# Growers Asked To Enter Festival

MERRILL—All potato growers in Oregon and in the Tulelake-Dorris-Macdoel areas are invited to make potato exhibit entries in the 24th annual Klamath Basin Potato Festival to be held in Merrill October 21-22.

All exhibits of U.S. No. 1 netted gems and white rose commercials, and certified seed, and the least number of U.S. No. 1 to weigh 100 pounds are classes. U.S. No. 1 bakers, the freakiest potato and variety, and the largest single No. 1 potato are contests open to statewide competition.

Robert Petrik, Merrill, chairman of the potato exhibits, welcomes all exhibits from any grower in any district in the state.

Exhibits should be delivered at Merrill High School Thursday, October 20, or at the latest, prior to 10 a.m. Friday, October 21. Exhibitors must use labels and tags furnished by headquarters. All exhibits in lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 are to remain the property of the Klamath Basin Potato Festival.

All other exhibits must be claimed by October 24 and if not claimed, will be forfeited.

If there are less entries than premiums in any lot, the judge is not required to award the first prize if the entries are of inferior quality. Any canning exhibits and produce not listed may be exhibited if desired and arrangements made with festival headquarters.

Ribbons representing prizes in all lots and classes will be placed on the winning exhibits. Prize money will be mailed as quickly as possible to all winners along with prize ribbons.

Classes and awards are as follows: Lot 1—netted gems, commercial, U.S. No. 1, not washed, 50 pounds exhibit, first prize, \$50 and cup; second prize, \$25; third prize, \$15.

Lot 1A—white rose commercial, U.S. No. 1, not washed, 50 pounds exhibit, first prize, \$30 and cup; second prize, \$15; third prize, \$10.

Lot 2—certified seed netted gems, not washed, 50 pounds exhibit, first prize, \$50 and cup; second prize, \$25; third prize, \$15.

Lot 2A—certified seed white rose, not washed, 50 pounds exhibit, first prize, \$30 and cup; second prize, \$15; third prize, \$10.

Lot 3—least number of U.S. No. 1 netted gems to weigh 100 pounds; (must weigh 100 pounds or over) first prize, \$10.

Lot 3A—U.S. No. 1 bakers, all classifications, first prize, \$10; second prize, \$5.

Lot 4—largest single U.S. No. 1 potato, first prize, \$5.

Lot 5—freakiest potato, any variety, first prize, \$5.

Lot 6—4-H Club potato growers only, entries to consist of 25 pounds of commercial netted gems, U.S. No. 1, first prize, \$25; second prize, \$15; third prize, \$10; fourth prize, \$5.

Lot 7—FFA potato growers only; class 1, commercial netted gems, U.S. No. 1 (25 pounds exhibit), first prize, \$10; class 2, seed potatoes (netted gems), first prize, \$10.

Lot 8—high school potato exhibit, potatoes from any available source with exhibitor representing a Basin school (25-pound exhibit), first prize, \$10 to exhibitor; second prize, \$5.

Lot 9—Class 1A canned pears, one quart, \$5; Class 1B, canned peaches, one quart, \$5; Class 1C, canned plums, one quart, \$5; Class 2A, canned string beans, one pint, \$5; Class 2C, canned beets, one pint, \$5.

Lot 10—grain, seed, vegetables: Class 1, hanchen barley, \$5, \$3; Class 2, alsike clover seed, \$5; Class 3, alfalfa seed, \$5; Class 4, wheat, \$5; Class 5,

oats, \$5; Class 6, squash, largest, \$2; Class 9, onions, best three \$3, \$2; Class 7, pumpkin, large, \$3, \$2; Class 10, turnips, 13, tomatoes, \$3, \$2; Class 14, best exhibits, ribbons; Class 17, est, \$3, \$2; Class 8, cabbage, \$3, \$3, \$2; Class 11, carrots, \$3, \$2; apples, \$3, \$2; Class 15, other parsnips, \$3, \$2.

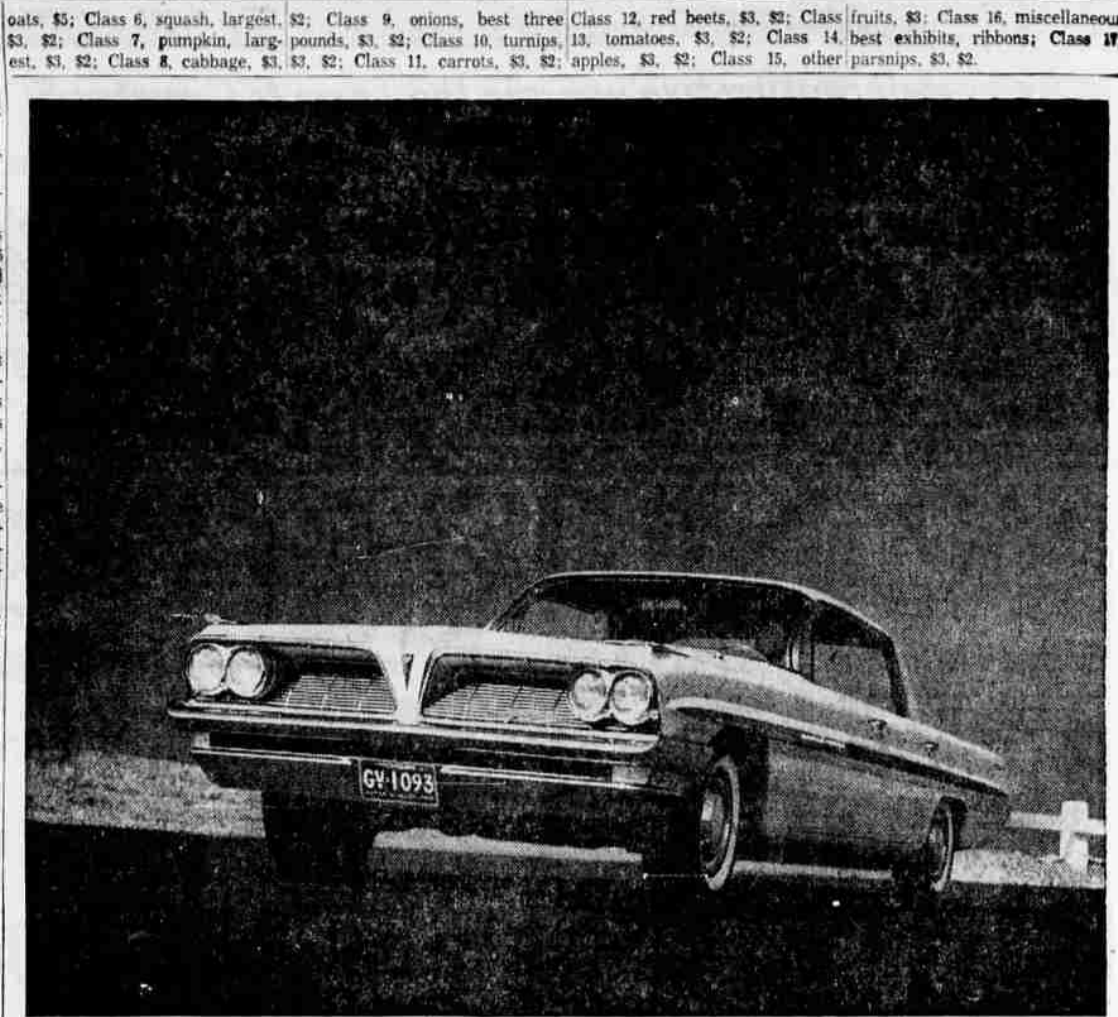
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
