Chiloquin Boxers Set For Tourney

CHILOQUIN (Special)—A team of 10 Chiloquin fighters and one from Klamath Falls leaves today for the Southern Oregon Golden Gloves tournament which starts Friday evening and lasts until late Saturday evening at Coos Bay.

Lou Jones, Chiloquin chief of police and trainer of the fighters who box under the team name of the Chiloquin Boys Club, said that more than 20 fighters will be represented throughout all of Southern Oregon in the tourney.

The Klamath Falls entry, Jake Gregg, is pitted as a strong favorite to win his 119-pound weight division. Gregg was edged out in the Portland Golden Gloves tournament earlier this year in the semifinals by two points.

The Chiloquin boxers who represent the team are all strong and experienced. Jones has high expectations for the club in total team standings at the Coos Bay tourney. Jones said that besides Gregg, Ron Hoggarth in the 168-pound division and Ray DeBortoli at 80 pounds should come home with championships.

The other fighters from Chiloquin are Lee Chase at 100 pounds; 147-pounder Al DeBortoli; 112-pounder Rich Starkey; Randy Jones, 60 pounds; Leon Weeks, 150 pounds; Ken Schoonover, 70 pounds; Don Taylor, 122 pounds; and Bobby Bajarca, 172 pounds.

Jones will not know who the opponents will be until Friday afternoon when the listings are drawn and the fight schedule is set up.

Two trophies are awarded at the tourney. The Golden Boy trophy goes to the most outstanding fighter based on sportsmanship, ability and class. The team trophy goes to the club which cops highest team total points.

For the Chiloquin sparrers this is their big match of the year. They have been in training for it for two months. Earlier this year the team had matches with Burns twice, Klamath Falls twice, Sprague River once and the one trip to Portland in the state Golden Gloves tourney.

Al DeBortoli will perhaps meet one of the more rugged fighters in the tourney when he confronts Bobby Horn from Eugene who was runner-up in the 147-pound welterweight division last year.

The Chiloquin club winds up its fight program April 23 in the Klamath Falls auditorium. The fights which are sponsored by the Oregon Tech Owl Hoods will have boxers from Klamath Falls, O.T.I., Sprague River and Chiloquin.

Trades Look Good For AL Contenders

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS The Chicago White Sox traded for Gene Freese and Minnie Minoso in a bid to retain the American League pennant. The New York Yankees acquired Roger Maris in a move to regain the AL title. The Cleveland Indians dealt for Bubba Phillips and bought Bob Hale to try and win that same championship.

And brother, those winter deals looked good Wednesday in spring training games. Here's what happened as the White Sox, Indians and Yankees (they finished in that order in 1959) turned in close exhibition victories.

Freese and Minoso had two of the three hits that produced the White Sox' runs in a 2-0 victory over the Detroit Tigers at Saratoga.

Maris had four hits, including the game-breaker in the Yankees 11th-inning rally that nipped the Baltimore Orioles 4-3 at St. Petersburg.

Hale delivered a bases-loaded double and Phillips walked to force in the winning run as the Indians scored four times in the ninth and defeated the Chicago Cubs 10-9 at Tucson.

The White Sox acquired third baseman Freese from the Philadelphia Phillies during the inter-league trading period. Freese, who had 23 homers last season, is expected to add power to the Sox' infield.

Minoso came to the White Sox in part of the same deal that sent Phillips to Cleveland. The White Sox wanted home run and RBI strength in left field. The Indians needed an established third baseman.

Maris was the key man in the most recent multiplayer deal with Kansas City.

The Indians bought Hale, a former Baltimore first baseman, for reserve and pinch-hitting strength. In other games Wednesday, the

Sam Playing On Rampage In Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—Sam Snead and the 20-year-old U.S. amateur champion, Jackie Nicklaus, rode the hottest streaks into today's opening round of the 24th Masters Golf Tournament.

A field of 84-87 professionals and 17 amateurs — starts the four-day, 72-hole test over the Augusta National course.

Snead warmed up for a go at his fourth Masters title by winning an inaugural preliminary tournament on a rampage.

Nicklaus, from Columbus, Ohio, racked the game's elite with a brilliant final practice round of 66, six under par. He bulled his way over the massive, 6,650-yard course as if it were a playground and announced afterward: "I'm not here for the amateur prize—I want to win the tournament."

For those who try to handicap a golf tournament the way they would a horse race, Snead and Nicklaus are high in favor.

Arnold Palmer is the advance favorite at odds of 6-1. The year's leading money winner with \$26,000-plus and four tournament victories on his belt, the young, ball-like pro from Ligonier, Pa., is the solid pick of most players and spectators.

Behind Palmer in favoritism is Ken Venturi, the popular San Francisco youngster who has been a sentimental choice since he let the Masters crown slip away in 1956. Venturi is an 8-1 bet, followed by Snead and Cary Middlecoff, the latter experimenting with a new driver.

Ben Hogan and Mike Souchak are bracketed at 12-1, followed by Dow Finsterwald and South Africa's Gary Player at 15-1.

CHICO (Special)—The five game baseball road trip that the Oregon Tech Owls are taking this week is turning into a free-way which is building character, experience and sportsmanship. As far as winning is concerned, the Owls baseball team is having a rugged time.

Yesterday the Owls traveled to Chico State to play the Wildcats in a seven inning tilt beginning at 3 o'clock. By 3:45 the game was finally over and the Owls found themselves sitting on the tail end of a 2-1 score.

Tuesday the Tech men lost a doubleheader to the Shasta Junior College Bears, and today they play perhaps the most rugged junior college baseball team in California, the American River JC diamond club.

The Miners have won their JC conference title for the past three years, but this year they stand at four wins and two losses in league action. Yet the Miners remain a tough team to beat no matter how one looks at it.

Owls Take Lead The Jim Cordial coached Owls started the Chico game by pushing across a run in the first inning. Lead-off hitter Charlie Wilson struck out and Ardel Hamilton garnered a base on balls.

Oscar Sets 14 Records

NEW YORK (AP)—Cincinnati's fabulous All America Oscar Robertson, leading a trend toward more offense in basketball, closed out his college career with 14 individual records including the college's all-time major scorer.

Larry Foust, the Hawks veteran 6-foot-9, 250-pound reserve center, suffered a break in one of the small bones of his left hand in Boston's 127-102 victory Tuesday night in Boston. Foust is wearing a cast and—if he is able to play at all—will be badly handicapped in shooting and rebounding. Rookie Bob Ferry will get a chance in his place.

With Boston's great backcourt wizard, Bob Cousy, back in top form, Foust injured and Hawk star Bob Pettit still bothered by a back injury, the outlook isn't bright for St. Louis.

But there is quiet confidence, something akin to dedication, in the Hawk camp. One reason might be that club veterans haven't forgotten the Hawk's ability to pull out the close ones in past series with Boston.

Canadiens Still Best

MONTREAL (AP)—The defending Stanley Cup champion Montreal Canadiens remain a solid 12-5 favorite to win their fifth straight cup as they open the best-of-seven final series with the Toronto Maple Leafs at the Forum tonight.

However, Toronto Coach Punch Imlach would not concede defeat. "I think we can gain at least a split here and then, with the next two games in Toronto, we should be in excellent position to move out in front and stay there," Imlach said.

The second game will be here Saturday night with the third and fourth next week in Toronto. Montreal beat Toronto in five games last year for a record-setting fourth straight cup.
