

Game Group Discusses Hen Shoot

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — A proposal to allow pheasant hunters to shoot one hen among a 10-bird limit today took top interest at a meeting of the state Fish and Game Commission.

In a meeting to hear Fish and Game Department recommendations for this year's hunting seasons, the commission was expected to hear both opposition and support for the hen pheasant proposal.

All other major regulations were made virtually unchanged in the department's recommendations made public a month ago.

The commission heard a recommendation Thursday by the department the state's pheasant management policy be changed to eliminate the department's put and take pheasant program entirely in Northern California while keeping it in the southern part of the state.

In a revised pheasant management policy — at least the third such policy proposed for adoption — the department said cutting back would save at least \$120,000 a year.

State Furnishes Pheasants
A key feature of the policy was furnishing state-raised birds for put and take shooting only in Southern California after 1963 but Director Walter Shannon went even further.

Shannon said that he hoped public opinion eventually would lead the department to consolidate its pheasant growing program for Southern California into one farm at the California Institution for Men at Chino, thus saving an additional \$40,000. The state now operates three farms in the area.

California furnishes about 10 percent of the state-wide pheasant bag through its game farms while the other 90 percent comes from wild pheasants.

Raise Exotic Birds
Another proposal was to operate the Yountville game farm only for production of 25,000 day-old and month-old chicks after 1963 and provide these birds to groups who want to raise them at their own expense.

The state would continue to rear other exotic game birds up to a total of 20,000 annually for experimental release — to see if they can adjust to California habitat. Commissioners also received in skeleton form a summary of operations on 10 state-managed waterfowl units, showing the 1959-60 kill was only about half the previous year.

Commissioner Carl Wente, San Francisco, wanted the department and the commission to formulate a policy to see how much money should be spent in management of these areas.

The report pointed out that during the most recent season it cost the state \$23,000 to operate the areas and income from them totaled only \$15,700.

Snow Survey Shows Drop In Scott River Regions

ETNA—The annual snow surveys for this year made by the United States Forest Service personnel in the principal Scott River drainage basin disclosed below normal snow levels and water content in six test areas.

Wilbur Howard, Callahan district ranger, and Robert Burns, forest service employee, were flown by helicopter into the area and skied out, spending one night at the Wolford Cabin in the Trinity River drainage basin. Elevation there is 6,400 feet. There they found the average snow depth 60.1 inches with average water content 26.0 inches. Average snow depth for 1959 was 76.0 inches with average water content 32.6. The average water content for the period 1930-1959 was 36.8 inches.

At Middle Boulder Lake No. 1, elevation 6,600 feet, average snow depth was 49.4 inches with average water content 24.3 inches. Average snow depth for 1959 was 73.6 inches with average water content 36.8 inches. Average water content for the period of 1930-1959 was 32.19.

At Middle Boulder Lake No. 3, elevation 6,200 feet, the average snow depth was 41.2 inches and average water content 19.9; 1959 average snow depth 59.0 and average water content 28.0. Water content average for 1930-1959 period 28.3 inches.

At Dynamite Meadows, elevation 5,700 feet, the average snow depth was 33.6 inches and average water content 15.4 inches; 1959 average snow depth 42.9 inches with average water content 19.5 inches. Average over a four-year period was 21.6 inches. George Hendricks, Callahan

Pioneer Ranch Changes Hands

MOUNT SHASTA — Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Douglass have announced the sale of their country estate, Shasta Butte Ranch. New owners are Vernon and Roy Swenson of Eugene, Oregon. Purchase price was not revealed.

Shasta Butte Ranch was originally the homestead of William Sullaway, one of the area pioneers. He sold his holdings about 1912 to the late Dr. J. L. Patterson.

Patterson, a native of Lexington, Kentucky, developed the place into a modern horse ranch, complete with paddocks fashioned after the racetrack farms of his native state. Here he raised 39 thoroughbred horses and they won top honors on all of the major race tracks in America.

Jack Greenwell bought the Patterson holdings about 15 years ago but after 10 years decided to move to a warmer climate. Douglass bought the place and continued to raise racehorses until he sold to the Swensons, April 6.

The new owners, also racehorse raisers, have about 20 top thoroughbreds on the place now. They expect to see the prefix, Shasta, attached to other winners in racing circles.

Mr. Charlie, A Waiter, Dies At 67

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — His English wasn't perfect and he had a large nose and red face. But Mr. Charlie made many friends through the years as a waiter in some of the world's fine restaurants.

He's been dead since Friday. No one has claimed his body. The many friends of Charlie would gladly pay his funeral expenses. Before he's buried, though, they want to find his wife and two daughters, thought to live in New York City.

Mr. Charlie, as he was known, was 67 when he died in his sleep at home.

Short and stocky, he spoke fluent French, German and Italian. His English wasn't perfect and often he'd substitute a foreign word for the English word he couldn't find.

During his 40 years as waiter he worked in such places as the Roosevelt Hotel in New York and the French Pavilion at the New York World's Fair in 1939. It was there he met his friend Camille Bernann, now owner of Maxim's here.

In 1949 he came here to serve at the Shamrock Hotel. Later he worked at Maxim's and other Houston restaurants.

Bernann called him a "fantastic waiter" and said "I doubt if I could approach his knowledge of food and wine." He said the waiter loved "the red wines of France."

Younger people would ask to have Mr. Charlie wait on them. They were charmed by his old-time European ways.

Bernann, who knew Mr. Charlie for 21 years, said the waiter never talked of his wife and daughters.

An address was found in the dead man's apartment and friends said it was 508 West 135th St. New York. His wife is thought to live in the same apartment in which the couple lived when he worked at the Roosevelt.

"His death makes me very sad," said Bernann.

Funeral arrangements have not been made.

30,000 YEAR OLD LOG
LA JOLLA, Calif. (AP) — Scripps Institution of Oceanography says a partly petrified log, dredged from a quarter-mile depth in the Gulf of Tehuantepec, Mexico, was the first find of phosphate fossil wood from the sea floor. Normally, it explained, petrified wood is mineralized with silicon dioxide, commonly called opal. The piece from the gulf was mineralized with calcium phosphate, called apatite, from dead and decaying sea life. Scripps said the log was at least 30,000 years old.

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Governor, Demo Battle Over Seat

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — Rep.

Quentin Burdick, a Democratic trailblazer in the stronghold of Republicanism, will battle Gov. John E. Davis for the remaining 4 1/2 years of the late Sen. William Langer's Senate seat.

State Democrats and Nonpartisan Leaguers, meeting in joint convention Thursday, unanimously designated the 51-year-old attorney as their nominee.

Burdick and Davis are matched in the June 28 special election to name a successor to Langer, the longtime political firebrand who died in office last November.

The seat now is held by Republican Norman Brunsdale, appointed by Davis on an interim basis. Burdick rode a North Dakota
