

Mark Praises Morse Action

PENDLETON (AP)—Gov. Mark Hatfield campaigned in eastern Oregon Saturday for Republican candidates and had a good word for Democratic Sen. Wayne Morse.

He said Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., now seeking re-election, hurt the chance for passage of the bill authorizing transfer of the Boardman Bombing Range to Oregon by trying to amend it. He did not specify what the amendment was.

But, said Hatfield, Morse guided the bill through Congress.

Hatfield spoke at the county courthouse here and at a luncheon with Ron Phair, Ullman's Republican opponent, and State Sen. Carl Francis, the Republican nominee for attorney general.

He criticized Democratic Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton, saying every opinion of Thornton's that had been challenged before the state Supreme Court was overruled.

Hatfield praised his own administration, saying he personally has been working 18 hours a day as governor and traveling over the nation in efforts to help Oregon, particularly to attract new industry.

Rally Features Top Democrats

PORTLAND (AP)—Adlai Stevenson, Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee and Rep. James Roosevelt of California will address October Democratic Party rallies in Oregon.

Their appearances are being arranged by the Democratic Party of Oregon and the Oregon Citizens for Kennedy-Johnson.

Stevenson, the party's nominee for president in 1952 and 1956, will speak Oct. 30 in the Portland Public Auditorium.

Kefauver, his 1956 running mate, will speak in Pendleton Oct. 18, and at Bend and Corvallis Oct. 19.

City Council Meet Clears Up Misunderstanding

DORRIS — A "misunderstanding" between the city and a Yreka title insurance company was cleared during a regular meeting of the city council here this month.

Councilmen in a previous meeting refused to honor a bill from the company for title insurance on city lots. The company, in a letter read by Virginia Hamilton, city clerk, said further examination of its books had revealed information correcting the situation. Councilmen also instituted a policy whereby Dorris Volunteer Fire Department members, when they are called outside the city limits, shall be paid \$2 each per call by the property owner.

Cost of truck and equipment operation will be borne by the city.

In other action, the council: 1. Approved sale of a lot owned by Mrs. H. Hamilton near the American Forest Products Corporation facilities, to J. Conrad McPheeters for \$230.

2. Postponed purchase of the new city fire truck to allow time for a small change in wording in the contract for payment.

3. Discussed a suggestion by Councilman and Fire Commissioner

Bob Carnini that the city keep the old fire truck rather than sell it for the possible \$200 or \$300 Carnini believes the truck will yield at sale. No decision was made.

4. Approved payment of \$8,180 to a Klamath Falls paving contractor for paving three blocks of city street—Butte Street from Second to Fourth streets and California Street from Third to Fourth Street. Councilmen had estimated the job would cost about \$8,000. Cost of laying several water lines under the graded

streets apparently produced the extra cost.

5. Learned from the city clerk that all property owners on Butte and California streets between Fourth and Third streets except one owner on California Street have agreed to share cost of installing concrete curbs and gutters at a cost of about \$2.50 per running foot in their neighborhood. Some have paid in advance and others are using a time-payment plan, the clerk said.

6. Heard Councilman Cramer state he believes the city should

set up a project next year to pave another block of city street, to get the project approved by the state Highway Department and to have approval ready as soon as city and state funds are available.

7. Decided to charge a music company \$3 to rent the city hall auditorium for each of a series of music lessons, and to charge \$5 per session for heat.

8. Voted to extend State Street and Second and Triangle streets and to post city streets containing homes with name signs in the west portion of the city.

9. Approved three building permits, including a request from Archie Brimmer to build a garage worth \$500, and from H. M. Shoemaker for a chicken house and a brooder worth \$250. Councilmen also allowed Shoemaker a permit to move a house from outside the city limits to his lot in town if the building meets city codes.

10. Asked Councilman Carnini to work with the city clerk and Chief of Police Byard Kelly in studying other cities' building code ordinances. Councilmen hope this will rid the city of unsightly and unsafe structures.

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Equipment Fund Reaches Halfway Point In Drive

SILVER LAKE — Needing approximately \$1,000 for equipping the recently-acquired disaster car for north Lake County, the local committee, headed by Mrs. Earl Corum, reports collection of about half this amount.

The unit made its first run the opening weekend of hunting season when a lad from Oakridge, seated in a camp trailer, was wounded by an accidental discharge of his uncle's gun being unloaded outside the trailer.

Mrs. Corum, a registered nurse, and J. K. Graham, local merchant and disaster car driver, made the trip with the youth, who was later discharged from St. Charles Memorial Hospital and went home.

