Medford Is Still Unbeaten

One And Only

MEDFORD (Special) — The Black Tornado defense may have a weak spot in it some place but the offensive unit(s) spend little time worrying about it. The 1959 Oregon State prep champs dealt the Klamath Union Pelicans a humiliating 49-6 defeat in a Southern Oregon Conference football game here Friday night.

The victory was the fifth straight against no losses for the Medford eleven in the 1960 season and became their 36th triumph over the KU squad in the 50 times the rivals have tangled over the years.

Just five plays after the opening kickoff halfback Mike Hood, one of 14 Medford backs to get into the lopsided struggle, rolled out and flipped a 37-yard touchdown pass to end Bob Quinney and from here on the overpowered Pelicans were never really in the ball game.

After limiting the Pels to three yards on the following set of downs halfback Phil Humphreys blistered 27 yards off tackle on the punt return for the second Tornado six-pointer. Before the period was over the Medford powerhouse had scored four touchdowns and a safety.

With about four minutes left in the stanza the Pelicans got on the scoreboard when quarterback Sherm Allen and end Wayne Dennis teamed up on a 32-yard pass-play to set up an Allen-to-Greg Jones lateral good for eight yards and six points. The conversion try failed.

During the scoreless second quarter Medford utilized the first of a horde of substitutes and the Pelicans threatened to score a second TD. Halfback Dave Stippich broke loose for 26 yards on a double reverse to get the KU club in sight of the goal line. The surge died, however, when Jim Barry intercepted a pass from Allen on his own goal line. The Tornado then moved down field in a march that included five first downs but KU's Ken Lewis intercepted a pass from Bill Charley on the Pel goal line as the halftime gun sounded.

In the third frame the Medford first string returned and just seven plays into the period Humphreys scored for 19 yards and the fifth Tornado TD.

KU threatened during the period but this drive failed when a slow-moving official blocked Dennis off from an end zone pass.

Awarded the ball on downs, Medford counted once more when Humphreys outran the entire KU defense on a brilliant 69-yard TD blitz.

Shortly after this Pel guard Gary Hancock was ejected from the game for expressing a too vivid opinion to an official.

The Klamath Falls team picked up a second 15-yard penalty on the game violation when coach Bob Williams walked on the field to determine what had happened.

The Tornado scored its final seven points on the opening play of the fourth when Hood scooted 24 yards for a touchdown and Dan Miles booted his fifth conversion.

Humphreys, a 170-pound senior, was the standout ball carrier of the evening. In eight trips he gained a total of 171 yards, exactly 90 yards more than the total yardage gained by the entire Pelican backfield.

Stippich topped the four KU ball-carriers with a total of 47. In the air the Pels gained 80 yards as compared to 105 for the winners.

AFL Cries Conspiracy

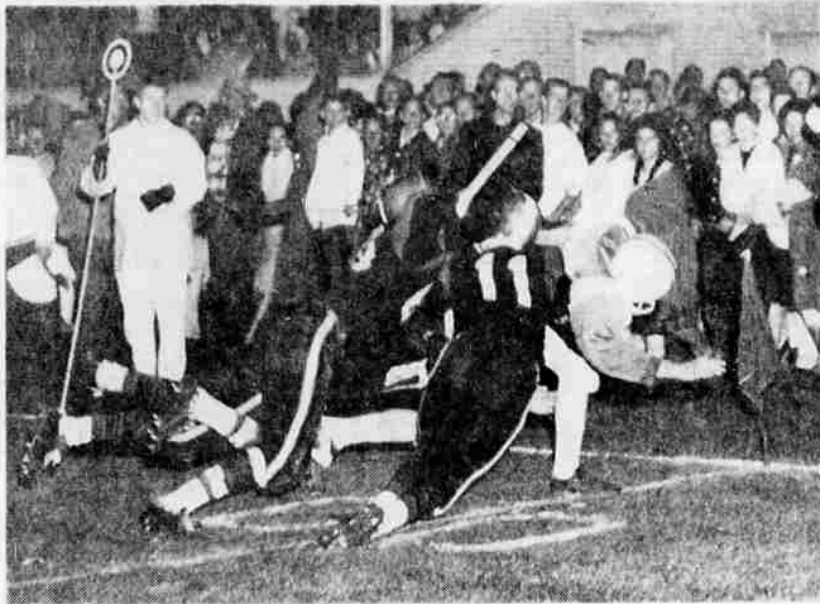
BALTIMORE (AP)—The rookie American Football League has charged that the veteran National Football League has engaged in an illegal conspiracy to exclude the AFL and its eight teams from a share in the professional football business.

In its \$10 million antitrust suit filed in U.S. District Court Friday the AFL, which was organized last year, asked the federal court to stop the NFL from granting new franchises in territories previously staked out by the AFL.

The plaintiffs also requested the court to require that NFL franchises granted, as in the case of Dallas, be withdrawn.

Treble damages were asked as permitted under federal antitrust laws.

The AFL, in its nine-page complaint, contended that the 30-year-old NFL and its 13 teams, also named as defendants, sought to induce prospective members of the new league to abandon franchises by promising them franchises in the older league.

Groat modestly failed to mention that he hit the next pitch to right field for a double that scored Virdon with the first of the three Pittsburgh runs in that inning.

