

KU Pelican Baseball Team Splits; Cinders Fourth

Stickmen Spark First Game Win

The Klamath Union hitters for the first time in the season began to show signs of life yesterday in a double header which the Pels split with the Yreka Miners 10-9 and 3-9.

The biggest stickman of the day was the Pel's second baseman and leadoff batter Don Wiley. In the first game Wiley blasted out two singles and a triple for four runs-batted-in, and in the second game the left-handed batter socked a homer for two more runs.

The other KU batter who had a good day at the plate was

Blake Griggs who plays left field while not pitching as the Pel's number one flinger. Griggs also collected three hits in the first game good for a run production total of three, and in the second game the slugger reached base three consecutive times on two errors and once by being hit by a pitched ball.

The first contest was a real slugfest with the lead changing hands three times. The Miners started off in the first by scoring six runs off starter Wally Palmberg and relief pitcher Kent Hunsaker.

KU came back in the first to score one and tied it all up in the last of the second when they pushed five runs across the plate. It was this inning which actually decided the game.

With one run already in during the inning and two outs, Sherm Allen lifted a high pop up between second base and right field. Second sacker John Ellis raced back for it, and rightfielder Daryl Severns rushed in for it. The ball caromed off Ellis's glove for a two base error and both runners scored.

The error put the Pel's only one run shy, and the club was on its way. Blake Griggs followed with a single and Ray Taylor drove home the tying run with a single through the infield.

It was not a day for pitchers. Palmberg was knocked out after only one third of an inning past. Hunsaker came in to relieve, but was also fairly ineffective. The victory eventually went to Paul Bishop for his initial win of the year.

The Pels ended the game by being outbatted by the Miners 12 to nine, but the two Yreka errors proved too costly.

In the second game Yreka started off with a blaze by scoring one in the first and six in the second. Ten men went to bat in the late first for the Miners. The Pel infield, usually solid defensively, fell to pieces aiding the cause. Larry Bunyard, Bobby Yuncik and Rich Moore all committed miscues in the frame.

The Pels got their two runs in the second inning with Don Gredel leading off with a walk, Moore fanning, Bishop flying to left setting up the situation for Wiley's inside the park smash. It was Wiley's second homer of the year.

The second hit saw Pat Carney of the Pels being knocked out of the box early in the second inning. First sacker Dean Dunson then came in to relieve for his teammate. Dunson finished the game for the Pels and gave up four hits and three runs.

Edstrom Pick In Decathlon

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—Dave Edstrom, University of Oregon junior and a top United States Olympic prospect, compiled a massive 8,176 points in a two-day decathlon competition that ended here Saturday.

Edstrom finished first in seven events, tied for first in two others and was second in one. Officials said they believed his point total was the third best in the history of the event.

The performances of Edstrom and Steve Anderson, another University of Oregon man competing for the national Olympic decathlon trials July 8-9 here.

Anderson finished second with 6,470 points. Bob Lawson of the Staters Track Club of Corvallis, Ore., was third with 6,061.

The standard for entry in the trials is expected to be between 6,000 and 6,750 points.

Steve Pauly, Oregon State College freshman, failed to place in the high jump. As a result he finished fourth in the competition with only 5,062 points.

Edstrom won four of Saturday's five events and was second in Pauly in the javelin. Friday he won three of five events and tied for first in the other two.

Augusta, Ga. (AP)—Arnold Palmer battled a biting wind and some faltering strokes Saturday to retain a one-stroke lead after three rounds in the 24th Masters Golf Tournament.

The field behind him became so closely bunched that it was anybody's title for the taking in the final 18 holes Sunday.

Palmer, after a sparkling 34 on the front nine, slipped coming back and finished with a 72, even par, for a 54-hole total of 212. That put him just one stroke ahead of Ben Hogan, Bill Casper, Dow Finsterwald, Julius Boros and Ken Venturi.

The margin was just the same as it had been at the start of Saturday's crowd-stirring third round, but the opposition was more formidable.

Hogan, at 47, is shooting for his third Masters title. He also has won the U.S. Open title four times. And Saturday he contended that the massive 6,550-yard, par 36-36-72 Augusta national course "played easy."

Casper is National Open titleholder; Boros a past winner of the Open, Finsterwald a former PGA champion and Venturi one of the top younger performers on the pro circuit. Only Boros could do any appreciable damage to Augusta national's tough par Saturday, when chilly winds brought rain and discomfort to the players and a huge gallery of about 40,000.

Boros, from Mid-Pines, N.C., shot a 70, two under standard figures, and the best round of the day. Casper and Venturi had 71s and Hogan and Finsterwald par 72s for their 213 totals.

Two strokes behind the challenging quintet, at 215, came Gary Player, the young South African, who also had a 72 Saturday.

At 216 were Stan Leonard, the 45-year-old Canadian; former PGA Champion Walter Burkemo, Don January, and Claude Harmon.

They're all very much in the running for the showdown. Only a year ago Art Wall was six strokes behind Leonard and Palmer going into the last round of the Masters but he won it with a finishing birdie string that gave him a final 66.

Rafael Machen is the 1960 Olympic heavyweight champion who began his pro career by being knocked out by Floyd Patterson, then heavyweight champion, in the sixth round Aug. 22, 1957.
