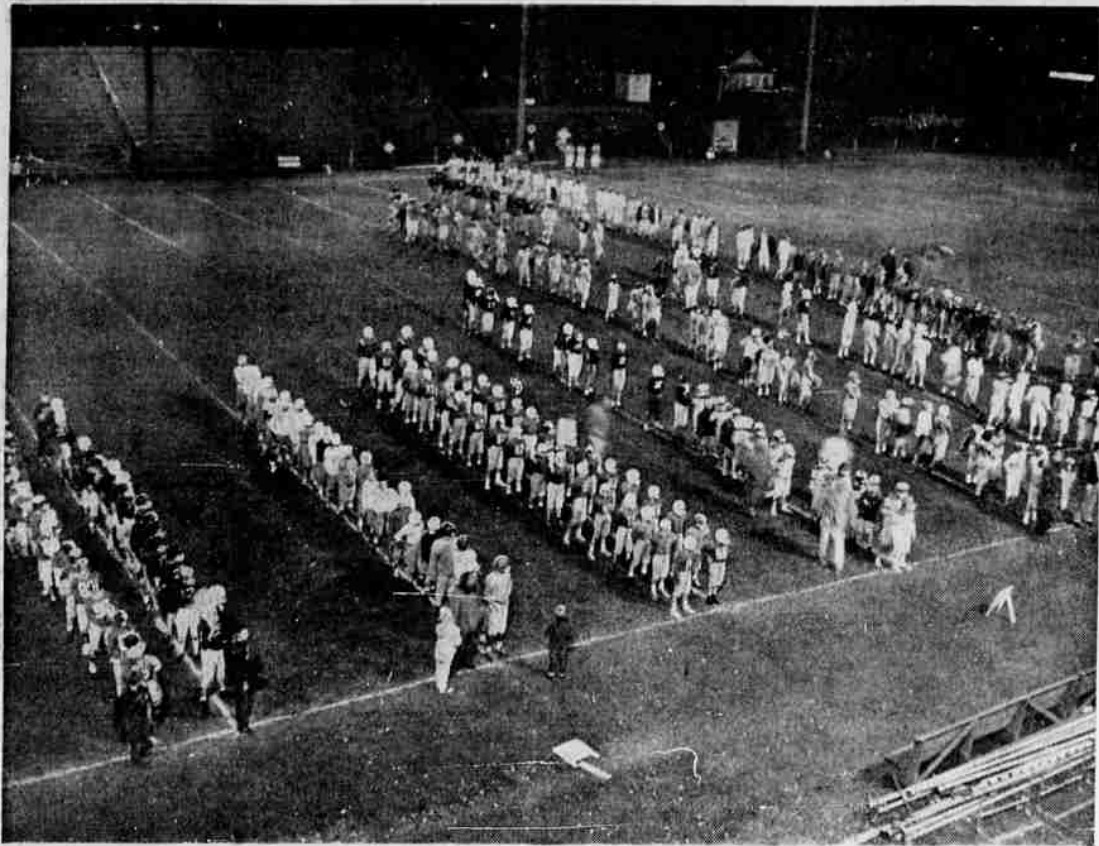


Jamboree Time

Big Orange May Be Headed For Fall

Is Syracuse, the powerful defending national football champion, heading for a fall?

For two weeks now, Ben Schwartzwalder's outfit has found the going rough.

Against Kansas, the Orange won by one touchdown, 14-7. There was some cause for that. The Jayhawks are a good club, capable of

winning the Big Eight championship.

Last Saturday, Syracuse barely stumbled past winless Holy Cross, 15-6.

Directly ahead is Penn State, just beginning to find itself. The Nittany Lions rebounded from a defeat by Missouri to whip Army, 27-16, Saturday.

If Penn State plays like it did

against Army and if Syracuse

plays like it did against Holy Cross, Schwartzwalder's behemoths are in for trouble.

Holy Cross outplayed Syracuse for 41 minutes, and the outcome caused Schwartzwalder to moan: "We'll have to go back to fundamentals. We couldn't throw. We couldn't catch. We couldn't even catch the ball thrown into our

hands by the opposition."

After Penn State, Syracuse's only big problem appears to be

Army on Nov. 5.

Mississippi, No. 2 behind Syracuse in the current Associated Press poll, has no great problem in Tulane this week. Ole Miss swept past Vanderbilt in a Southeastern Conference game Saturday, 26-0, but Vandy already had been beaten twice.

