One more privilege was taken from Klamath Union students last Friday when the following restrictions were placed on them due to the large number of students congregating in the halls, conducting themselves in a "very noisy and rowdy manner."
When students come to school they are expected to go to their lockers, get the necessary materials for their work and proceed from there to their first period class. They also are allowed to study in the library and cafeteria.
Orders say: "Students will not be allowed to congregate in the halls and the only time that they should be in the halls is when they are going to or coming from places they have legitimate reasons to go to or from."
"If we find that the entire student body is willing to cooperate with those regulations, and if the problems that we now have are eliminated, we will then try to give you the responsibility for your own conduct and see if you as a group are willing to accept it." Read the morning bulletin Monday.
These restrictions are due to incidents that happened in the halls recently when "certain groups of students were not conducting themselves in an acceptable manner."
One such instance happened after the announcement was made this Thursday during the first lunch hour when some kind of a smoke bomb was touched off in the main hall. Smoke filtered through the halls and a spot in

front of the counseling office was burned.
Last week some firecrackers were lighted in the main hall. Also, recently there was considerable damage done to the school building and grounds when vandals painted red and pink "60s" on the windows and dug one huge "60" in the front lawn.
Only a remembrance of weeks of endless work and hard campaigning remains this week of the crucial days of last week when some 30 candidates were seeking student body office.

Earning an equal spot in the limelight are Steve Binney, vice president; David Sacks, second vice; Rod Sparlin, third vice; Don Christy, fourth vice; Francis Kenyon, business manager; Jerry Roth Wickersham, secretary; and Bobbie Taylor, yell queen.
