

Fund Drive Rolls Ahead, Passes 63 Per Cent Mark

The Klamath County United Fund campaign is rounding the clubhouse turn and heading for the stretch.

The jockeys are whipping their steeds toward the \$138,942 finish line.

Lowell Jones aboard Special Gifts Division is ahead by four lengths with a total of 95 per cent of quota. Paul Meier of Educational Division is second by a head, with 83 per cent. Ross Ragland, riding Automotive Division is third at 80 per cent, and is a length in front of Oscar Anderson, on Public Service Division, with 76 per cent.

Others in the race are Clyde (Hap) Caldwell on Governmental, 73 per cent; Russell Cotter, Foods Industries, 71 per cent; Lowell Jones, Large Firms, 69 per cent; Dr. Calvin Hunt, Professional, 63 per cent; John Rose, Allied Construction, 51 per cent; Marion Foster, Lumber and Industry, 49 per cent; Walt Birmingham, Commercial, 44 per cent; and Mrs. Karl Urquhart, Residential, 40 per cent.

Off to a slow start but picking up speed are Ralph Hunter and Wilbur Womer's Inactive Division, 13 per cent; "Students," 12 per cent, and "County," nine per cent.

Race progress is announced during campaign report breakfasts. During Monday's meeting, UF campaign managers learned the drive has reached \$87,543, or 63 per cent.

Monday's report added \$3,032, mostly from Public Service and Professional Divisions.

Kingsley Field has passed the \$1,500 mark toward the \$2,500 quota.

Demo Panel Urges Action On Full Power Potential

PORTLAND (AP)—A six-member panel of Democrats Saturday adopted a report urging speedy development of the full power potential of the West's major rivers.

Five members of Congress and Mrs. Maurine Neuberger, Democratic nominee for U. S. Senator in Oregon, called for reversal of what they termed a Republican policy of no new starts on hydroelectric projects.

The report was drafted after a hearing at which Sen. Warren Magnuson, D-Wash., was chairman. Some 30 witnesses gave views. It was sent to Sen John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, the Democratic presidential nominee.

Magnuson said "Here in the Northwest we have 40 per cent of the nation's hydro-power potential, but in eight long years the Republicans have supported only one little project start of 90,000 kilowatts.

"This 'no new starts' policy compares with the 8,265,250 kilowatts of power commenced under Democratic sponsorship—and that is 91 Democratic kilowatts for every Republican kilowatt."

Other congressional members of the panel were Sens. Frank Church of Idaho and Clair Engle of California and Reps. Edith Green and Al Ullman of Oregon.

Their recommendations included:

- An accelerated reforestation program, to be completed by 1970.
- More public investment in timber access roads to open forests for timber cutting and recreation.
- Creation of a Youth Conservation Corps to aid with reforestation and creation of recreational facilities.

Legislation defining surface and mineral rights in national forests to prevent recurrence of such cases as that of Al Sarena, in which land claimed for mining was used chiefly for its timber.

Creation of a regional water resources research laboratory, federal action to relieve interstate pollution problems and more U. S. Public Health Service work on these problems.

Deportation Plea Issued

PORTLAND (AP) — Appeals were directed to President Eisenhower Friday asking a delay in the scheduled deportations of two Portland men, Hamish Scott MacKay and William Mackie.

The two men were ordered deported on grounds that they are aliens who once had been members of the Communist Party.

MacKay, 55, is a native of Canada. He has lived in Oregon for more than 30 years. Mackie, 51, was born in Finland and was brought to Portland by his parents when he was 10 months old.

Immigration Service officials began deportation action against the pair 10 years ago.

Both men deny that they were Communists.

Appeals on behalf of the two men were sent by their attorneys also to Vice President Richard Nixon, U. S. Atty. Gen. William F. Rogers, Gov. Mark O. Hatfield, Secretary of State Howell Appling, and Oregon Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton.

Moisture Runoff Said Irregular

PORTLAND (AP) — Moisture runoff from the mountains in the Pacific Northwest was somewhat irregular in September, the U. S. Geological Survey says.

It reported Saturday the monthly mean flow of the Columbia River at The Dalles was 96 per cent of the average for the month in the 15-year period from 1945 to 1957.

The runoff was low in central and southwestern Oregon, the upper Snake, Salmon and St. Joe River basins in Idaho, the Klickitat and Wenatchee river basins in Washington and in the Blackfoot and part of the Flathead river basin in Montana.

The survey reported heavy runoff in the Fraser and lower Kootenay River basins in British Columbia and near Pend Oreille Lake and the Weiser River in Idaho.

Crescent Youth Finishes Course

Pfc. Douglas E. Stumbaugh, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elwyn B. Stumbaugh, Crescent, Oregon, completed the 22-week radio receiver repair course September 29 at the Army Signal School, Fort Monmouth, New Jersey.

Stumbaugh was trained to install, maintain and repair radio receivers and associated communication equipment.

He entered the Army last January and completed basic training at Fort Ord.

A 1958 graduate of Gilchrist High School, the 20-year-old soldier attended Oregon State College in Corvallis.

PUC Head Opposes Duplication

SALEM (AP) — Public Utility Commission Jonel Hill will ask the coming session of the legislature for a law to prohibit additional duplication of utilities such as electric power systems.

Hill said that about 200,000 of the 550,000 electric power consumers in the state live in areas served by competing power systems.

Portland, Salem, Springfield and The Dalles are among the larger cities served by competing systems. Hill said that "when people first are served by two systems, they appear to get lower rates through competition. But eventually, they'll have to pay, through higher rates, for the two sets of pole and lines."

The proposed law would not apply to municipal power systems of peoples' utility districts, over which the commissioner has no regulatory authority.

Hill said that some of the public power systems are fearful that he wants to take control of them. Hill said the fears were unfounded—that his proposed law would not regulate any system not now under regulation.

In addition, Hill intends to ask establishment of a state policy that power system duplication is not in the public interest. He hopes this will pave the way for eliminating some of the present duplication.
