Economists Predict New Price Rises

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Government economists said today that soaring wholesale prices last month may point to a new round of retail price increases before mid-summer.

Their forecast was based on a Labor Department report Sunday night showing that wholesale prices in March climbed to an all-time peak, reflecting higher costs of farm products and food.

The economists said the report means the average consumer's living costs also probably reached a new record high last month.

The wholesale price index jumped six-tenths of one per cent in March — the largest monthly rise in two years — to 120.6 per cent of the 1947-49 average. This equaled the record high set last April.

Raw winter weather in March pushed up prices of livestock. It said gasoline costs also rose. Meats and eggs, and vegetable oils moved up seasonally, but other non-farm commodities were unchanged or declined in price.

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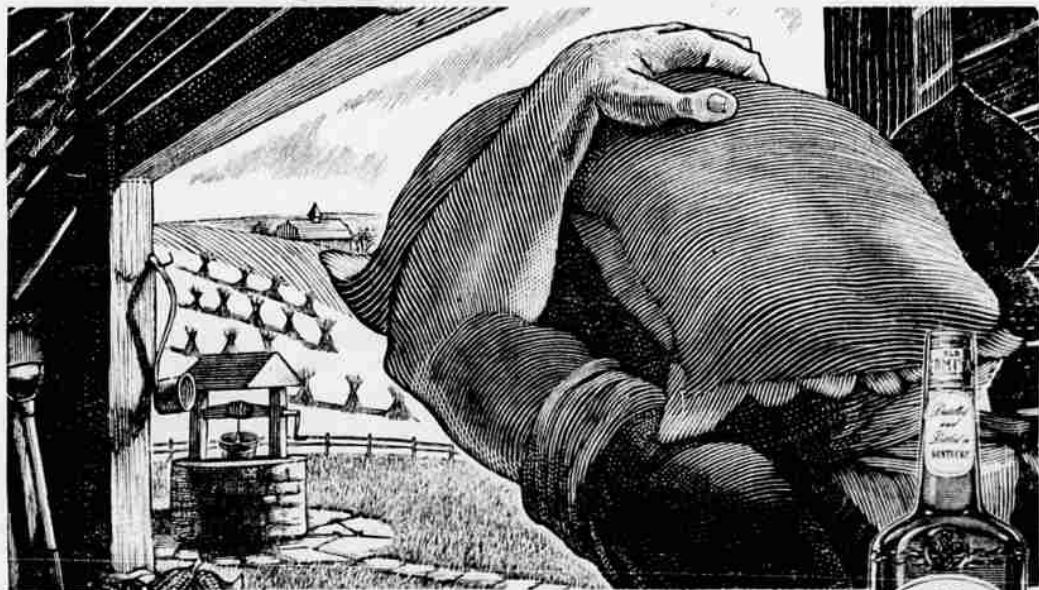
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