Hunters have aided the fund. Nearly \$250 was donated when local high school girls solicited contributions at the check station. Girls who helped were Karen Moran, Helen Iverson, Linda Nelson, Joy Emery and June Park.

Equipment needed for the ambulance, loaned by Lake County, will include stretchers, first aid supplies, oxygen and a radio. The outfit set up will be given by

the Lake County Chamber of Commerce.

Some \$200 was given by LaPine, Crescent and Gilchrist area business people, and individuals and oil companies serving this area are also assisting.

It is hoped that lumber for building a garage will be contributed. Both mechanical and maintenance upkeep contributions have been pledged by local garagemen.

An additional \$500 will enable the organization to purchase the car itself which is now on loan for a two-year period.

Charge Dismissed
DORRIS — A speeding charge filed last April against Mrs. Ellen Baldwin of Dorris was dismissed Friday by Judge Les Chase following a motion by Siskiyou County District Attorney Albert H. Newton Jr. in Dorris Justice Court.

Mrs. Baldwin had pleaded not guilty and requested a jury trial. The trial was postponed several times by illness of the California Highway Patrolman who cited her and for other reasons.

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Harvey Tells Build Plans

PORTLAND (AP)—The Harvey Aluminum Company plans to double its pig aluminum output in the Pacific Northwest and might build an aluminum sheet mill in the region also.

President Leo Harvey said in a telephone call from Torrance, Calif., however, that the sheet mill might not go to Oregon, where the firm now has its present pig aluminum plant.

He said the firm's quarrel with the state of Oregon over taxation might weigh against placing the sheet mill there.

Pig aluminum production will go up to 150,000 tons a year with the expansion program announced Thursday.

The company recently reached agreement with the Bonneville Power Administration for a 20-year contract calling for another 75,000 kilowatts of firm power and 75,000 kilowatts of secondary power.

Farmers Launch Diking Project

CANBY (AP)—A group of Canby area farmers, who decided they couldn't wait for the government to do the job, have gone to work on river channel and diking project.

The Army Engineers planned to begin work next year on the project which they figured would cost \$188,000.

But the farmers decided that if they waited until next year, the Molalla River might cut a new channel across their fields during high water.

The farmers hired a bulldozer to open up 500 feet of old river bed to cut across the base of a horseshoe bend 1,800 feet long. They said they expect to complete the channel and diking within two weeks at a cost of a few hundred dollars. They are paying for the work themselves.

Police Discount Worker's Story
EUGENE (AP) — A 22-year-old alien Hungarian, who told police Sunday that he had raped and killed a little girl near here last Aug. 29, was committed to the state mental hospital today.

Lane County Sheriff Ed Elder said the man had been virtually eliminated as a suspect in the killing of Alice Louise Lee. The owners of an orchard at Medford said the man had picked 63 boxes of pears there the day of the slaying.

The man was arrested in Portland Sunday, where police said he was acting strangely. He told police and immigration authorities his story of the killing and was brought to Eugene.

Elder said the man was "not clear and cohesive about anything."

Medford Youth Sent To Meet
EUGENE (AP)—Oregon will be represented by Jim Frake, editor of the Medford High School newspaper, at the National Teen Age Press Conference in Dearborn and Detroit, Mich., Oct. 12-15.

He will compete there for one of five college scholarships valued at from \$800 to \$8,000.

His selection was announced at the Oregon High School Press Conference, attended over the weekend by some 900.

Smiths Ignore Teevee Debate
DENVER (UPI)—For all the difference it makes to Joe Smith, Dick Nixon and Jack Kennedy may as well save their breath.

Immediately after the Kennedy-Nixon television debate Friday night, United Press International called every Joe Smith in the Denver telephone book, for reactions.

Five calls went unanswered. One Smith phone was busy, steadily, for more than 30 minutes.

Six Smiths said they didn't watch the debate. One admitted: "I started to watch, but I fell asleep."

Of the 17, only five Smiths were available for comment.

One said he was for Nixon. Three were for Kennedy.

One would not say which candidate he preferred.

One, Mrs. Joe Smith, said: "I was making grape jelly, and did not watch them too close, but my mind wasn't changed. I'm a Democrat."

Henry Retiring
PORTLAND (AP) — Will W. Henry is retiring July 1 as general manager of the Dairy Cooperative Association, a position he has held since the milk distributors group was formed in 1931.

His successor will be Edward Wyss, who has managed the association's feed department 21 years.
