## 'Red' Rocha To Assist OSC Coach

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Ephraim "Red" Rocha, former Oregon State College star basketball player and recently coach of the professional Detroit Pistons, Saturday was named assistant coach of his alma mater.

Here he will assist Amory T. "Slat" Gill, who suffered a heart attack last January and spent the rest of the season on the sidelines.

Paul Valenti, assistant who took over as acting coach while Gill was out, also will stay on as an assistant. Athletic Director R. S. Keene announced.

Gill recently said he expects to be back as head coach next season.

Rocha was a star 6-8 center at Oregon State in 1945-47, winning the Pacific Coast Conference scoring title all three seasons and placing on the all-conference team twice.

He later played professionally for the St. Louis Bombers, the Baltimore Bullets, Syracuse Nationals and the Pistons.

Rocha, who is 36, came to Oregon State from Honolulu.

## Fastest American Mile Run By Burly

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Dyrrol Burleson of Oregon summoned a final burst of speed and ran the mile in 3:52.6 Saturday, the fastest ever run by an American.

The slender 19-year-old trailed for three laps, then hurtled past Stanford's Ernie Cunliffe and won by 15 yards.

The world record is 3:54.5, set by Australia's Herb Elliott. In winning, Burleson not only ran the mile faster than any countryman ever had before, he added lustre to his brilliant Olympic promise.

He is the first American runner to meet the Olympic qualifying standard for the 1500 meters at Rome. A runner must do the 1,500 meters in 3:45 or the mile in 4:02.0 this year to be able to compete in the 1960 Olympics, Aug. 25-Sept. 10. Besides that, he must finish 1:23 in the U.S. Olympics trials.

## John Thomas Better Mark

HANOVER, N.H. (AP) — Space-man John Thomas, 19-year-old Boston University sophomore, Saturday bettered the NCAA high jump record and equalled the American mark with a leap of seven feet, one-half inch.

Despite a sudden weather change, Thomas topped the accepted outdoor collegiate record of 7 feet even established by Southern California's Charlie Dumas on May 2, 1959. Dumas also set the American mark of 7-1/2.

Thomas' foot slipped twice on the soft takeoff soil at the 7-1/2 height and the result was two poor jumps. On the third try, Thomas cleared the bar easily. The bar trembled—then held—for the thrill which the 3,000 fans had anticipated.

Thomas made three tries at 7-1/2 which would have topped the world standard of 7-1 by Russian's Yuri Stepanov but failed. His best effort was the second jump when he made it over but had taken off too close and ticked the bar off its moorings coming down.
