'Fair Lady' To Be Shown In Russia

MOSCOW (UPI) — Eliza Doolittle and Prof. Henry Higgins rumbled into Moscow today to teach Russians the king's English as it is handled in "My Fair Lady." Eliza — Actress Lola Fisher — arrived here around midnight with a cast of about 70 singers, dancers and technicians who will give Soviet audiences their first look at the smash hit American musical.

She had with her not one but two Prof. Higgins. Michael Evans and Edward Mulhare will alternate in the role of the ornery speech tutor who transforms a cockney flower vendor into a queen of society.

The lateness of the hour precluded any elaborate welcoming ceremony when the cast's chartered airliner touched down at Vnukova Airport on its flight from New York.

However, a small army of Soviet and foreign newsmen and photographers were on hand for preliminary interviews.

Officials from the Soviet Ministry of Culture and representatives of the United States Embassy saw that the tired new arrivals promptly were handled into buses and taken to their hotel. They scheduled their first rehearsal early today.

"My Fair Lady" opens Monday and will play nine weeks here, in Leningrad and in Kiev as part of the U.S.-Soviet cultural exchange programs.

Funds Set For Relics

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee has voted to let the United States spend foreign aid funds to help save tombs and temples dating from the dawn of history.

The committee tentatively agreed Wednesday to let the United States participate in a major international program to preserve ancient historical treasures along the Nile River in Egypt and the Sudan.

The tombs and temples will be covered by a lake 300 miles long when the Aswan High Dam is completed in about five years. Egypt and the Sudan have asked scientists the world over to help unearth the treasures of antiquity before it is too late.

The committee approved an amendment to the foreign aid bill which would permit the U.S. government to contribute up to one-third of the cost of the big international program.

It has been estimated that the proposed explorations and excavations might cost up to 90 million dollars. Other nations are being asked to help also.

Potential Of Germ War Outlined

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Army's top chemical officer has told Congress that just 10 enemy planes or rockets could spray enough germ warfare agents on this country to knock out 30 per cent of the population.

Underlining this potential threat, the Army said Russia is placing a big emphasis on biological and chemical warfare. One-sixth of the hardware and munitions the Soviets have lined up against the West in Europe falls into this category, the Army said.

Release Censored Version
The testimony was given behind closed doors last month to the House Defense Appropriations subcommittee. A heavily censored version of the transcript was made public today.

Rep. Daniel J. Flood (D-Pa.) said the testimony indicated the United States may have overlooked the importance of chemical, biological and radiological (CBR) warfare in its anxiety over the "missile gap."

"There can be no intelligent debate about the fact that there is a shocking and appalling, great big wide CBR gap, is that not true?" he asked.

Maj. Gen. Marshall Stubbs, the Army's chief chemical officer, replied that he agreed.

Says CBR Attack Practical
Stubbs testified that it would be practical for an enemy to attack this country with CBR weapons. With 10 planes or rockets each loaded with 10,000 pounds of a dry biological warfare agent, he said, "we feel a potential enemy would get at least 30 per cent casualties in the total of the United States."

His testimony indicated that for purposes of illustration he was referring not to a lethal agent but to one of the newly developed materials which lays people out for 24 hours while an enemy striking force takes over.

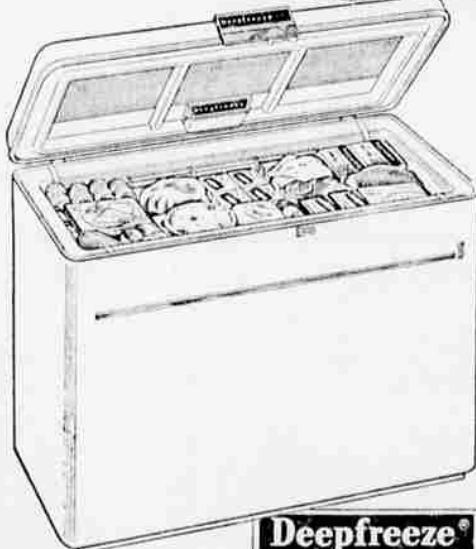

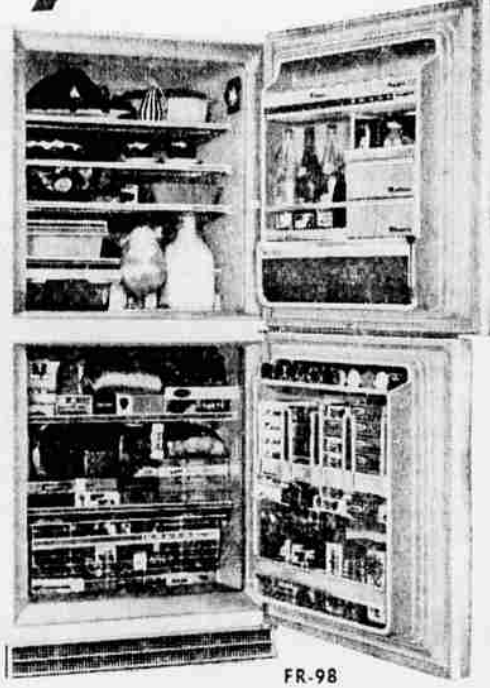
