

Stengel's Big Gamble Pays Off

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Manager Casey Stengel made the big gamble and it paid off. He pitched Whitey Ford with only three days rest in the sixth game of the World Series and the New York Yankees won 12-0, pulling even with the Pittsburgh Pirates at three games all.

Usually Ford, a tiny, stubby southpaw almost 32 years old, gets at least four days rest. Bob Turley, winner of the second game, was ready to go and he had five days rest.

But Ford got the nod and kept the Yankees in contention. As in the case of the other lopsided Yankee victories (10-0 and 16-3) it was a game without a turning point. The Yankees just poured it on.

The third was the big inning for the Yankees. Tony Kubek got on base when Friend also hit him, went to third on Roger Maris' double to right, and both runners scored on Mickey Mantle's single to center. Then Berra singled to center sending Mantle to third from where he scored on Bill Skowron's fly to right.
