If the Henley Hornets have their way Friday, the Glendale Pirates won't have a successful homecoming when the two teams meet in a Rogue Valley A2 League encounter on the Pirate turf.

Henley, which stands at 1-1 in league competition, must win this game to stay in contention for the championship. The Hornets whipped Illinois Valley Saturday after dropping a hard-fought contest to Phoenix the week before, 13-6.

"We expect Glendale to be 'up' for its homecoming game," Henley coach Len Weber said yesterday. "They're big and tough." The Pirates are running under a new coach, Richard Lempe, this year.

"The schedule is against us the rest of the way," Weber said. "Our remaining four games are on the road so we're going to have to work hard."

The Pirates run out of a multiple offense. Their leading ground gainer is a bruising 210-pound fullback, Bob Humphries. Quarterback Jack Berline is a competent passer and he has two capable receivers in ends Gerald Blevins and Jack Burke.

"If our line can stop Humphries," Weber said, "we'll expect a concentrated passing attack."

Two Henley starters will be on the shelf Saturday—guard Dave Anderson has a bad ankle and tackle Jim Long has a twisted knee. They will be replaced by Jay Balsiger and Charlie Thompson. Thompson is a sophomore tackle who started his first game Saturday and did a fine job.

The Henley backfield will have Gary Beber at quarterback, Larry Lugo and Joe DeGrande at halfbacks and Chuck Blofsky at fullback. Weber indicated that Dave Ragland and Steve Reiling would also see considerable duty.

The line is set with Bob Chapman and Cal Casebier at ends, Thompson and Jack Ziegelmeyer at tackles, Balsiger and Dennis O'Keefe at guards and Jim Stenberg at center.

Cards Grab Leaf Twirler

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Al Cicotte, 30-year-old right-hander who was voted the most valuable pitcher in the International League this year, was purchased by the St. Louis Cardinals from Toronto today for three players and an undisclosed sum of cash.

The Cardinals gave up outfielder Leon Wagner, lefthanded pitcher Cal Browning and a player to be named later in addition to cash for Cicotte, who previously pitched for the New York Yankees, Cleveland Indians, Washington Senators and Detroit Tigers. Cicotte had a 16-8 record with the Maple Leafs this year. In addition to his 16 victories during the regular season, Cicotte won three more games during the International League playoffs.

Utah Staters Top Syracuse

NEW YORK (AP) — For the first time in a full year defending champion Syracuse hasn't a single first place in any of the various national college football offensive departments.

The Orange men swept three of the four principal offensive titles last year, but figures released today by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau show the best it has been able to do to date this season is a fourth place in rushing.

Unheralded Utah State took over as the No. 1 ground gainer last Saturday, rushing 501 yards against Idaho as Syracuse was restricted to 195 yards on the ground by Holy Cross.

In the total offense department, New Mexico State leads with an average of 422.5 yards per game.

Casey Proud; Win Or Lose

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Behind closed doors, Casey Stengel told his New York Yankees he is "mighty proud" of them — regardless of whether they win or lose the World Series.

"The snow," made in the privacy of the Yankees' clubhouse — Casey's farewell to his players.

"Many of the fellows on the club felt it was the best speech they ever heard Casey make," said one Yankee veteran.

"He talked straight and didn't beat around the bush. He said that every single one of us had contributed toward winning the

"Most of all, though," the Yankee player added, "he made it plain to us how much pride he had in the entire ball club."

Stengel stood in the center of the room as he spoke and the silent Yankee players hung on each word.

Maybe Casey sensed that his players were a little down, trailing the Pittsburgh Pirates, three games to two and having to play the last two games on an alien field.

Like Stengel says, he can count, and he can understand human nature, too.

"Do good the next day or two and we'll all feel better," he told his men.

"Casey didn't have to tell us we're not beat yet," commented

another Yankee player. "None of us feel we are and he has seen us come back a hundred times before."

Dealing with the press was another matter, however. For the writers' benefit, Stengel later drew himself up and in perfect John Paul Jones' style, loudly proclaimed:

"We ain't dead yet, my men ain't shaken in their pants. And if you don't believe it, you can go in and examine them."

There were no outsiders in the room when Casey talked with his players. Never once did he say to them whether he would or would not be back next year.

But he did tell them — and later the press — that he might not get a chance to say good-bye personally to each of his players in the bedlam of confusion which invariably follows the final game of each World Series.

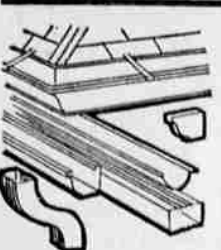
