

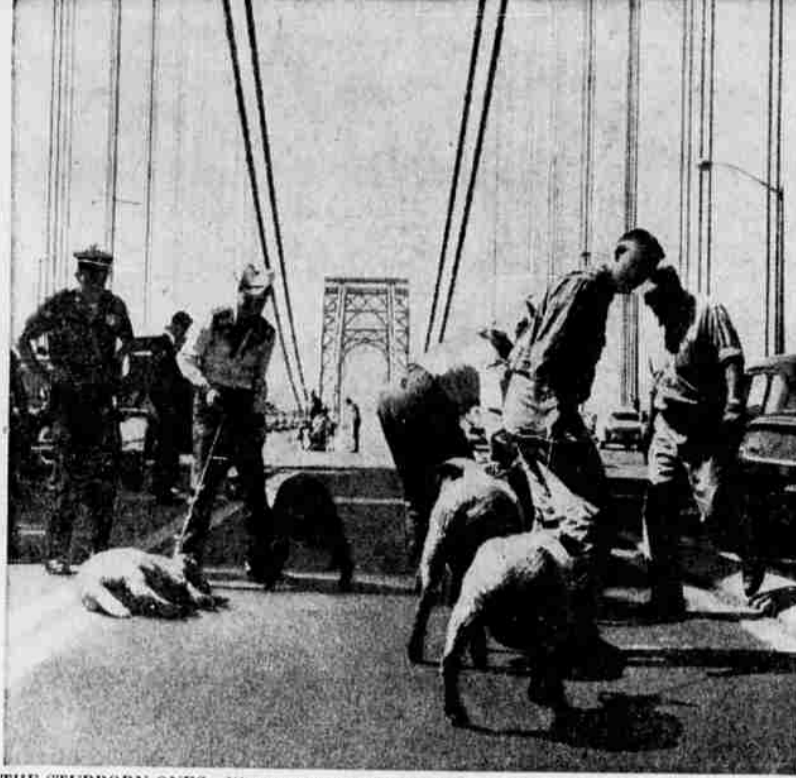
# NEA World News In Pictures

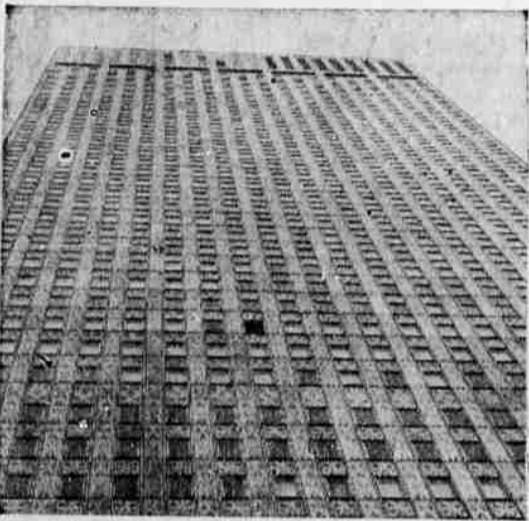

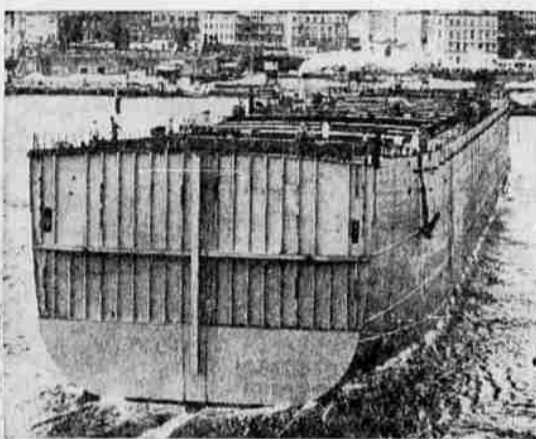

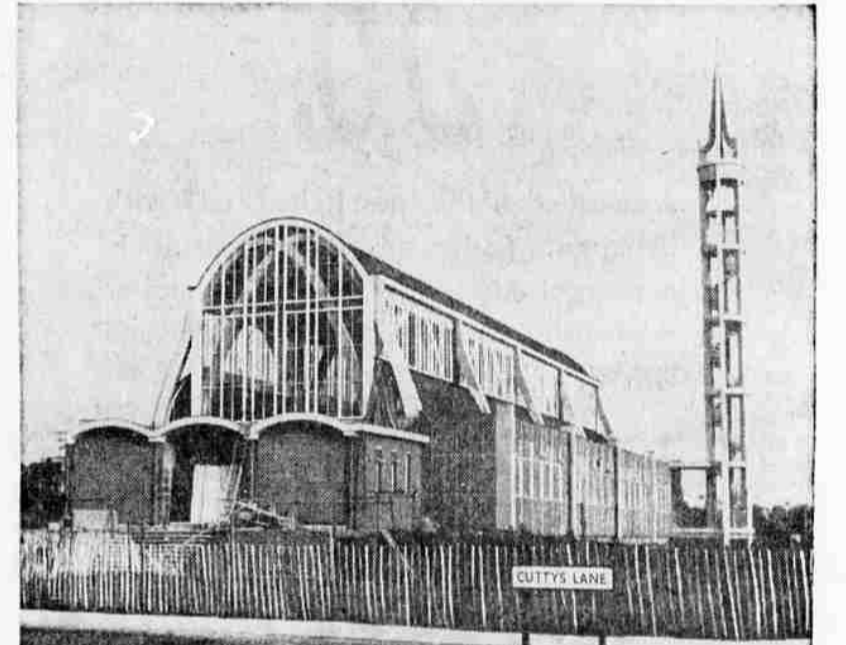
