In The Day's News

According to figures announced by the Travel Information Division of the Oregon State Highway Department, 1,934,300 out-of-state cars visited Oregon during the 1960 tourist season.

The average out-of-state car carried 3.3 persons. The average length of stay per car in Oregon was 3.85 days. The average expenditure per day per car was \$20.60. The average expenditure per stay (3.85 days) per car was \$79.31.

That totals up to the not inconsiderable sum of 153.4 million dollars spent by automobile tourists in Oregon during the 1960 tourist season. In addition, tourist visitors traveling by rail, bus and air to Oregon during the tourist season spent about 17 million dollars, bringing Oregon's income from total tourist travel in 1960 to 170 million dollars.

That is pretty good. But it could have been better. For example:

The average length of stay per tourist car in Oregon this year was only 3.85 days. The average number of miles driven in Oregon per tourist car was only 460. Oregon is roughly 300 miles across, from north to south or from east to west. That means that at least a day must have been spent by each car just getting across the state, traveling at fairly high speed. That leaves only a little better than a day and a half for sight-seeing. That is far too little time to spend in sight-seeing in a state as attractive as Oregon.

This is the point: If we could have induced each tourist car to spend only ONE DAY MORE IN OREGON, it would have meant an additional 40 MILLION dollars. That would have brought Oregon's total tourist income in 1960 up to more than 200 MILLION dollars.

Let's put it this way: We have in Oregon a State Industrial Development Commission. It works hard to bring to Oregon new industrial enterprises to add to our payroll income.

In nearly every town and city we have a chamber of commerce that is working vigorously to bring to its community new industrial enterprises to bring new payroll income. If, in any one year, our State Industrial Development Commission and our local chambers of commerce could bring in 40 million dollars in new industrial payroll, they would feel that they had done a splendid job.

Yet here is 40 million dollars added tourist income to be had by inducing each tourist automobile to spend ONLY ONE DAY MORE in our state.

How could it be done?

It would be comparatively easy. If every city and town in Oregon could organize its people who come in constant contact with tourists—hotels, motels, gasoline stations, garages, restaurants, etc.—so that the story of its historic places, its scenic wonders, its historic places, its beauty spots could be told alluringly to the tourists who pass through Oregon . . . too often at high speed in order to get to SOME OTHER STATE in order to see ITS resorts, its scenic wonders, its historic places and its beauty spots . . . it could be done.

It's just that simple.

Closed Doors: Trial Rolls On In Cuba

SANTA CLARA, Cuba (AP)—The biggest conspiracy trial of the Fidel Castro regime rolled on here today behind doors closed to all foreign newsmen except four Russians.

Newsmen counted 170 defendants, about a dozen of them in military uniform, who entered the courtroom at the trial opening Tuesday. Defense attorneys said more than 200 were on trial.

The accused are charged with waging armed rebellion in the Escambray Mountains or with collaborating with the insurgents. Among those on trial was an American identified by the semi-official newspaper Revolucion as Richard Pecoreo of Staten Island, N. Y.

A New York City fireman by that name was fired from his job earlier this year after overstaying his leave on a trip to Cuba.

Khrushchev Speaks Openly Of Rockets And War

Model 'W' Ford Goose-eggs Bucs

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—The New York Yankees evened the world series at three games each today by crushing the Pittsburgh Pirates, 12-0, on lefty Whitey Ford's seven-hit pitching and a record-filled 17-hit attack.

A crowd of 38,380 watched the Yankees achieve the most one-sided shutout in World Series history. The deciding game will be played here at Forbes Field Thursday.

Little Bobby Richardson set a World Series record for runs batted in when he knocked in three runs with a pair of triples. Those two triples in the same game also tied a series record.

By winning the seventh series game of his career, Ford equalled the record shared by Lefty Gomez and Red Ruffing of previous Yankee teams.

The Yankees also set team records of 46 runs and 75 hits for a series. The total broke the old mark of 43 set by the 1936 Yankees and the run total surpassed the old record of 74 by the 1912 New York Giants.

Roger Maris, John Blanchard and Yogi Berra each collected three hits for the Yankees.

The Yankees suffered a casualty early in the game when catcher Elston Howard was struck on the right hand by a pitch from Pittsburgh starter Bob Friend. X-rays disclosed a broken finger and Howard was lost to the Yankees for Thursday's game.

Richardson's three runs batted in gave him a total of 12 for the series, breaking the old mark of 10 set by Berra in 1956 and tied by Ted Kluszewski of the White Sox last year.

