Basin Prospects

Slim Turnout Hits New Mustang Track

Things are pretty rough in the Basin sports world. Especially for the Bob Graham coached track squad.

It was yesterday when the track squad inaugurated their new track which was just completed. Prior to that the track squad—15 men strong—held workouts inside the gymnasium.

Another problem confronting the cinderburners is personnel. A 15-man track squad in the county is not too bad, but when three of the top performers happen to share their services with the baseball team, things get mighty confused.

With or without the co-sport athletes, the Mustangs began their 1960 season at Lakeview in the Lakeview Invitational track meet on Saturday, April 16. Chiloquin High School is also attending the meet along with numerous schools from the A-2 district which Lakeview is in and several California high school track clubs.

The Mustang speedsters have several other dates which tend to highlight the season. On April 26 the team travels to Klamath Union to compete in the KU Invitational and on April 30 they are hosts to a four-way meet including Tulelake, Merrill and Bonanza. Next comes the county meet on May 7 and the district meet May 14 at Ashland. The athletes who qualify in the district then proceed to the state tournament held May 21.

Since that team has been without a track up until yesterday, no times or distances have been made yet. Graham says that this year is a "complete rebuilding job."

ers Ron Mullenix and Don Johnson. Rick Illian, who pitches and catches for the horsehiders, alternates his free time running the 440 and throwing the javelin. In the 100- and 220-yard sprints, Graham has a real speedster in Lee Bailey.

In the distance sprints, the 440 and 880, are Illian and Bob Bush in the quarter mile and Dave DeMerritt and Jerry Micka in the half mile.

In the field events the Mustangs may be strong. They have Bailey in the broad jump and Larry Rick and Gary Halonsek in the high jump. In the javelin is Bob Steyskal, Rick and Illian. Mullenix heaves the 12-pound shot.

Sophomore Dick Clark races in the high hurdles event, but the Mustangs have yet to field a low hurdler.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Gale Kerwin's ability and Jay Fullmer's fitful aggressiveness got the two welterweights a draw in a 10-rounder at a beach front hotel ballroom Wednesday night.

Kerwin, 142½, from Ottawa, Canada, and Valley Stream, N.Y., and Fullmer, 139, of West Jordan, Utah, did little mixing before the seventh round. Their most hectic action began halfway through round 10. There were no knockdowns in the nationally televised fight.

Ted Remains As Question

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP)—Ted Williams still is looking for the answer to the question everyone is asking—can a throbbing neck and aging bones carry him through another season as a Boston Red Sox regular?

"The neck is neither better nor worse," the 41-year-old slugger said today. "I still don't know what I'm going to do this year." If hard work will prolong the major league career of the colorful Williams who will mark his 21st season next month, Ted could hang up his "business as usual" shingle in left field right now.

But the neck ailment, which dragged Williams from the lofty heights of American League batting championships in 1957 (.343) and '58 (.320) to 254 last season, persists. Ted currently is hitting .230 after appearing in 14 of Boston's 21 exhibition games. And his age is plaguing him in the form of the worst weight problem he's ever faced.

But more than 10,000 persons sent in 600 names for the new club and it seems that most of them wanted to tie in Sota's name with the team.

One suggested "Sota Crackers." Another thought "Sota Jerks." It is probable that any of these would have proved more popular than "Senors." The press and the public so far has roundly criticized the name.

"Just wait until they lose a couple of games," wrote one columnist, "then they'll be calling them 'Senoritas.'"

Some of the fans apparently already had that in mind and were away ahead of the writers.

One suggested the club be called the "Amazons"—which means large women.
