

Pirate Bats Boom; ChiSox Win By One

Fifteen Safe Hits Include 3 Homers

No National League club hit fewer home runs (12) than did the Pittsburgh Pirates last year, but now the Bucs have boomed nine in their first seven games, tops for the new season.

KU Netmen Seek Victory

Still stinging from the 7-0 defeat handed them at Moore Park last week by the Black Tornado, the Klamath Union Pelican varsity tennis squad is preparing to travel to Medford for a rematch Saturday afternoon.

The Pel netmen have managed to get in two practices this week, but were weathered out the rest of the time.

Coach Bob Johnson noted, however, that the team appeared in better shape this week and that he expected to see a much stronger effort in the Saturday contest. The matches will start at 1 p.m. on the Medford courts.

An infected elbow that has kept Keith Baxter at about half pace over the last week is responding well to treatment, according to Johnson.

Making the trip for the Pelicans are Baxter, Dan Ross, Gary Buchholz, Ken Henry and Duane Fitzsimmons. Fitzsimmons and Baxter will pair as the number one doubles team while Henry and Ross will go in the second.

The team is also preparing to serve as host for the District Championships which will be held on the Moore Park courts May 6 and 7. Winners of the district competition earn the right to continue on into the state championships.

They rapped three while tagging 15 hits for an 11-5 job on the Philadelphia Phillies Thursday night. Hal Smith hit his second of the year, both three-run shots, and Bob Skinner made his third good for a pair of runs.

Fact is, the only solo shot among the Pirates' nine was delivered by winning reliever Fred Green Thursday night.

The only other National League game scheduled was a pitchers' duel, with the Milwaukee Braves, held to just three singles, beating Cincinnati 2-0 behind the four-hill pitching of Carl Willey.

Smith and Skinner broke Thursday night's game open against the Phils. After Pittsburgh had scored three off starter Curt Simmons and Humberto Robinson, and the Phils had tied it against rookie Jim Umbricht, Smith broke the deadlock in the fourth against Robinson, the loser.

Skinner then got an inside-the-park homer in a four-run fifth when his drive took a bad bounce over Bobby Del Greco's head in center field. Green, who needed saving relief from Roy Face in the seventh for his second major league victory, belted his first homer in the majors off Hank Mason in the sixth.

Young lefty Jim O'Toole (1-1) blanked the Braves on one hit until the seventh. Then Red Schoendienst, leading the league with a .455 average (10-for-22) in his comeback, got a hit off O'Toole's glove, went to second on a walk and scored on Hank Aaron's single. Mel Roach made it a two-run inning with a sacrifice fly.

So now the White Sox have played two and won two — and both have been put away by one-run margins, and in the last inning.

They beat Kansas City a second time Thursday, winning 6-5 on Ted Kluszewski's single in the 11th after winning reliever Gerry Staley had blanked the A's on one hit for five innings. That hoisted the White Sox into a first-place tie with idle Detroit.

The New York Yankees backed a four-hit shutout spun by rookie John Gabel and Ryne Duren with successive fourth-inning homers by Bill Skowron and Gil McDougald for a 4-0 victory at Boston. Rookie Dan Dobbek's three-run, two-out homer in the ninth gave Washington a 6-5 victory at Baltimore Thursday night in the only other AL game scheduled.

The White Sox, who won Tuesday's opener 10-9 in the ninth on Minoso's second home run, were really back in form Thursday. They collected 13 hits—and all but one was a single. Nellie Fox, who was 4-for-4 (one a double) and drove in two runs, counted the clincher, getting on with a single in the 11th against losing reliever Ken Johnson and scoring on Klus's hit after a walk to Minoso.

Skowron's home run, his first, came with two on against loser Bill Monbouquette. McDougald's cleared the left field wall at Fenway Park two pitches later. Gabel, had worked no more than four innings in one stretch this spring and so gave way to Duren after allowing only three hits over seven innings.

Dobbek, a good bet to give the Senators the AL's rookie of the year for the third straight season, came on as a pinch runner in the seventh and teed off on losing Oriole reliever Jack Fisher (1-1) in the ninth after a pair of walks.

The Saturday afternoon Gem Stadium battle for the number one spot in the Southern Oregon Conference baseball standings between the Klamath Union Pelicans and the Medford Black Tornado promises to become a slug-fest if pre-game statistics mean anything.

Both Klamath Union and Medford are unbeaten in SOC action to date but the Pels figure a slight, mathematical at least, favorite in Saturday's doubleheader. The first game, the big one so far as league action is concerned, is a seven - inning test. The second, five innings, will not count in the league. Game time is 1 p.m.

The Whitebirds, 8-4 for the overall season thus far, can field a starting nine on which every man is rapping the ball at a .300 or better clip.

The Tornado, 5-0 for the season so far, is not far off the pace. First baseman Lowell Dean is pounding away at better than .700 and has been credited with 16 runs-batted-in. Another powerful pair is outfield Mike Par-

sons and Dick Ragsdale, each of whom is connecting around the .500 mark.

John Bianchi and Ken Warner, both outfielders, are riding straight-up .500's to lead the Pelican attack and not far behind come Don Gresdel and pitcher Blake Griggs (3-0) with a .462 and .412 respectively.

Coach John Koven's Medford nine faces the rough task of two twin hills in as many days. Today they are meeting the Grants Pass Cavemen, then hurry to Klamath Falls the following day for a tough or tougher assignment. The Pels need only worry about the Saturday session.

The valley club has another problem in that its number one hurler, Herb Wheeler, has been ailing the biggest part of the week. It was expected that he would miss the Grants Pass series in the hope that he would be ready to go against the Pels tomorrow.
