

### Sewer Construction Job Results In Filing Of Suits

Two suits resulting from city sewer construction have been filed in the county clerk's office.

Charles V. Shuck has brought suit against George Johnson and Marshall Bessonette, claiming construction crews caused a storm sewer to clog and overflow water onto his premises at Second Street and Klamath Avenue in October, 1957.

The City of Klamath Falls, "on relation of G. C. Motley," has sued H. G. Carl Construction Company, prime contractor for the city sewage treatment plant. The city maintains Carl still owes \$12,069 on a \$57,361 subcontract let to Motley.

Other suits on file: W. O. and Ida Mary Kurtz maintain that Vernon and Victor Shuck are responsible for allowing a cow to run on Route 39 near Merrill. They seek \$257 for damages to their car, which struck the cow in October, 1958.

Daniel Bleakley has brought two causes for action against Richard A. Spielman, for whom he was erecting a fence in October, 1958. He claims a fence post rebounded against a mound of earth and struck him, and that a nail Spielman had hit glanced and struck him in the mouth. He seeks a total of \$2,298 for injuries and lost wages and \$11,000 general damages.

Robert Zimmerman has been named in two suits filed as a result of an accident. Donald L. Cunningham, a passenger, seeks \$35,000 general damages from an accident on the South Sixth Street overpass last February 8.

Roger E. Helstrom, through guardian Margaret Plett, seeks \$25,000 damages.

In another accident suit, Contract Carrier Service Inc. seeks damages against Juan L. Torres as a result of an accident on US 97 at Lenz Road last August. Contract Carrier seeks \$1,869 damages to its tractor-trailer unit, \$3,000 for loss of use of the vehicle and \$106 cost of re-loading the cargo of wooden beams.

Lorenz Lumber Company maintains Newman and Barbara Kimes owe \$8,996 on an \$18,000 promissory note signed in January, 1955.

Basin Motors Inc. maintains Ray W. Oehrerich owes \$610 on a car bought last February.

The State Department of Employment commissioner maintains Rob's Drive in owes \$91 of a \$190 payroll tax bill for the last half of 1959.

Steinsel Electric maintains Holland Sheet Metal owes a \$2,121 bill for labor and materials purchased between October, 1958, and March, 1959.
