

Pick Trees, Shrubs With Eye To Plant Traits And Yard Sites In Landscape

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — Shrubs and trees around the home should be selected and placed with an eye on the individual characteristics of the plant and the desired effects in the home landscape plan, says George Fredeen, landscape architecture professor at Oregon State College.

Trees have special characteristics all their own that must be considered, he points out.

Some trees are best to "look into," he notes. These include dogwood, flowering crab, and some flowering plums. Others, such as flowering cherries, sumac, locusts, and a few flowering plums are best to "look up into." There also are trees to "look down upon" from a deck or hillside such as magnolias, silk tree, horse chestnuts, and some flowering crab.

Trees such as Bechtel crab, silk tree, some cherries and plums cannot be walked under but must be observed from a distance. Kwanzan cherry and Newport plum, however, allow close inspection because their habit of growth is upright.

Trees which have a leaf color that persists — light green vine

maple, dark red of Japanese maples and flowering plums — are more interesting if they are placed between the observer and the direct rays of sunlight.

Shade intensity of trees also varies with species of trees. Heavy, dense shade can be obtained from plane trees, maples and oaks. Thin filtered shade is available from smaller trees such as sumac, flowering crab, flowering plums, flowering cherries, most fruit trees and large shrubs trained as small trees — lilac, mock orange, and privet.

In winter months, trees cast varying degrees of shade also even though the leaves are gone. Native oaks are heavily branched and cast dense shadows. Old apple trees cast very little shadow. These are important facts to consider in placing trees for summer shade and winter sunlight, Fredeen emphasized.

Shrubs can be selected to give color and charm to the yard throughout the entire year, he added. Some plants lend themselves to special purposes. Ivy, heather and junipers make fine ground covers; holly, pyracantha, roses or hollyhock may be used as barriers along with their beauty; daphne, azaleas and jasmine are outstanding for their fragrance.

Shrubs that bloom once in the spring and rest the remainder of the year may not do the job in a yard as well as others that can be selected for fall color — molis azaleas, barberry, nandina, spirea, and euonymus. Plants that keep their berries into the winter months include nandina, cotoneasters, pyracantha and holly.

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (UPI) — Marriages may be made in heaven, but they frequently get a helping hand from a blonde cupid at a resort hotel here.

She is Barbara Brooke, social director of the Hollywood Beach Hotel and Country Club. She figures she has started 200 couples on the way to the altar.

"To be frank," she says, "the most important part of my job is to see that unmarried women vacationing at our hotel meet unmarried men with similar interests."

Miss Brooke's mail regularly includes wedding invitations from people she has brought together. "One night I had to turn down three invitations because I had accepted a fourth," she says. "So far, there have been 50 babies named after me by couples I've introduced."

Matchmaking is easiest in the younger age groups, according to Miss Brooke. "Single young men always want to meet single young women, and vice versa. And if a teen-age girl is here with her mother, the first person her mother will get in touch with is me. 'Make sure my daughter meets a nice fellow,' she says."
