Women Call Convention

The constituting convention of the Willamette Conference of the American Lutheran Church women will be held at Bethesda Lutheran Church, 4445 Royal Avenue, Eugene, on Saturday, October 15, beginning at 9:30 a.m. and closing at 3:30 p.m.

Those taking part are the women who were delegates of The American Lutheran Church Women's Constituting Convention at Northfield, Minnesota, in July as the result of the merger of three Lutheran Church Synods, known as the Evangelical Lutheran Church, the United Evangelical Lutheran Church and the American Lutheran Church.

Mrs. M. D. Burchfield of Eugene, is hostess chairman in charge of arrangements. The business will consist of the adoption of a constitution and the election of officers for the Willamette Conference.

Pastor H. Milton Peterson, the new president of the Willamette Conference of the American Lutheran Church, will install the new officers.

Coffee will be served in the morning before the opening, and there will be a luncheon at noon with free-will offering. A social hour and coffee will follow the conference.

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Fall Study To Start

Congregational Meeting Set

The East Willamette Association of Congregational churches, will hold its annual meeting Friday, October 21, at the Congregational Church in Klamath Falls.

The meeting will include delegates from Ashland, Roseburg, Medford and Klamath Falls.

The featured speaker will be Douglas Morrill, a Congregational missionary in Japan since 1949. He now is business manager of the Canadian Academy in Kobe, Japan, a 300-pupil school sponsored by two Canadian and 10 American denominations.
