The Owls complete their five-game trip this afternoon in a single encounter with McClellan Air Force Base of Sacramento. The Flyers have yet to win a ball game, having dropped three tilts so far this season.

Owl coach Jim Cordial was pleased with his club's showing even though they dropped game No. 4 in four starts.

Cinders Set For Medford League Meet

After a two week rest, the Klamath Union track team travels tomorrow to Medford to compete in the annual Rogue Valley Relays with all teams in the Southern Oregon Conference and Marshfield, Springfield and Roseburg being represented.

It is the biggest meet of the year prior to the District Meet being hosted by Medford on May 21. The Rogue Valleys are starting at 1:30 tomorrow.

KU track mentor Jim Inglesby plans to send a strong delegation of athletes to the meet in hopes of improving upon their showings at the Springfield-South Eugene three-way meet March 26 when they finished third.

The Pel cindersmen are basically supported by a large sophomore and junior crew. However one of the few seniors on the team, Allan Phillips, is bound to pick up a few points in the javelin, broad jump and perhaps the low hurdles. Phillips has already surpassed 100 feet in the javelin during practice sessions this week. However a first place victory in the event will be a sweet surprise for the Pels since Crater owns the league champ in that department.

In the sprint Inglesby plans to send Dave Stippich, Jim Parks and Don Simpson in the 100 yard dash and Charles Richey, Ken Lewis and Stippich in the 220.

The Pels may pick up some valuable points in the broad jump, shot and 120 high hurdles. In those departments are Phillips and Rod Sparlin in the broad jump, Les Husted and Bill Santo in the shot and Dale Stites and Santo in the high jump. Santo is a real comer and has the potential to place in the relays.

In the quarter and half mile the Pels have five hopeful entries. John Rugey, Bill Albert and Ken Lewis are running the 440 and Eric Petersen and Harlan Hammacker run the 800. Hammacker the freshmen school record in the 600 and, although a sophomore, he will be tough to beat in the relays.

In the other running event, the mile, the Pels have Bill Sprout, Jack Mitchell and Dean Metcalf. Sprout took third in the mile at Springfield.

The horsehidors, who stand at one win and three losses for the season, run into rugged opposition tomorrow as far as pitching is concerned. If the Cavemen play havoc on the Pelican mound here today, Pel coach Bill Mansfield will be needing some added punch to his batting order Saturday.

So far this season the KU nine has hit at a .233 clip. The team has a total of 26 hits with Sherrin Allen, John Bianchi, Dean Dunson and Dave Saks getting 15 of them. Only 13 runs-batted-in have been accounted, and the team in its first four outings lacked the crucial blow with men on base. Only three hits have gone for extra bases.

The Pel squad depends heavily on its pitching and fielding where the team is strong. The pitching staff is led by Blake Griggs with ample relief strength from Kent Hunsaker, Denny Colman, John Webb, Marvin Edwards, Paul Bishop, Pat Carney and Wally Palmberg.

Yreka fields a strong hitting club with at least one excellent pitcher on the squad. Hurler Jim Brooks opened the Miners' 1960 season with a sweet three-hit victory over Ashland, 5-1. Brooks struck out 12 and didn't walk a batter.

Two Rookies Spark Giants, Senators

Each homered twice Thursday as the Giants and Senators won spring training games. And it may not be too long before their names turn up frequently in major league baseball boxscores. Both spent last season with Class A minor league teams.

The Giants, who defeated the Boston Red Sox 4-2 at Phoenix, already have a solid starting outfield in Orlando Cepeda, Willie Mays and Willie Kirkland.

The Senators, who whipped Kansas City 10-5 at Orlando, have a definite need for first baseman Mincher. When they sent Roy Sievers to the Chicago White Sox for Earl Battey, Mincher and \$150,000, Julio Becquer, a pesky but light hitter, inherited the first base job.

Alou, square name Mafede, is on the roster of the Rio Grande Valley Giants in the Texas League and probably will be sent down. But only Kirkland among the Giants' regular outfielders bats slugged, and an injury to, or slump by, Kirkland could give Matty a break.

Matty's second consecutive homer Thursday capped a three-run giant that made a winner of Giant starter Mike McCormick. Both were off Tom Brewer.

Mincher batted in five runs with a two-run blast off A's starter John Tsitouris and a three-run shot off Bob Trowbridge. Allison also homered for the Senators.

In other games, Milwaukee defeated Cincinnati 7-5 at Columbia, S.C.; Baltimore beat Pittsburgh 9-8 at Fort Myers; New York on the shelf with an ailing back.

Hawks Use Guts, Drive And Triumph

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP)—"They're even to get the loser Saturday," owner Ben Kerner says of his St. Louis Hawks. "This is the greatest display of guts I've ever seen."

For the fourth time in two weeks, the Hawks rallied to win with their backs to the wall Thursday night, squaring pro basketball's world series at 3-3 with a 105-102 victory over Boston's defending champs.

"They have (Larry) Foust out of action with an injury after playing on an injured heel, (Bob) Jack McMahon and Dugie Martin out of the entire series," Kerner said. "Yet they keep coming back."

The winning team in the National Basketball Assn. title series gets \$7,000 from the league treasury, the loser \$11,000. Including their winnings for their regular season finish and for the division playoffs, the Celtics can win as much as \$36,000, the Hawks \$34,000 in prize money—because Boston had the best regular season record.

If the Hawks lose, Kerner will have to pay the \$6,000 difference out of his own pocket. But he says it'll be worth it.

The Celtics were quiet but confident they can win the title game on their home court.

"The worm will turn in Boston," said Tom Heinsohn.

"We're going to be all right, you'll see," said Frank Ramsey.

Canuks Take Hockey Lead

MONTREAL (AP) — Montreal Coach Toe Blake is far from confident his Canadiens will go on and win their fifth straight Stanley Cup after taking a 1-0 lead in the best-of-seven final series against Toronto.

The Canadiens scored three times in the first period Thursday night and made the goals stand up for a 4-2 victory in the National Hockey League's world series.

"They're going to be tough," Blake said after the game.

Blake thought his players tired after the Leafs closed the gap to 3-2 with two seconds left goals. Henri Richard got the last Montreal goal in the final period after getting an assist on each of the first period scores.
