TB Survey To Be Held On April 27

The annual chest X-ray survey in Klamath County is about to get underway.

It is sponsored by the tuberculosis section of the State Board of Health, the Klamath County Health Department and the Tuberculosis and Health Association.

A mobile X-ray unit will make 14 stops in Klamath Falls, and eight in suburban areas beginning a week from Wednesday, April 27, and continuing through May and June. It will also make four "retake" operations and spend one day, July 8, at the Johns-Manville plant near Chiloquin.
