Conversational problem over the canapes.

Accepted reply:
"Those bums ain't never gonna win no gonfalon like that. Your social standing is saved. Thus, for the confused and the frustrated, with the inaugural conflicts of our national pastime and a longer race than seems necessary stretching into the dim future, we give you Fearless Fraley's refresher course on the linguistic intricacies of the baseball lexicon. To wit:
Afterpiece — Second half of a twin bill. Oops, doubleheader.
Apple — The pill, horseshoe, onion pellet or spheroid. The ball, mama, the ball.

Hornets Win, Ace Fans 19

A Henley High School junior, Bert Allbritton, set what may be an Oregon prep pitching record for a seven-inning baseball game when he struck out 19 of the 21 possible batters to face him as the Hornets blasted the Sacred Heart Trojans 20-0 at Henley Tuesday afternoon.
Allbritton, getting the most out of a hopping fast ball and a tantalizing slow curve, walked only one man and gave up one single, both in the fourth inning, after fanning the first nine men in order.
Adding to Allbritton's performance was a powerful batting display on the part of his teammates. Larry Lago, Mike Tachini, Dan Barrett, John Roberts and Joe DeGrande. Between the five they accounted for 12 of the 18 Henley hits.
Lago hit 3-4 including two doubles and accounted for 5 RBIs. Tachini and Barrett also went 3-4, good for five more runs. Roberts collected 2-4 including the only home run of the game. DeGrande, although he counted only one hit, scored five Hornets tallies.
SHA pitcher Jim Ryan, the second Trojan moundman, pitched the only hit off Allbritton with two away in the fourth. He died on base when catcher Tom Amberg fanned to end the threat. Mike Slovey opened the frame with a free pass to first but was nailed on a fielder's choice at third.

2 Brave Chuckers Share Win Honors

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The Milwaukee Braves elected to do it the hard way — but are off and running in the National League pennant fight.
The Braves, dethroned after two straight championships in a playoff with Los Angeles last fall, called upon their pitching ace Tuesday to edge the Pittsburgh Pirates 4-3 before an opening day crowd of 39,383.
The old sidekicks, southpaw Warren Spahn and Lew Burdette, and relief artist Don McMahon had to team for the triumph decided by big Joe Adcock's two-run homer in the eighth inning.
"We played heads up ball and that's the way it's going to be all season," said Charlie Dressen after his debut as Milwaukee manager.
Spahn, the ageless veteran who will be 39 on April 23, hurled four-hit shutout ball for seven innings before weakening in the eighth when the Pirates put together a couple of doubles and a single for two runs to bring Mc Mahon from the bullpen.
When McMahon surrendered a run on a pair of doubles and only one out in the ninth, fidgety Lew Burdette promptly got the next two batters on three pitches to preserve the triumph.
Adcock, who drove in the first run in the opening inning with a single and then had a hit in the sixth, picked out the first pitch from reliever Eloy Face and sent it soaring over the right field fence. Hank Aaron had opened the eighth by beating out a triple to third and taking an extra base on a throwing error.
"I was trying to go to right with a man on second," Adcock said. "It was luck. I hit a breaking pitch on the outside. I probably won't hit another out there all year."

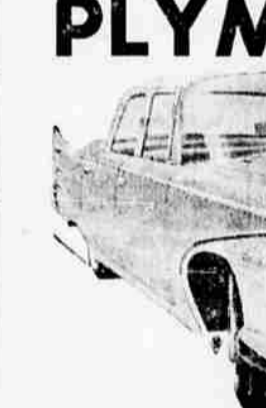
Average Marks Fired At CGC

KCBL Meet Slated

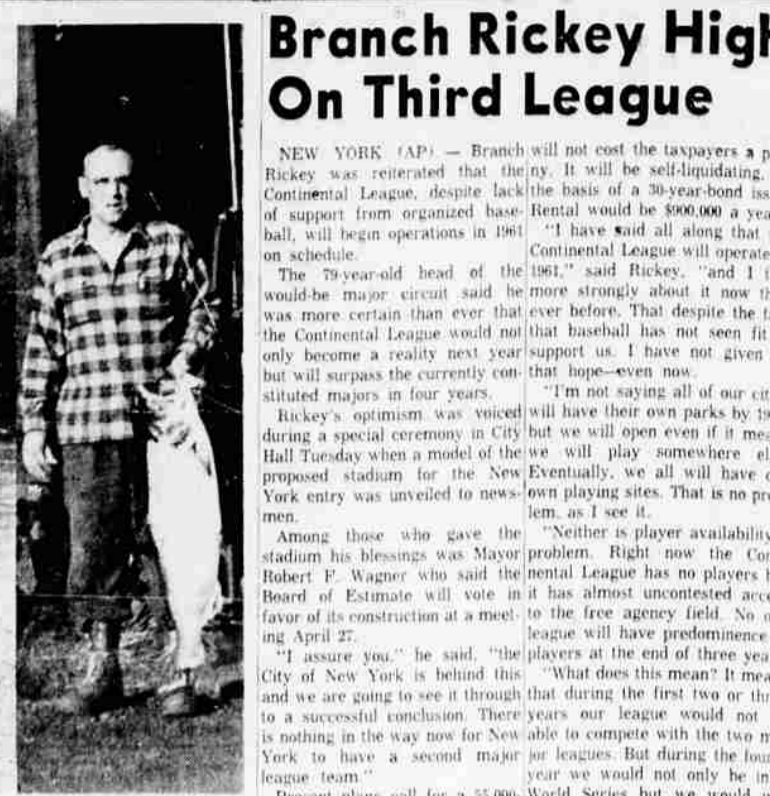

Branch Rickey High On Third League

Branch Rickey High On Third League

NEW YORK (AP) — Branch Rickey will not cost the taxpayers a penny. It will be self-liquidating, on the basis of a 30-year bond issue. Rental would be \$900,000 a year, but will begin operations in 1961.
"I have said all along that the Continental League will operate in 1961," said Rickey. "and I feel would be more strongly about it now than ever before. That despite the fact that baseball has not seen fit to support us, I have not given up that hope—even now."
Rickey's optimism was voiced during a special ceremony in City Hall Tuesday when a model of the proposed stadium for the New York entry was unveiled to newsmen.
Among those who gave the stadium his blessings was Mayor Robert F. Wagner who said the Board of Estimate will vote in favor of its construction at a meeting April 27.
"I assure you," he said, "the City of New York is behind this and we are going to see it through to a successful conclusion. There is nothing in the way now for New York to have a second major league team."
Present plans call for a 55,000-seat stadium with movable sections for conversion to accommodate 60,000 for football. A proposed parking lot will accommodate 5,500 automobiles. The stadium also will feature two sections of rotating seats, the absence of pillars and columns or any other obstruction, escalators and continuous lighting.
The city will build the stadium and lease the structure to the baseball franchise owners. The venture, according to the mayor:
