent home where he and his wife, Ethel, who is also retired from federal service, still reside. From 1933 to 1948 he worked intermittently for the government at the Klamath Indian Agency until his permanent position as carpenter was established in May of 1950.

Meeting Set On Minerals

Bureau Sets Bid Opening

The Bureau of Reclamation will open bids May 17 for construction of about four miles of canal, three miles of drain and related structures in the Sump 2 area seven miles southwest of Tulelake. The planned construction is a second segment of a four-year program to improve irrigation and drainage on 17,000 acres of Tule Lake bottom lands. The land previously was reclaimed by the Klamath federal reclamation project by diking and diversion and pumping of inflow from Lost River. The soil there is among the Basin's most productive, bureau men say. The land is owned by the federal government. It is served by the Tulelake Irrigation District. The land is rented to farmers.