And his two three-baggers in the same game equaled mark set by Tom Leach of Pittsburgh and Patrick Dougherty of the Boston Red Sox in 1903 and equaled by Walter (Dutch) Reuther of Cincinnati in 1919.

The Yankees, striving to even the series at three games for each club, knocked out Friend in the third inning. Mickey Mantle's two-run single and Richardson's two-run triple were the big hits in that upswing.

A scratch single by Whitey Ford, the Yankees' left-handed starting pitcher, with the bases loaded in the second inning had sent New York off to a 1-0 lead before a sellout crowd of more than 36,000 at Forbes Field.

Big Third Inning
New York then assaulted Friend and his successor, Tom Cheney, for five hits and as many runs in the third.

Fred Green, a left-hander, went in to pitch for Pittsburgh in the sixth.

Green lasted through only three batters in the sixth when the Yankees added two runs that widened their lead to 8-0.

Green was removed and replaced by Clem Labine.

The Yankees added two more runs off Labine in the seventh, increasing their lead to 10-0.

Two more Yankee runs off Labine in the eighth widened the lead to 12-0, the final score.

FIRST INNING
YANKS—Friend threw out Boyer. Kubek rolled out. Mazeroski to Stuart. Maris flied to Viridon. No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

PIRATES—Viridon lined a single to center. Right-hander Bob Turley started to warm up for the Yankees. Groat rapped into a double play, Richardson to Kubek to Skowron. Clemente brought a throw from the crowd with a long foul into the right field stands that narrowly missed being a home run. Clemente singled sharply behind first and second into right field. Stuart struck out. No runs, two hits, no errors, one left.

SECOND INNING
YANKS—Mantle bunted and was thrown out by Friend. Berra walked. Skowron smashed a ground single, sending Berra to third. Howard was hit on the right hand with a pitched ball, filling the bases. After a preliminary examination by Yankee trainer Bus Mauch, Howard went into the clubhouse. Eli Grba went in to run for Howard. Viridon caught Richardson's fly. His quick throw to the plate held Berra at third. Ford was credited with an infield single when Friend knocked down his smash back to the box but his throw to Smith at the plate was too late to get Berra. Boyer struck out. One run, two hits, no errors, three left.

PIRATES—John Blanchard went in to catch for the Yankees. Cimoli bounced out. Boyer to Skowron. Smith singled to left. Boyer leaped up for Hoak's high bounce and threw to Richardson to nip Smith at second. Hoak reaching first on the force. Mazeroski lined to Mantle. No runs, one hit, no errors, one left.

THIRD INNING
YANKS—Kubek was hit on the right foot by a pitch. Maris doubled, sending Kubek to third. Mantle singled, scoring Kubek and Maris to increase the Yankees' lead to 3-0. Berra singled, Mantle racing to third. Manager Danny Murtagh signaled for Cheney to replace Friend. Mantle limped slightly coming into third. Skowron hit a sacrifice fly to Clemente. Mantle scoring and Berra holding first. Blanchard singled to center field. Berra stopping at second. Richardson tripled off the left field wall, scoring Berra and Blanchard. Richardson's two RBI gave him a total of 11 for the series, breaking the record of 10 set by Yogi Berra in 1956 and tied by Ted Kluszewski in 1959. Ford was called out on strikes. Boyer flied to Viridon. Five runs, five hits, no errors, one left.

FOURTH INNING
YANKS—Left-hander Vinegar Bend Mizell came in to pitch for the Pirates. Kubek flied to Clemente. Maris struck out. Mantle walked on four pitches. Stuart reached up for Berra's high chopper and stepped on first for the unassisted putout. No runs, no hits, no errors, one left.

PIRATES—Gene Baker, a right-handed hitter, batted for Cheney and struck out. Richardson tossed out Viridon. Groat struck out. No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Yreka Cavein Area Mishap Claims One, Injures Two

YREKA — One man died and two are in serious condition in Siskiyou County General Hospital here as a result of a cavein of a deep channel at Forks of the Salmon yesterday.

Desperate work by rescuers saved Gene Phelps, 39, and Verne Taylor, though Phelps was completely buried for from five to 15 minutes and Taylor was buried except for his head.

Artificial respiration administered by rescuers and treatment by Dr. G. P. Ashcraft of Etina failed to revive Dwight Eugene Moody, 29, Arcata. He was buried beneath a deep pile of rain-soaked earth for four hours.

