Records Fall Like Flies At Quantico

QUANTICO, Va. (AP) — Hayes Jones, the Eastern Michigan flash, turned in the fastest 110-meter high hurdles of the year—13.6 seconds—and Ed Moran breezed to a 4:04.6 mile victory Saturday in the Quantico Relays.

This was Jones' first outdoor effort this spring. His clocking was eight-tenths of a second under the qualifying time for the Olympics.

But perfectionist Jones was not satisfied with his performance. "I'm bad on the last three hurdles," he complained. "I've got to improve."

He was off like a shot and never was in danger, finishing about a yard in front of Bill Johnson of Maryland.

Moran, who had a disappointing winter indoors, turned in a solid performance. He had hoped to get down to the Olympic qualifying time of 4:02.

Peter Close, an ex-St. John's (N.Y.) miler, was second, a good 60 yards behind Moran.

This was the first Eastern outdoor meet of the year and the performance were excellent.

Besides seven meet records set Friday, four more went by the boards Saturday.

The Michigan State two-mile relay team not only set a meet standard but the 7:33.2 clocking was the fastest of the year.

Jim Carr, Brian Castle, Bob Lake and Willie Atterberry carried the baton for the Spartans.

Flyweight Title Goes To Thai

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Pone Kingpetch, 24-year-old son of a poor Thai fisherman, Saturday won the world flyweight boxing championship by split decision of defender Pascual Perez of Argentina in a bloody, 15-round bout.

The tall, thin Thaiander's left eye was swollen shut and blood dripped from a cut above the eye as he was proclaimed Thailand's first world boxing champion on the deciding vote of neutral Judge Nat Fleischer of New York.

Perez was cut above both eyes. Fleischer, editor of Ring magazine and director of the fight, cast his vote for Pone, 146 to 140.

Referee Lorenzo Torrealba of Argentina voted for Perez, 145 to 143. Judge Wong Hirankela of Thailand, had Pone ahead, 148 to 137. The 10-point "must" system of scoring was used in which the winner of a round received 10 points and the loser nine or less.

Perez weighed 112 pounds, Pone 110½.

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Jefferson of Portland won its third straight Metropolitan Division title and Cottage Grove wrapped up its fifth consecutive Class A crown Saturday at the Hayward Relays here.

A warm sun shone over the prep track and field meet, and five field marks fell. A relay mark also was bettered.

The Metropolitan scramble was tight. Jefferson edged out Grant of Portland 53-48. Marshfield of Coos Bay was third with 33-25, followed by South Salem with 31 and Medford with 26½.

The A division by contrast was largely a Cottage Grove show. Coach Wally Cochet's squad won eight events, set a record in the shotput and tallied points in all 13 events. The team's 88-point total was far ahead of second-place Crater with 57½.

Marty Franks of Grant set the only new relay mark when he soared 12 feet 9½ inches in the

Metropolitan pole vault. The relay events were scored on a 10-8-6-4-2-1 basis for the first six finishers. Individual events gave only 5-4-3-2-1 points for the top five.

Jefferson set four of the five relay marks with record bettering victories in the high jump, the mile and two in distance medley races.
