Glimpse Of Linkville Given By Councilman

A glimpse of the first three years of Linkville as a legal municipality was given members of the Klamath County Historical Society at their regular monthly meeting Wednesday at the Klamath County Library.

Floyd Wynne reviewed the minutes of the Board of Trustees of Linkville from the time of their first meeting in the jury room of the courthouse on Monday, June 2, 1889, through April 4, 1892.

The minutes were contained in a volume which had been lost for a great many years, he explained, but which was found several years ago and is now with other city records.

Prior to reading a synopsis of the more interesting portions of the minutes in the ledger, Wynne reviewed briefly the history of Linkville from its establishment by George Nurse in the spring of 1867.

He enumerated the steps by which the town of Linkville grew over the years between its founding and its establishment as a municipality.

Among the points listed were: 1869, the ferry across Link River was replaced by a wooden bridge built by Nurse at a cost of \$1,200 to \$1,500. He also listed the establishment of the Linkville post office in 1872 at a time when the town had 40 residents.

It was also in 1872 that the Modoc War broke out and the name of Linkville became known over the world since all dispatches on the war were filed from the town.

In 1874, Lake County was created and Linkville was named the county seat. Two years later, settlers on the east side of the county voted the county seat to a place that later became Lakeview.

He read the text of the letter written by George Nurse when he filed a plat of the original townsite of Linkville February 26, 1878.

Further tracing the history of the town, Wynne said the 1880 census showed Linkville had grown to 250 people.

1882 saw the official machinery set in motion to establish Klamath County.

He pointed out that in 1883 George Nurse suffered financial reverses because of his generosity and his willingness to aid others and moved from Linkville to a ranch near Yreka. He is buried in the Yreka cemetery.

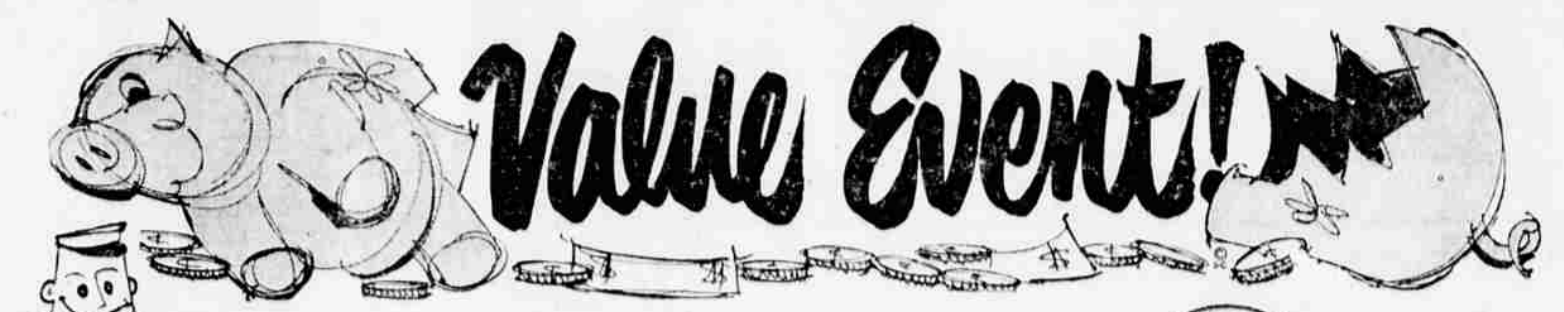