More significant than Mississippi's third victory was the downfall of three other pretenders to Syracuse's throne—two in the Big Ten and one in the Southwest Conference.

Both Illinois and Purdue, rated Nos. 4 and 7, respectively in the AP poll, were well beaten. Ohio State, No. 5, humiliated Illinois, 34-7, and Wisconsin clobbered Purdue, 24-13.

That makes Iowa, No. 3 and a 27-15 victor over Michigan State, and Ohio State the favorites for the Big Ten title. They meet on Nov. 12. Iowa takes on Wisconsin this week and Ohio State is at Purdue.

Kasso's understudy is sophomore Terry Baker, who has filled the role so well he is OSC's leading gainer, with 427 yards in four games. He helped set up all three OSC scores against Indiana, and completed three of four passes for 47 yards.

The victory over Indiana was but Oregon State's second over a Big Ten opponent, and the Staters thus became the only team from the West to turn the trick this season.

Win Over Indiana Costly; Beaver Tailback Injured

CORVALLIS (AP)—Oregon State

has beaten a Big Ten team for only the second time in history but in winning apparently has lost for some time its starting tailback Don Kasso.

Kasso suffered a severe knee wrench Saturday as the Staters whacked Indiana 20-6 at Bloomington, and was placed in the in-

firmary here immediately after the team arrived back in Corvallis Sunday.

"It's very doubtful that Kasso will play this week," an Oregon State team spokesman said. He added that doctors plan extensive examinations of the injured player today.

Three other players, including

guard Norby Keolanui, also were in the infirmary. Keolanui, too, suffered a knee wrench. And end Roger Johnson has a shoulder dislocation.

Kasso has been a key to Oregon State's record of three victories and one loss this season. However, Oregon State might not feel it too badly if he is sidelined for only a week, as the Staters next Saturday play in Moscow against Idaho, winless after four games and a 33-6 loser to Utah State last Saturday.

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Things Could Get Tough For Webfoots This Week

EUGENE (AP)—Against San Jose State, the University of Oregon

football team had an easy time of it—as usual. Things may get tougher for the Ducks Saturday—when they meet Washington State.

Oregon could hardly have had things better here Saturday. They beat San Jose 33-0. Quarterback

Dave Grosz showed superb passing form. Substitute halfback Mickey Bruce took two of the tosses for scores. And the defense completely stopped San Jose's running game.

The victory was Oregon's third in four games this season, and Grosz guided it deftly, completing eight of 15 passes and showing he apparently has shaken off the effects of a summer fracture in his throwing wrist.

Bruce caught two touchdown passes, one for five yards, and the other for 20. He took the second after wrestling the ball away from a defender in the end zone.

Oregon got its other three touchdowns on runs. Defensive center Bill Swain scored one. He intercepted a San Jose pass at mid-field and wowed a crowd of 10,000 as he scooted 50 yards to the end zone.

"I think our defense has improved," said Oregon coach Len Casanova following the game.

The Ducks gave up 135 yards to San Jose's passing, but held the losers to a minus 26 yards on the ground.

"I think we played a pretty good game," Casanova said. But he added: "But we still are making too many mistakes." He then went on to note that Oregon had been penalized seven times.

STANFORD, Calif. (AP)—Washington's Huskies powered their way to a 29-10 football victory over Stanford Saturday, but it wasn't enough to make Coach Jim Owens happy.

"Why can't we put one, whole good game together?" Owens asked after escorting his Huskies back to Seattle Sunday. "We've played four games so far and haven't looked good in any of them except in stretches."

Maybe so, but Charlie Mitchell looked mighty good in one stretch when he grabbed up a Stanford punt on the Husky 41 and ran all the way for a touchdown.

All-America quarterback Bob Schloredt passed 33 yards to Lee Folkins for one touchdown and ran 10 yards for another. George Fleming's 25-yard field goal opened the Husky scoring. A 35-yard pass from Bob Hivner to Ray Jackson contributed the final TD late in the game.

Willamette is favored to take over undisputed possession of first place in Northwest Conference standings Saturday when it meets College of Idaho.

Willamette is undefeated this season and has won both its conference games. The most recent victory was 40-19 over Lewis and Clark Saturday. Stan Solomon paced the Willamette attack by scoring four touchdowns, kicking an extra point and gaining 235 yards in 24 carries.

