

# Sugar Pills, Suggestion, Aid Patients

CHICAGO (AP) — Said the doctor with his fingers crossed: "If the yellow pills don't stop your aches and pains the pink ones will."

The kind of medical buildup, an expert on anesthesia said today, will make the pink pills an effective painkiller for 35 per cent of all patients, even if the pills are made of nothing more than table salt or baking soda.

Henry K. Beecher, Dorr professor of research in anesthesia at Harvard University, said Placebo effect plays a powerful role in management of pain.

Placebos are biologically inert substances that relieve some persons suffering from the pain of heart disease, post-operative wounds, nausea, seasickness and other conditions.

Beecher made the statements in a paper before the American Society for Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics, a division of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology.

He said since a powerful pain-killing drug like morphine, even in large doses, satisfactorily relieves only 75 per cent of the patients in severe pain, nearly half the pain relief possible with drugs is accounted for by placebo effect.

The supposition is that Placebos act through powerful suggestion, possibly similar to that of a hypnotist, he continued.

Placebo effect is generally greatest when the patient is worried and suffering from great anxiety, he added. The greater the anxiety, the more effective the Placebo.

In 1956 he purchased the remaining stock in the firm. Cavanaugh joined the firm in 1958. Smith has been active in the Printing Industry of Oregon association of commercial printing employers and has served as president. He has been very active in American Red Cross work in Klamath County for 20 years, having served as chairman and for the last 12 years as chairman of the Red Cross disaster committee.

Oregon's share in federal defense business continues to shrink for fiscal year 1959, it amounted to one-tenth of one per cent of total business placed for supplies, service and construction. Washington had 4.4 per cent and California 24.1 per cent of dollar value of contracts.

He said the company plans to continue making freight rate adjustments this year toward retaining certain traffic and returning other tonnage to GN. Commenting on the status of the proposed merger of Great Northern and Northern Pacific with their jointly-controlled affiliates, the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy and the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railways, he said that negotiations to determine terms of exchange which would be fair to shareholders of both GN and NP continued throughout 1959. Tangible results are hoped for in 1960. The president's report states also that 142 new industries were located along the company's lines in 1959. The company's research program is being continued.

New York Life Insurance Co. and Occidental Life Insurance Co. of California jointly announced payment of \$2.1 million in one of the largest death benefits ever paid on a single life in the history of the life insurance industry. Occidental paid the proceeds of a \$1 million policy to the beneficiaries of a 63-year-old corporation president, the policy having been taken out in 1957. New York Life's payment was more than \$1.1 million under several policies issued by it. One million of this insurance was issued in 1956. The largest previous payment by New York Life on a single life was \$840,000 in 1957.

## Harry Still In Rare Form; Blasts Republican Papers

NEW YORK (UPI) — Former President Harry S. Truman broke his silence on presidential preferences Friday long enough to declare "the Republican papers" want Sen. John F. Kennedy or Adlai E. Stevenson to get the Democratic nomination.

There was no further indication from Truman's remarks whether his statement about the "Republican papers" meant he himself is cool to Kennedy and Stevenson—and the ex-President went right on to deny he has decided for Sen. Stuart Symington.

Truman said he felt sure the Democratic party could and would win in the November elections "because of the terrible record the Republicans have had." Then he got down to names.

The former President told reporters, "You know who the Republican papers would like to see nominated, don't you? Kennedy or Stevenson."

Of a report that California Gov. Edmund G. Brown, leader of his state's 81 vote convention delegation, would support Kennedy for the nomination, Truman said he had noted that Brown had denied saying so. "I don't think he would lie."

## Shipment Of Red Cars Due Soon

NEW YORK (AP) — The first volume shipment of Soviet-built automobiles will arrive in the United States next month, importer Robert J. Castle of Syracuse, N.Y., said today.

The car is the four-cylinder Moskvich which will carry a New York port of entry price of \$1,500. Delivered in New York the car, slightly larger than most European imports but a shade smaller than domestic compacts, will cost about \$1,620 including taxes.

The Moskvich is one of the 311 which were displayed at the International Auto Show here Saturday. Its styling is somewhat similar to the Fords of the early 50s and the show models come complete with the Soviet red star as a radiator ornament.

"I had quite an argument with the Russians to persuade them to take the red star off the models they ship me for sale," Castle said. "I finally told them we didn't put the American flag on our Fords."

Another new foreign car was introduced here Thursday, the Toyota Tiara from Japan. Toyota has been in the American market for two years with a larger car but the Tiara is sized and priced with Volkswagen and Renault.

Howard Lane, eastern distributor for Toyota, said volume shipments of the Tiara will begin in August.
