Booklet On Pruning Is Offered

"Pruning isn't difficult. All you have to do is step up to a plant and cut off a branch."

That's the point of view taken in a new booklet that explains how to prune ornamental plants. Published by the Oregon State College extension service, it lists ways to make pruning simple, yet effective.

If you haven't tried your hand at pruning before, you'll find the first few cuts are the hardest, the new bulletin points out. After that, confidence comes quickly and you'll soon feel a definite pride in your work.

Pruning is more effective if you don't oppose nature, but recognize the growth traits of the various ornamentals and prune to allow plants to retain their natural characteristics, the bulletin adds. This rule of thumb, along with a few hints about each plant and your own good judgment, are all you need to do a satisfactory job.

The bulletin gives simple directions for pruning butterfly bush, cotoneaster, forsythia, weigela, holly, hydrangea, lilac, flowering quince, rhododendron and azalea, beauty bush, spirea, roses, hedges and vines.

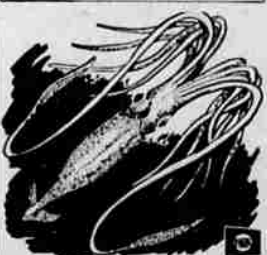
Tools needed for pruning, and the basic facts behind dormant, spring and summer pruning are also discussed.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Some "senior citizens" don't eat enough, reports the Nutrition Institute, which fosters research on the science of nutrition.

A government survey shows that persons over 60 tend to eat too few foods containing protein, iron and the B vitamins, niacin and thiamine, found in dairy products, meat, poultry, and fish. Inadequate consumption of fruit and vegetables also causes deficiencies of vitamins A and C prevalent among older persons.

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Home Landscaping Tips Given By OSC Professor

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — In landscaping your home, look ahead to the future; consider sun or shade requirements of plants; pick those that suit your likes, home and location; and don't hesitate to be different.

That's the advice to home owners from George Fredeen, assistant professor of landscape architecture at Oregon State College. Fredeen has conducted a series of landscape clinics this winter throughout northern Oregon.

Try to get trees established at the earliest time, Fredeen advises. They are slower growing and will take longer to mature.

If the new home is occupied late in the spring, plant the lawn and wait on the trees and shrubs until the following fall. If you move in late in the fall, plant the trees and shrubs and let the lawn go until spring.

Place plants in the situation to which they are best adapted, Fredeen says. For example, many of the native plants—Oregon grape, salal, vine maple, pines, kinnikinnick, or manzanita—are well suited for landscape use. They have become established to the climate and there are few diseases which attack them.

In the shady areas of the yard, select and place the plants that require afternoon shade or

cannot tolerate too much sun. They include rhododendrons, camellias, Acuba and others. Plants that need a half-day of sun or more include the deciduous plants like spirea, flowering quince, azaleas and roses.

One thing often overlooked in landscape planning is the future growth of the plants, according to Fredeen. When plants are purchased while small, it is difficult to realize that some will spread 4 to 6 feet in just a few years. It is best, he recommends, to make the plant beds big enough in the beginning to accommodate the mature size of the plants. Annuals can be planted in the space between the shrubs until the plants reach maturity.

Plants should be placed at least 18 inches or two feet from the house to prevent overcrowding and also to allow room to paint, wash windows, etc.

As a general rule, plants of columnar habit, such as arborvitae, yew or cypress should be avoided, Fredeen believes. These tall, thin forms are difficult to landscape. Their use is best defined as hedges, screens, or wind breaks. They are often incorrectly used at corners, between windows, or near the front doors. In these spots, they accent parts of the house already accented, he pointed out.
