WASHINGTON (AP) — Acquittal of Thurman A. Whiteside raised questions today whether the government will press related charges against former FCC Commissioner Richard A. Mack.

A Justice Department decision on that point will be delayed at least for several days, officials said.

President Is 70 Today; Oldest Chief Executive

By MARVIN L. ARROWSMITH WASHINGTON (AP) — Dwight D. Eisenhower is a record-breaking 70 today—the first man ever to serve to that age as President of the United States.

Happy birthday greetings flooded in from around the world, and the District of Columbia government invited the President's neighbors from the entire Washington area to a mid-day party on the White House lawn.

The program for the gala affair features Eisenhower turning the first spadeful of earth for the planting of a memorial oak tree.

Well-wishers scheduled to call at the White House in advance of the big party included a delegation from the Republican National Committee and the campaign headquarters of Vice President Richard M. Nixon, GOP presidential nominee.

Another round of greetings was a certainty at a morning conference the President arranged with representatives of 15 African nations and Cyprus, all newly independent and all recently admitted to United Nations membership.

During the afternoon the President and Mrs. Eisenhower plan to travel to their farm at Gettysburg, Pa., for a family observance of his birth anniversary.

On Monday Eisenhower, who has traveled hundreds of thousands of miles in this country and abroad as President, will be off on another long tour—a nine-day, 6,728-mile trip will take him coast to coast.

Hatfield Challenged

SALEM (AP)—Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton today challenged Gov. Mark Hatfield to a public debate of Hatfield's charges that Thornton is incompetent.

Hatfield declined, but said he is sure Thornton's Republican opponent, state Sen. Carl Francis, would be happy to debate.

In a letter to the governor, Thornton said Hatfield has been "carrying on a systematic smear campaign" against Thornton and other Democratic candidates.

Hatfield issued a statement that "this grandstand play is an attempt to divert attention from his miserable record in office, but it will not fool the voters come November 8."

Thornton wrote that the governor's "irresponsible charges against this office are refuted by the record." He added that what the governor has said "impugns the professional competence of the 73 career attorneys" on his staff.

The governor replied that "it is disgusting to watch the attorney general's verbal gymnastics as he tries to transfer the blame for his political flinching to his fine staff."

Licenses Cancelled

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Liquor Control Commission cancelled Wednesday the liquor licenses of six places at which food sales did not equal 25 per cent of the business.

The cancellations are the first under a regulation adopted last May and are effective Oct. 31. Two of the bars are in the Coos Bay area town of Empire, two in Portland and one each in The Dalles, Coquille and Astoria.

Also cancelled was the license of McFarlane's Market in Salem, accused by the commission of selling beer to a minor while its license was suspended.

A hearing was scheduled today on reports that the food sales of 10 other bars were less than 25 per cent of their business. They include the Sahara Club in Eugene, three places in Medford, three in Portland and one each in The Dalles, Coquille and Astoria.

The Oregon Restaurant and Beverage Association has indicated it eventually will attack legality of the food regulation in the courts.

No action was taken by the commission on a request by beer taverns that their closing hour be extended from the present 1 a.m. to 2:30 a.m.