Taylor and Phelps were flown to the hospital by a helicopter from Etina. Both were listed in serious condition this morning.

Taylor, 46, is a forest service employee. He was supervising a road construction job on O'Neal Creek a mile and a half from Forks of the Salmon. Phelps is a subcontractor for the W. C. Sharp Construction Company of Eureka, Siskiyou County Sheriff A. B. Collier's deputies said the men told them Moody, an equipment operator, left the controls of his backhoe that was employed to dig a channel for a culvert. He entered the channel to inspect his work.

An embankment loosened by recent rains began to slide and Taylor and Phelps, who were standing on the bank, jumped to help Moody. The bank caved in and trapped them. The channel was 12 feet deep.

It was Taylor's yell from five to 15 minutes later that halted a passing truck driver. He was Olin Gould, a forest service scaler. Gould dug Phelps' head free and went for help.

**Blast Rocks
The Dalles**

THE DALLES (AP)—A workman was injured fatally when a spark from his welding rod touched off an explosion aboard a petroleum barge here Tuesday.

Another workman was missing and believed drowned.

Ward Warren, 45, died a short time after the explosion. Ed Coburn, 54, an electrician, was seen by other workmen struggling in the water after the explosion. He did not come up.

The blast took place in the forward compartment of an empty barge at the Pacific Inland Navigation Co., where it was being repaired after arrival from Portland.

Firemen said a spark from Warren's welding rod apparently ignited petroleum fumes in the compartment. The barge caught fire, and crews worked more than an hour to put the flames out.

Several of the 15 men on the barge were knocked down or shaken by the explosion.

The barge, 48 feet wide and 206 feet long, has a capacity of 29,719 barrels. The Coast Guard said there had been another explosion aboard it last winter in the Portland harbor.

Dakota Flier Is Missing

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A Fargo, N. D., flier forced down at sea off Wake Island in a single-engine plane is missing and a search is under way, the Coast Guard was advised today.

Another Fargo flier safely landed his single-engine plane at Wake. The two were attempting a nonstop flight from Oakland, Calif., to Manila.

The Coast Guard, relaying reports received in San Francisco from a search rescue coordinator on Kwajalein in the Marshall Islands, said a Coast Guard crash boat, after earlier being rebuffed by reefs, took in tow the plane in which Lt. Duane Stirling, 27, went down Tuesday night about three miles north of Wake.

Stirling was not in the plane. A pinpoint of light during the night in the same area might have been from a flashlight carried by Stirling. A search of the area was negative.

Stirling's companion, Capt. Charles Finnegan, 30, landed on Wake.

The two had been in the air more than 30 hours and were past the halfway mark of their effort.

Both planes were in view of the island when Stirling's plane went down. Finnegan circled once and headed into the Wake landing field.

Finnegan and Stirling left Oakland Monday morning on their projected 7,690-mile flight. They were after the record set last year when Max Conrad flew 7,685 miles nonstop from Casablanca, Morocco, to Los Angeles.

**Reasons Cited
For Crash
Of Airliner**

BOSTON (AP)—The turboprop Electra which plunged into Boston harbor 14 seconds after take-off last week had lost power in one and possibly two port engines—but no structural defects were involved, the chairman of the House Aviation Subcommittee says.

Rep. John Bell Williams, D-Mass., said his subcommittee found no reason to order other Electras grounded. The Boston crash, which killed 62 persons, was the fifth involving the Lockheed Electra since the planes went into service two years ago.

TV Debate Hassle

NEW YORK (UPI)—Sen. John F. Kennedy said today he was concerned because Vice President Richard M. Nixon had turned down a fifth television debate before the November election.

Kennedy said he also was opposed to turning over the last of four debates he has scheduled with Nixon on October 21 to the vice presidential candidates.

But Kennedy agreed with a Nixon campaign headquarters suggestion that the last debate be lengthened to two hours instead of one.

Kennedy and Nixon will meet in their third hour-long debate Thursday night. The fourth debate, by agreement, is to be on foreign policy.

In voicing concern about the gap between the fourth debate and the election, Kennedy said: "I want the debates moved up closer to election time so we can have a discussion of issues on which the people must make their decision."

Nixon's press secretary, Herbert Klein, said Nixon had placed October 28 as the outside limit on scheduling the last debate because after that date his schedule would be so crowded he would have no extra time.

