

Touring Lad Given Talk

SEA CLIFF, N.Y. (AP)—Today was spunkless Wednesday for young Dean Siering, the footloose and fancy-free runaway.

After a 1,200-mile tour around the country strictly on the cuff, the brash 13-year-old was brought home Tuesday to his grandparents' house.

There was talk that grandmother Siering planned to apply a cuff or two of her own to the seat of Dean's charcoal gray trousers.

But she sweetened him with huge and whisked him inside for a hearty meal.

Grandfather Robert Siering gravely shook heads with the boy, then burst into a smile, saying, "Glad you're back son."

The bespectacled youngster, whose parents are separated, slipped away from home Sunday with \$25 in his pocket.

He took a cab to Idlewild Airport, bluffed his way aboard a plane without a ticket and landed in Chicago. Another cab got him to a train he took to Buffalo, again without paying a cent for fare.

At a Buffalo hotel, where his third cab ride landed him, he was nabbed by police. Neighbors brought him home by plane.

Dean said he had wanted to fly to California. He made it clear that he still wants to go there.

Though his first Odyssey cost him only \$20 of his original \$25, he considered the outlay high.

"Taxi," he observed darkly, "are very expensive."

Jet Bomber Fires Shot

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (AP)—A B52G jet bomber flew 10,000 miles nonstop to the North Pole and back as a prelude to launching a Hound Dog missile Tuesday.

The missile was fired from under a wing of the eight-jet bomber over the Atlantic test range from Cape Canaveral, Fla. It streaked several hundred miles downrange and landed in the Atlantic.

The 22-hour plane trip was described as the longest flight made by a bomber carrying the air-to-ground missile.

The plane took off from Eglin shortly after noon Monday and reached the North Pole shortly before midnight. The six-man crew made extensive tests of the bomber and missile guidance systems in temperatures as low as 75 degrees below zero while flying over the polar ice cap.