Crusader's 77-Yard Romp Unsnarls B League Lead

St. Mary's halfback Alex Mete broke loose for a brilliant 77-yard punt return in Gem Stadium Friday night to give the Crusaders a hard-fought 13-7 decision over the Chiloquin Panthers.

Chiloquin rallied valiantly in the fourth quarter but a last minute pass interception killed the Panthers' hopes. The win gave St. Mary's the inside track for its second straight County B League title. The Crusaders are 4-0 while the Panthers are 4-1.

Mete's dazzling run came with 4:07 left in the third period. The Crusaders had taken a 7-0 first half lead. After battling at midfield for most of the third quarter, Panther end Paul Harris punted from his own 39-yard line. Mete hauled the punt in on his own 23-yard line, faked a reverse to Andre Knutson, and set sail down the right sideline behind a horde of blockers. The speedy halfback simply outran the entire Panther team.

The Crusaders took the opening kickoff and drove 75 yards to a touchdown in seven plays. The invaders from Medford caught the Panthers with their pass defenses down and picked up 77 yards through the air during the drive. Quarterback Jim Calhoun threw a nine-yarder to halfback Dick Evans for the TD. Calhoun also kicked the extra point and the Crusaders led 7-0 with 7:40 left in the first quarter.

Three times in the first half the Panthers failed to pick up

crucial fourth-down yardage in St. Mary's territory. They lost the ball on the Crusader 32, 27 and 20-yard lines.

The Panthers' most serious threat in the first half was set up when guard Harold Oldaker recovered Calhoun's tumble on the Crusader 31-yard line. Fullback Mike Ochoa bullheaded for eight yards on two carries but on fourth down, quarterback Benny Nygren was smothered at right end for a four-yard loss.

Nygren, Al DeBortoli and Norman Jackson alternated in the tailback spot for Chiloquin with sophomore DeBortoli having the most success at moving the ball.

Mete scored in the third quarter and then the Panthers came alive as the fourth quarter began. They stopped St. Mary's on the Chiloquin 31-yard line and took over on downs. The Panther single wing ripped off 60 yards in 14 plays but ate up eight valuable minutes in the process. The Chiloquin yardage formula was a pass from Jackson. DeBortoli around end and Ochoa up the middle. DeBortoli turned left end for six yards and the touchdown, diving inches inside the red out-of-bounds flag. Ochoa passed to end Ed Case for the conversion and the score was 13-7 with 4:55 left in the game.

St. Mary's racked up one first down after the kickoff and then Calhoun, with the game clinched, decided to pass. Nygren intercepted on the St. Mary's 47-yard

line and drove to the 43. Ochoa crashed straight ahead for 10 yards. Jackson ran the left side for four and then, with 1:08 left, Jackson threw a wobbly pass down the middle which was intercepted by Cruiser fullback Fred Lucas. And that was the ball game as St. Mary's decided to play it straight and run out the clock.

It was a bitter defeat for Gordon Knust's Panthers. They matched the Crusaders yard for yard on the ground and stopped their passing attack in the second half. Ochoa powered for 51 yards on 12 carries while Evans had 54 yards in 12 carries for the Crusaders.

St. Mary's coach Bill McKibbin said that Chiloquin was "undoubtedly the strongest team we have played all year."

Grant, still on the rebound after losing its first two games, shocked defending champion Jefferson, 26-14, in a Portland league contest and provided the major upset of Oregon high school football action Friday night.

It ended Jefferson's record league winning streak at 32 games. Grant, which now has won its last four, swept to a 20-0 lead at halftime and held down a Jefferson surge in the final two periods.

Jefferson, which was edged by Medford in the state class A-I championship playoff final last year, has been ranked No. 2 all season, behind Medford, in the Associated Press poll.

The result left Madison, a new power in the league, alone in first place. Madison, ranked No. 3 in the poll, rolled over Franklin 28-7 for its sixth victory in as many starts. Benson, undefeated but tied once, moved into second place with a 19-0 win over Roosevelt.

Another surprise was McMinnville's tying Tigard, ranked No. 9 in the poll, 33-33. Unrated Newberg downed Forest Grove, 20-0, and moved into a tie with McMinnville for top spot in the Tualatin-Yamhill Valley League. Each now has a 5-0-1 record.

Elsewhere around the state there were few surprises.

Medford roared over Klamath Falls, 49-6, to continue its domination of the Southern Oregon Conference although Grants Pass shares first place in that league after a 20-12 triumph over Ashland.

Marshfield of Coos Bay, No. 4 in the poll, was too strong for seventh-ranked Albany in a non-league game and came out with a 34-14 victory.

Southern Eugene, No. 5, edged Springfield, 7-0, and North Bend, No. 6, bounced North Eugene, 19-6.

Marshfield, South Eugene and North Bend remain unbeaten and untied in the Midwestern League.

Eighth-ranked David Douglas overwhelmed Gresham, 46-7, and unrated Central Catholic eked out over Sunset of Beaverton, 7-6, with the winners sharing a first place tie for leadership of the Portland Metropolitan League.

Roseburg of the Midwestern League shaded North Salem, No. 10 in the poll, 14-13.

North Salem and Albany remain tied for first place in the Valley League.

Defending champion Seaside and Willamina continued to flatten their class A-2 competition.

Seaside disposed of Portland's North Catholic, 51-0, while Willamina was trampling Yamhill, 54-6.