**13 Coal Tars
For Lipsticks
Given Approval**

WASHINGTON (AP)—The women of America may continue to buy lipsticks in their favorite colors.

The Food and Drug Administration has formally approved use of 13 specific coal tar colors for use in cosmetics, saying it is not inconsistent with the public health.

The finding, based on animal tests over the last two years, was made as a temporary measure pending more thorough testing over the next 2½ years.

The FDA once had ordered a ban on use of the colors, saying that test rats suffered liver, kidney and blood damage from a diet which included the dyes. The law then forbade use in cosmetics of any substance which caused damage in test animals.

Lipstick makers protested that no woman would swallow anything like the amount of the colors fed to the rats, but the law provided no leeway. Congress changed the law to permit use of the dyes in quantities found to be safe.

Politician Murdered

TOKYO (UPI)—An extreme right-wing teenager fatally stabbed anti-American socialist politician Inejiru Asanuma before a thousand persons on a public stage today. The assassination touched off demonstrations by 15,000 Zengakuren students, radical unionists and other leftists.

Police identified the killer as Futaya Yamaguchi, 17, a freshman at the Daito-Bunda Academy and a member of the extreme right-wing Great Japan Patriotic Society.

The demonstrators marched on police headquarters demanding the resignation of Police Chief Kameyoshi Teramoto, who they charged had not provided adequate security for Asanuma. Fighting broke out when the extreme leftist Zengakuren students in the crowd tried to break through the iron gates at police headquarters. About 2,000 helmeted police beat them back. The crowd then moved off and demonstrated in front of the premier's residence, throwing stones, taunting police and snakedancing in the streets.

Asanuma was chairman of the Socialist Party and had violently opposed the United States-Japan Security Treaty. He took part in a number of wild demonstrations in front of the Parliament Building against the treaty that helped force cancellation of President Eisenhower's visit to Japan in June.

Asanuma's assassination in more than three decades in Japan, where government by murder used to be a common practice under prewar militarists.

It was the third political stabbing in Japan this year. Former Premier Nobusuke Kishi was

Further Defeats Seen For Soviet

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Soviet Premier Khrushchev, apparently undismayed by a steamroller setback in the U.N. General Assembly, plunged today into a round of last-minute diplomatic activity in advance of another assembly appearance this afternoon.

But the Soviet leader, against the Soviet Union, menacing world peace. It is based on the American U2 plane shot down over Soviet territory and the RB47 shot down off the north coast of the Soviet Union.

He told newsmen he would speak on two major Soviet proposals—demands for total independence of all colonial territories and condemnation of the United States as an aggressor against the Soviet Union for spy plane flights.

He wants full assembly discussion of both issues.

Khrushchev saw Australian Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies and India's Defense Minister V. K. Krishna Menon. Menzies has sharply criticized Khrushchev in policy debate.

The Soviet chief appeared to be gripped by an almost apoplectic fury when the disarmament vote went heavily against him. He openly talked of rockets and war.

Time is running out for him unless he changes his mind about flying back to Moscow Thursday night.

He has been beaten down repeatedly in the General Assembly, the latest setback coming Tuesday night in spite of a raging, threatening speech demanding that disarmament be debated at once by the assembly without preliminary committee consideration.

The 99-nation assembly voted 54-13 with 31 abstentions against Khrushchev's demand. Then it voted 61-12 with 24 abstentions to debate the issue in the Political Committee. Voting with the Soviet bloc on the first question were Afghanistan, Mali and fellow-traveling Guinea and Cuba. Afghanistan abstained on the second vote.

Today the assembly discussed Soviet demands to bypass committee consideration of two more Soviet resolutions. The U.N. Steering Committee has recommended that both be debated by the Political Committee before they come to the assembly.

One resolution charges the United States with aggressive actions

against the Soviet Union, menacing world peace. It is based on the American U2 plane shot down over Soviet territory and the RB47 shot down off the north coast of the Soviet Union.

Khrushchev, in a smiling mood which contrasted with his anger Tuesday, told newsmen that he has been given a personal report on the defection.

"He either lost, his way or wanted to stay. If he does, it's all right with me," he said.

Khrushchev cautioned Americans against believing "because one sailor has gone over" that the United States now has an overwhelming advantage.

Khrushchev's comments represented the first high-level Soviet reaction to the case. Two Soviet Embassy diplomats talked with Janinets Tuesday in an effort to persuade him to return.

The young sailor refused to heed their pleas, saying he was fed up with life in the Soviet Union.
