Brown Opens Nominations

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Gov. Edmund G. Brown has signed in a primary election measure that will allow candidates to file for the assembly seat left vacant by the death of Dorothy Donahoe (D-Bakersfield).

The new law extends the date for filing nomination papers in a primary election where an only candidate dies after the regular filing date.

It was authored by Sens. James A. Corey (D-Merced) and Walter W. Stern (D-Bakersfield). Brown also signed into law Friday a bill appropriating \$1,200,000 to the state's account in the unemployment trust fund maintained by the U.S. Secretary of the Treasury.

Brown said the bill, also an emergency measure, was required because of a sudden slash in federal funds available for the administration of the Department of Employment. The bill had been introduced by Assemblyman Thomas M. Ites (D-Los Angeles). Brown signed two other bills Friday.

Brink's Worker 'Fed Up,' Flees With \$30,000 Cash

CHICAGO (UPI) — For 27 years, William Johnson helped Brink's Inc. carry millions and millions of dollars. He never lost or stole a penny.

Brink's officials here considered Johnson, 57, one of their most trustworthy armored car drivers. He never gambled. He seldom drank. He and his wife, Estelle, always made ends meet on his \$3,500 yearly salary.

Something snapped Friday in the mind of quiet-living, scrupulously honest William Johnson. He parked his armored car in front of a Chicago currency exchange and watched a guard and money messenger deliver cash inside.

Then he left his keys, uniform cap, company coat and badge, revolver, holster, Sam Browne belt. There is about one automobile to every three persons in the United States.

Hospital Bed Needs Listed

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon will need 4,135 additional hospital beds by 1970 if it is to reach the national general hospital standard. In making the estimate Friday, the State Board of Health said such a program would cost about 90 1/2 million dollars.

The national hospital standard is 4 1/2 beds per thousand population. The board said it was recommending no specific number but that the 4,135 figure could be a guide to aid hospitals and communities in construction planning.

Johnson could only explain: "I was just fed up. I just decided to take off. I didn't need the money. I haven't any bank account, but I don't owe anybody, either."

Then the gentle armored car driver began to weep. "There goes everything," he sobbed. "My job, my pay, my pension. Everything is gone."

Police Capt. Frank Pape, known as the toughest cop in Chicago, turned to reporters hailing to Johnson's story and growled: "Some people may think this is a funny story. It isn't. It's a tragedy."

Wreck Yards Get Warning

PORTLAND (AP) — Three Portland automobile wrecking yards were directed Friday by the Oregon State Sanitary Authority to stop by May 15 the open burning of scrapped vehicle bodies.

The agency said it will take court action unless the order is obeyed. It added that the order affects only wreckers in major cities who pollute the air with such fumes.

The authority voted to investigate a complaint of fluoride discharge from the Reynolds Metals Co. plant at Troutdale.

It ordered reports on air pollution control projects at the Wah Chang Corp. at Albany.

The agency turned down requests by Coos Bay and Florence to make additional sewer connections until adequate treatment of wastes is assured.

It fixed June 15 as a deadline for applications for federal water pollution control construction assistance grants.
