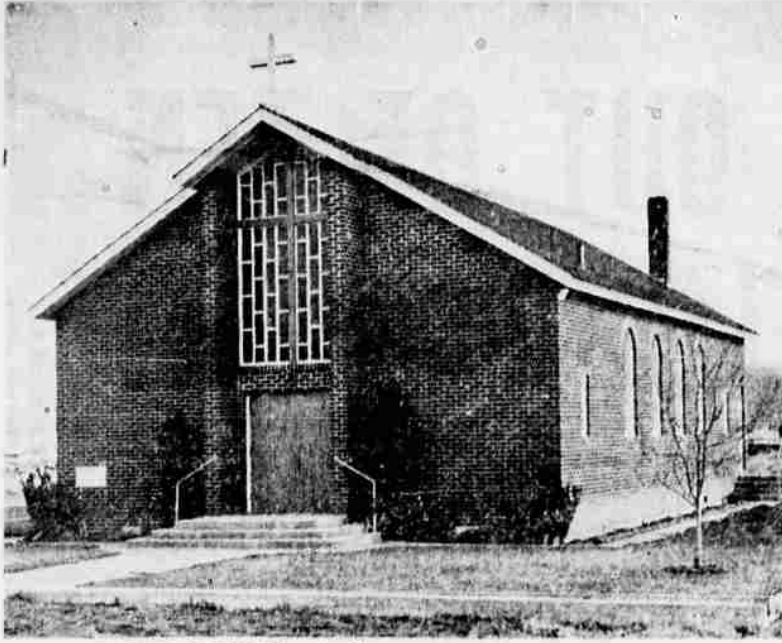

Rectory Torn Down

LAKEVIEW—The rectory of St. Patrick Catholic Church in Lakeview was torn down during the week in preparation for the construction of a new building on the same site. The work was done by E. S. Ritter and Company of Salem who were in Lakeview for the demolition work on the old Lakeview Hotel building.

Plans and specifications for the new building are being drawn up by Howard Perrin of Klamath Falls and are expected to reach Father Peter Duignan, pastor, by May 1. Bids will subsequently be let and Father Duignan hopes that construction will be completed by September 1.

The old rectory was built during the pastorate of Father M. Schmitt, S.J., who was pastor of the parish from August 31, 1911, to September 9, 1912. In 1920 when Father Thomas J. Brady was pastor the rectory was enlarged. However, Father Duignan stated, because of the growth of the Catholic population in Lake County the old building has long been inadequate.

The pastor and his assistant, Father Austin J. Cribbin, are temporarily residing in the parish hall until the home next to the hall, recently donated to the parish by J. P. Egan of Plush, is vacated.

Both Larry and Gary are expected to return home in December of this year.

Polio Serum To Be Given

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP)—Free administration of the Sabin live polio virus vaccine on a voluntary basis will be started here April 25 for very young children.

Authorities estimated 60,000 children would be eligible for the vaccine in what officials of the Cincinnati Hospital Council said will be the first mass use of it in the country.

It has been used extensively in the Soviet Union and other European countries, however.

The vaccine was developed by Dr. Albert W. Sabin of the University of Cincinnati. Unlike the Salk vaccine it is taken orally rather than by injection.

The mass immunization will be voluntary.

Satterfield, of Jackson, Miss., told a lawyers' meeting Wednesday attorneys' incomes have failed to increase as fast as those of other professions. He said physicians are getting 157 per cent more than they got 25 years ago while lawyers are only making 58 per cent more.
