

Chiloquin Battlers Set For Local Fights

Seven more bouts have been added to the rapidly-growing amateur fight card to be presented in the Klamath Auditorium Saturday night by the Owl Hoots and the Order of O, the Oregon Tech award winners association.

Chiloquin Police Chief L. O. Jones, who is cooperating with OTT's George Miller and Klamath Falls' Buck Davidson as co-matchmakers for the big event, listed the seven bouts this morning and noted that he still has plans to match 12 additional scrappers.

According to promoter Rex Hunsaker, the Oregon Tech athletic director, reserved seat tickets to the gigantic card may be obtained in Chiloquin at the City Beer Store and Ron's Drugs, in addition to the outlets in downtown Klamath Falls.

Jones, who directs the Chiloquin Boys Club and has enjoyed enviable success with his fighters, plans to pair Jake Gregg, one of the county's most promising young battlers, against Larry Barney, the pride of the Sprague River contingent. Both Gregg, who fights under the Chiloquin banner, and Barney weigh in at 120.

In other bouts promised by the Chiloquin - Sprague River group are a tussle between Ramon Unive, Chiloquin 145-pounder and Paul Melendras, 148, from Sprague River; a 100-pound pairing featuring Chiloquin's Don Taylor and Jimmy Wright of Sprague River; Butch and Mike Wampler, a pair of 50-pound Chiloquin mixers; Mike Chase and Freddie Schonchin, also 50-pounders; Van Todd, 61, Chiloquin, against

Giardello, Fullmer Set

BOZEMAN, Mont. (AP)—Joey Giardello, getting his first title shot in 12 years' campaigning, guns for the National Boxing Assn. world middleweight championship tonight against rugged Gene Fullmer, defending his crown for the second time.

The 13,200-seat fieldhouse on the mountain-rimmed campus of Montana State College is nearly sold out for the nationally televised (ABC-TV, 10 EST) 15-round match.

The expected box-office gate of more than \$100,000, with \$20 tops, and TV receipts of \$100,000 guaranteed monetary success for Montana's first championship bout since Jack Dempsey and Tommy Gibbons battled in a 1923 financial flop.

Fullmer collects all the \$100,000 TV payoff and Giardello, veteran of 106 fights since 1948, pockets \$25,000 plus \$5,000 expenses.

Fullmer, renowned for his superb physical condition, said, "I figure Giardello will be coming out fast in the opening rounds, but I always go into the ring expecting trouble." The 28-year-old champion from West Jordan, Utah, is among those who think the fight could go the distance.

Fullmer is a 13-to-5 favorite. He has a 51-4 record with 22 kayos and was knocked out only by Sugar Ray Robinson in 1957.

Giardello, ranked No. 7 by the NBA and No. 3 by Ring magazine, boasted of winning and claimed he is in better shape than he has been for several years.

Jones still is arranging for bouts for 12 additional scrappers including Ron Hogarth, the rugged 165-pound ace from Chiloquin High School, who "will fight at any weight from 165 on up."

Other Chiloquin battlers for which he is yet to find opponents include Bobby Bajocas, 160; Al DeBortoli, 147; Leon Weeks, 125; Lee Chase, 110 pounds; Len Andersen, 100; Rick Starkey, 90 pounds and Errol Todd, an energetic 81-pounder.

The Chiloquin group recently returned from Coos Bay where they finished high among the Southern Oregon Golden Gloves contenders.

Also remaining to be paired for the Saturday battles are, from Sprague River, Dick Agalar, 70 pounds, Paul Lowery a 60-pounder, and Aaron Wilson, a 50-pound speedster.

The remaining bouts on the program, which was originally figured to include 12 fights but now appears destined to include 16 or 18, will be announced shortly, said Hunsaker.

Enterprise Beats Weed

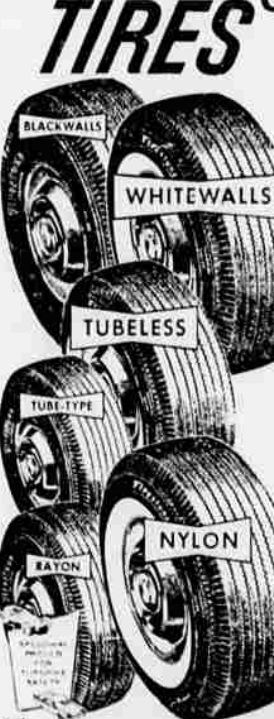

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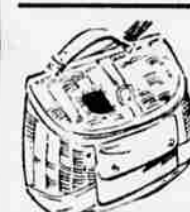
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