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Packers Shock Baltimore, 35-21; Houston Oilers Take AFL Lead

GB Bids For Title Chance

The rebuilt Green Bay Packers, molded into a title contender by Vince Lombardi, have struck the first blow against the kingpin Baltimore Colts in a determined bid to bring the smallest city in the National Football League its first championship since 1944.

The Packers parlayed a pair of Pass interceptions by Hank Greminger and two fumble recoveries into four touchdowns and shocked the two-time champion Colts 35-21 Sunday.

The Packers now are in a four-way scramble for the lead in the West with Baltimore, Chicago and San Francisco—all with 2-1 records.

The Bears' Ed Brown tossed three touchdown passes in a 34-27 victory over Los Angeles while San Francisco edged the Detroit Lions 14-10 on an 18-yard pass from John Brodie to R. C. Owens as the final gun sounded.

The New York Giants beat the Pittsburgh Steelers 19-17 on a last-minute 44-yard TD pitch from Charley Conerly to Frank Gifford and took over the top spot in the Eastern Division with a 3-0 record, a half-game in front of idle Cleveland.

Philadelphia whipped St. Louis 31-27 and Washington won its first 28-14 over Dallas in other games.

Fullback Jim Taylor scored three Packer touchdowns on short dashes—the first two after Greminger picked off Johnny Unitas passes, but a 12-yard Lamar McHan to Tom Moore pass in the fourth period was the clincher. Unitas had four throws intercepted and had to wait until only 1:10 remained to extend his TD-a-game string to 40 consecutive regular season tests with a 1-yard flip to Alex Hawkins.

Brown's third long TD toss, a 32-yarder to Angelo Coia put it out of reach when the Rams struck back in the second half after the Bears had built a 27-6 lead. Brown, who also tallied once, connected with John Morris for 45 and 66-yard scoring aerials.

Rick Casares supplied the ground attack and bettered Bronco Nalgurski's all-time Bear rushing record by ramming 78 yards for a 1,042-yard total.

Ex-Linfield Football Player Dies Following AFL Contest

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI)—Houston officials today probed the death of a New York Titan professional football player to determine whether he died from heat prostration or a head injury.

An autopsy was to be performed on the body of Howard Glenn, a 25-year-old offensive guard, Glenn collapsed after leaving the field in the Titan-Houston Oilers game Sunday, and died about two hours later.

It was at first believed the 6-2, 245-pound guard was suffering from heat prostration from playing in the 90-degree weather. But two physicians who examined the Vancouver, Wash., native immediately after the game disagreed and ordered him to a hospital.

A spokesman at the hospital where Glenn died said the cause of death appeared to be a cerebral hemorrhage.

It was understood that Glenn was originally injured in last week's game against the Dallas Texans. However, Titan officials were en route to New York and could not be contacted for immediate comment.

The death of the Linfield (Ore.) college graduate was the third in professional football history. Dave Sparks of the Washington Redskins died in 1954 after a game with the Cleveland Browns, and Stan Mauldin of the Chicago Cardinals collapsed and died in the clubhouse following a game with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1948.

In the only other Sunday game, the Oakland Raiders beat the Dallas Texans, 20-19, in Dallas by scoring 20 points in 10 minutes of the third quarter. Jim (Jetstream) Smith ran a kickoff back 98 yards for one of the touchdowns.

Dallas could have won the game in the final two minutes after Cotton Davidson passed to Max Boydstan for a touchdown and the Texans trailed by one point.

The Texans tried for the two-point conversion allowed under AFL rules but Bo Dickinson was stopped two feet from the goal.

Oakland scored on Smith's run, a nine-yard pass from Tony Teresa to Alan Goldstein and a 16-yard run by Goldstein.

Saturday night Boston beat Los Angeles, 18-0.

Denver continues to lead the Western Division, in which Dallas, Los Angeles and Oakland are tied for second place.

Hunsaker Out

KUHS quarterback Kent Hunsaker broke his hand in Friday's Grants Pass football game, coach Bob Williams reported today. Hunsaker will probably be out for the season. Gary Buchholz and Sherrin Allen will quarterback the Pelicans during the remaining four games.

Los Angeles was called four times for the infractions in the first half, and once confusion in the backfield caused Wade to fumble.

The fumble led to a first-period field goal for the Bears.

Waterfield said Rozelle had ruled earlier on "copy-cat tactics" such as these and they were to be subject to a 15-yard penalty for unsportsmanlike conduct.

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Victory Marred By Death
