Wendell Smith of the Klamath Union High School will review N. V. Gogol's classic play "The Inspector General" for the Women's Library Club, 2 p.m., April 11 in the city library auditorium.

Nikolay Vasilevich Gogol is one of the great Russian writers of fiction. "The Inspector General," a comic, satirical play, which caused the word of "treason" to be uttered by those who were supported by state money, was enjoyed by Nicholas I, then czar of Russia, and much to the surprise of everyone was not withdrawn from the stage, even though it had such a stormy reception.

Gogol was born into a family of Cossack origin in the Ukraine. He studied law but as far as is known did not practice it, worked in civil service, but did not care for the bureaucratic environment, tutored sons of the wealthy, held two teaching positions, first an instructorship in literature and next a professorship in history. Later he traveled abroad.
