Basement Brightened With Colorful Garden

When the time comes to transfer your delicate greens and bulbs from the garden to the basement for winter protection, why not make that area in the basement an attractive indoor garden?

The idea, of course, is to do it inexpensively using materials that are readily come by.

For instance, though the bulbs will lie dormant for many months, you can make colorful containers to hold the clay pots in which the bulbs are transplanted. Just a few bright splashes of color on those planter boxes will do wonders for the basement area.

With some ordinary plywood boxes and a roll or two of a decorative covering material, you can easily make your own planter boxes.

Here's the way.

First cut a piece of the decorative covering material large enough to cover the bottom and all four sides of the box, plus enough to go over the top, and about one inch down the inside.

Ideal material to use for this purpose is Marvalon adhesive decorative covering for it adheres beautifully to plywood. And you can select it in virtually any color and design you'd like. Orange, the newest color being offered in Marvalon linings, would add a gay note to any dreary basement.

When you've cut out the right size piece of material, remove the backing sheet by running your thumbnail between the sheet and the material and peel apart.

House Plant Care

Before bringing house plants indoors for the winter, scrub their porous or glazed clay pots. Use a sponge or brush dipped into thick soap or detergent suds.

Every gardener has a pet method for washing foliage. Turn the pot up to dunk the leaves into a solution of warm soapsuds—after covering the earth with a circle of paper to keep it in place. Or swab each leaf with a sudsy sponge, and rinse with a fine spray.
